## Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington Hills

July 25, 1977

The July meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington Hills was held on Monday, July 25, 1977.

Sharon Carrasco (Press) Charles K. Helfrick, Jr. Diedre Kieckhefer Wilbert H. Nottke A regular meeting of the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington Hills was held at 8:00 p.m. on July 25, 1977 in the Village Hall.

The meeting was called to order by President Hansen at 8:10 p.m. Roll Call. All present.

Minutes of the meeting of June 27, 1977 were submitted for approval. Motion was made by Norman Tucker and seconded by Jonathan Hamill for approval of the minutes, as corrected. Motion carried.

### FINANCE - Norman Tucker

Mr. Tucker reviewed the Treasurer's Report and noted that receipts from Kane and Lake Counties had not come in due to slow processing procedures. He also noted that, in the future, each trustee should be responsible for his monthly budget. Mr. Tucker moved for approval of the Treasurer's Report, with Mr. Hamill seconding. Motion carried.

Mr. Tucker noted that the assessed valuation is up in all four counties and, as a result, our budget figures can be considered as conservative. Cook County is up \$35,000, Lake is up \$2,000, McHenry is up \$6,000. We have not heard from Kane County to date.

Mr. Tucker stated that he expects to have copies of the completed audit available for the next meeting.

Pepper Construction Company has been contacted regarding the expenses in connection with the well and they have agreed to pay \$1,500 towards our bill.

At this time the final draft of the appropriation ordinance was presented for approval. Mr. Kempe noted that higher insurance costs should be reflected in the ordinance, and this was done. Mr. Tucker motioned for approval of the Appropriation Ordinance, as corrected, with Mr. Kempe seconding. Roll Call. 6 ayes, 0 nays. Appropriation Ordinance 77-12 adopted.

Board Members were furnished with copies of the Levy Ordinance for review and adoption at the next meeting. Mr. Tucker requested suggested changes be submitted to him by August 15, 1977, so that the ordinance can be adopted at the August meeting and filed with the respective county clerks.

Bills submitted for approval by Mr. Tucker in the amount of \$10,878.00 for administration, \$5847.43 for public safety and \$2,131.35 for court and overtime. Mr. Klein requested the addition of \$100.00 to the bills for automobile deduction on repairs to a squad car (Total bill was \$1,335.71 with the insurance covering \$1,235.71). This brought the total bills to be approved for payment to \$18,956.78. Mr. Tucker motioned for approval of the bills, with Mr. Kempe seconding. Roll Call. 5 ayes, 0 nays, 1 absent. (Mr. MacArthur had left the room for a minute) Motion carried. (Copies of lists attached.)

### BUILDING DEPARTMENT - Evan Evans

Mr. Evans noted the receipt of two bids for the remodeling work at the Village Hall. Land Custom Builders (Woodstock) bid \$21,950. which included an allowance of \$4,000 for the electrical work. Goerlitz Construction (Huntley) bid \$17,623. which includes an allowance of \$3,900. for electrical work and \$2,000. allowance for the drop-in ceiling. Mr. Evans recommended acceptance of the low bid, and in the discussion that followed, Evan was asked to specify that clean-up on the job was required. In addition, it was to be noted that any extra work to be done would be at the rate of time and material. The painting and/or wall covering and floor covering is not included in this bid.

Mr. Craig noted that a motion to waive the taking of public bids would be necessary and required a 2/3 vote for passage. Mr. Hamill made the motion and Mr. Tucker seconded. Roll Call. 6 ayes, 0 nays. Motion carried.

Mr. Craig then asked for a contract from Goerlitz which would include more specifics and to reflect that it included all work on said plan, excluding the paint and floor covering, and clean-up by contractor. Mr. Tucker motioned, with Mr. Kempe seconding, that the bid from Goerlitz for \$17,623. be accepted. Roll Call. 6 ayes, 0 nays. Motion passed.

Mr. Evans informed the trustees of a quote from Robinson Furnace Company for \$904.00 for rerouting the ductwork on the present heating and cooling system.

Mr. MacArthur cautioned that an emergency exist for the downstairs area should be provided for in the event of an emergency.

