MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF BARRINGTON HILLS

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington Hills was held on July 27, 1970 at Community Consolidated Countryside School at 7:30 P.M. in the Village of Barrington Hills.

Meeting was called to order by President Thomas Z. Hayward. Roll call.

Thomas Z. Hayward President Lawrence F. Bateman Trustee Raymond J. Grigsby John J. McLaughlin, Jr. Norman Tucker 11 Mary B. Thompson D. Wendell Fentress Chief of Police Ralph L. Hummel William B. Minutes of the June 22nd meeting were submitted for approval by the Board. On page 3, second sentence the word was was changed to be and on page 4, paragraph 5, first sentence, the word taken was changed to made. There being no further corrections, a motion was made and seconded approving the minutes. Motion carried.

TREASURER'S REPORT: In the absence of Mr. Welby, Mr. Tucker presented the Treasurer's Report for the month of June to the Board for approval. He noted that money accumulating from real estate taxes is being invested in Treasury Bills. The expenditures are running normally. A motion was made and seconded approving the report submitted. Motion carried.

FINANCE: Mr. Tucker presented the following bills for approval by the Board.

A motion was heard and seconded approving the bills for payment.
Roll call. 6 ayes, no nays, none absent. Motion carried.

Mr. Tucker presented copies of the Levy Ordinance to all the members of the Board and explained that the Appropriation Ordinance places a limitiation on the Village expenditures while the Levy Ordinance determines how much is needed to operate and

the counties figure tax amounts based on the assessed valuation in each county. A motion was heard and seconded approving the Levy Ordinance. Roll call. 6 ayes, no nays, noone absent. Motion carried.

At this time a resolution was presented to the Board for an appropriation of an difference additional \$1,328.47 from Motor Fuel Tax funds to make up the deficit between that already appropriated and the amount bid by Liberty Asphalt Company, the low bidder. A motion was heard and seconded to approve the resolution. Roll call. 6 ayes, no nays, noone absent. Motion carried.

PUBLIC SAFETY: Mr. Grigsby reported 165 routine calls and investigations, 15 motor vehicle accidents, and 1 burglary. He explained the \$ 600.00 grant from the Illinois Law Enforcement Commission which Lake County is using to conduct a Police Management Study with the aim of coordinating and improving efficiency throughout Lake Co. law enforcement bodies, in which the Village of Barrington Hills Police Department is participating.

Mr. Grigsby outlined the U. S. Government "Action Now" program of 75% funding for Police equipment and made the following recommendations to the Board.

- 1. \$ 3,500.50 for an additional police vehicle.
- 2. Four alternators @ \$ 265.00.
- 3. Four walkie talkie radios.
- 4. One bull horn # 102.00
- 5. One fingerprint camera \$ 189.50.
- 6. One mugging camera \$ 328.50.
- 7. One crime scene camera \$ 585.00.

Total cost would be \$ 8,850.95, 25% of which would be paid by the Village or \$ 2,212.25. The funds are available now until exhausted.

Several questions were posed by President Hayward - - Costs of operating this equipment, additional personel needed, and what training would be needed?

Mr. Grigsby explained that the third Police car needs replacing now and that many of our officers have already received training in the use of this equipment. The County Police Departments do not enter Village jurisdiction unless it is a major case and the equipment requested is needed for day to day use.

It was suggested that Mr. Grigsby, Mr. Tucker and Chief Hummel meet to decide if this can be worked out within the limits of the \$ 149,500.00 appropriated for the 1970-71 fiscal year for Police protection and have a recommendation for the July meeting.

ZONING AND PLANNING: Mr. Bateman reported that the Barrington Area Council of Government's land use maps are scheduled for completion by the middle of August. He noted that whatever is decided by the Cook County Zoning Board of Appeals regarding the Winston-Centex Development would probably be contested.

ROADS AND BRIDGES: Mr. Fentress reported that as soon as
Liberty Asphalt has completed surfacing the roads, stripes would
be painted on curves, hills and blind spots. It was suggested that
Liberty Asphalt put up barricades along newly sealcoated roads to
keep heavy traffic off until the edges firm up.

He reported that surfacing of Chapel Road could not be done before 1971. He will apply for MFT funds for this road, meet with Algonquin Township (Mr. Dvorak) to agree on proceedure. A motion was made and seconded authorizing Mr. Fentress to procede. Motion carried.

HEALTH & PUBLIC RELATIONS: Mrs. Thompson reported that many dogbites have been reported to her. The July issue of the <u>Illinois</u>

Municipal Review gave an account of procedures on dog bites: reporting to police and impounding of the dog for 10 days. Our Police have been following through on this procedure. This matter could

be discussed by the Council of Government's.

There was a complaint to Mrs. Thompson about uncut weeds in our Village. Mr. McLaughlin said that the Village had an Ordinance. She was advised to notify the party that they can sign a complaint to request the owner to cut the weeds or it will be done by the Village at the expense of the owner.

There is more Dutch Blm disease. Mr. Fentress will contact the county and request they cut the trees infected along County right of ways.

BUILDING: Mr. McLaughlin had no report. Mr. Hayward noted a violation of the barn setbacks. The owner has been notified and it will be settled.

ATTORNEY: Mr. Truninger has met with those involved! in the Otis Road Subdivision controversy. The Village was asked to accept Wight Engineer's solution and split the expenses with the builder, and the owners. He recomended refusing the proposal. There is to be another hearing July 28 with all the parties involved.

Mr. Hayward — Mr. Tocker prepare

Mr. Tucker requested, a summary of legal bills paid to Mr. Zimmerman and Mr. Truninger for the work done in conjunction with the Rezoning hearings before Cook Co. Z.B.A. winston-Centex Development.

New Business: President Hayward reported that the Chicago Area Transportation Study is to begin in the Village. (CATS)

Interviews will be sponsored by local, state, and Federal agencies. The information will all be correlated and released. The lerk was directed to contact CATS and request that interviewers notify the Police Department when they will be in our Village and who they intend to contact.

President Hayward asked if anyone in the audience had any questions. Mr. Q. Krantz said his son had been attacked by a dog

and altho it would be difficult to have a leash law, an Ordinance requiring collars with identification and rabies tags with a fine for those not complying with it, could be adopted.

Mrs. Kotz questioned the upcoming highway survey stating that many women would be reluctant to open their doors to strangers.

Every attempt will be made to get the surveyors to identify themselves properly and advance notice will be requested for the newspaper.

There being no further business a motion was heard to adjourn. Motion carried.
