H. B. Smith opened the meeting by expressing his Committee's appreciation for the attendance of the men from the Village of Barrington and following this, explaining in general terms the problem of the Village of Barrington Hills - and soliciting the help and cooperation of the Village of Barrington.

Mayor Schreiber and Chairman De Bolt readily accepted the thought of cooperation, if legal and practical.

Chief Smith indicated his yearly budget amounted to:-

Salaries	\$64,000
Other	<u>14,000</u>
Total:	\$78,000 -

his staff consisting of:-

- 4 people in the Headquarters Office
- 1 meter man
- 4 patrolmen
- 1 substitute man
- himself as Chief

a total of 11

He also indicated that using one car around the clock with 3 men on 8 hour shifts and a part-time man for vacations and days off, the cost he estimated for this unit was \$25,000 per year.

The group came to the conclusion that little would be accomplished at this initial meeting, except for the expression of a desire for cooperation and the recognition that the problem of police protection was one of prevention and in addition a community one.

Specifically, it was decided that Chief Smith and R. J. Grigsby, who generously offered his help, would meet, and with map in hand would estimate the size of the area involved, the distance on the roads, and generally come to a preliminary conclusion of the problems involved. The cost of this survey would be shared in a fair way by both Villages.

The Chief and Mr. Grigsby will set a mutually satisfactory date, and any other member in attendance would be welcome to assist. The Mayor indicated that working with Mr. Mathews, the Village of Barrington attorney, he would ascertain the legal implications and possibilities of cooperation.

The Village of Barrington Hills Committee felt that the initial meeting was most successful and fully feels that, proceeding from this point, a most satisfactory arrangement to both communities can be accomplished.