At this time Mr. Butler motioned and Mr. Hamill seconded, to authorize Mrs.Hansen and Mr. Evans to negotiate additional work and also provide for deletions, where necessary over and above the present proposal, in an amount not to exceed \$3,000. Roll Call. 6 ayes, 0 nays. Motion carried.

Mr. Evans then reported permits issued for the month of June as follows: 6 new houses, 3 pools, 2 additions, 1 garage, a patio and 2 septic repairs.

Mr. Evans noted the potential growth in the Village as a result of the new subdivisions planned, and indicated he would like to inform the Plan Commission as to the potential dangers in setting precedents on upcoming proposals.

Mr. Tucker then indicated the possible need for a special census and requested Mrs. Blanchard to contact the Census Bureau for further information as to the advisability of having a special census for MFT, Revenue Sharing and State Income Tax purposes.

### ZONING AND ENFORCEMENT - James A. Kempe

On the Schurecht matter, Mr. Kempe reported that the Village has filed suit and Mr. Schurecht has until August 3, 1977 to file a proper petition.

Attempts are being made to locate the owner of the burned-out Worley property.

In the Charles matter, they are willing to move the building which was erected in violation of the ordinance. It was reported that Mr. Worley did not appreciate reading of his violation in the newspaper prior to being informed by the Village.

Mr. Kempe reported that the July meeting of the ZBA was spent going over the codes for the purpose of recommending changes. The next meeting is scheduled for August 15, 1977 at 8 p.m. A public hearing as directed by the ZBA will be held to consider an ecological site planning ordinance and to update the zoning ordinance.

### PLANNING - Jonathan C. Hamill

Mr. Hamill reported on the Plan Commission meeting of July 11, 1977. He read a letter from Mr. Cassell which stated that the Plan Commission, following a public hearing on the matter, recommended affirmative action by the Village Board on a proposed ordinance adopting a fee structure which included all costs of review. He then reviewed Ordinance 77-13 "An Ordinance to Increase Subdivision Review and Inspection Fees by Amending Article VI E of the Subdivision Ordinance (73-8A) of the Village of Barrington Hills", and moved its adoption. Mr. MacArthur seconded. Roll Call. 6 ayes, 0 nays. Ordinance 77-13 adopted. (Copy attached.)

Plan Commission consideration of the Spring Creek Hills subdivision is continuing and suggested that board members try to attend the Plan Commission meeting of August 8, 1977 to familiarize themselves with the matter, which will probably be before the Village Board in August.

Mr. Hamill presented a proposed contract between the Village of Barrington Hills and Robert B. Teska Associates. He noted that approval would formalize the action taken at a prior board meeting to employ the Teska firm as planning consultants. Mr. Hamill motioned for approval of the contract, with Mr. MacArthur seconding. Roll Call. 6 ayes, 0 nays. Contract approved. (Copy attached.)

Mr. Hamill reported that Mrs. Hansen has appointed him Chairman of a Special Comprehensive Plan Committee to work with Mr. Teska in the development of a comprehensive plan. He has appointed four members of the Plan Commission to serve with him; Mrs. Garre and Mrs. Hurley and Mr. Douglass and Mr. Train. This provides representation from all areas of the village. A meeting schedule has been posted and all interested parties are urged to attend these meetings.

Mr. Hamill reported that the Country Oaks Subdivision has been filed in McHenry County. Also, that a letter is being sent to all Barrington realtors asking them to check the subdivision ordinance prior to the division of land in the Village.

### ROADS AND BRIDGES - John L. Butler, Jr.

Mr. Butler reported he had inspected some of the other roads with Mr. Lenzini and requested that \$3,727.80 be added to the MFT resolution, amending the total to \$26,774.15. He motioned for approval with Mr. Tucker seconding. Roll Call. 6 ayes, 0 nays. Resolution adopted.

He reported that \$20,000. in General Funds has been allocated towards making the roads safer, with particular emphasis on Ridge Road. Estimates are being made and a report will be ready for the August meeting.

Road Sign inventory is low and he has investigated the costs of a sign-making machine. Mr. Charles Helfrick suggested buying one jointly through BACOG. Mr. Butler will report further at the August meeting.

Mr. Butler is in the process of working out an agreement with General Services for clean-up and, in this connection, was asked to have a breakdown of costs for two mowings and two clean-ups per year for the August meeting.

### PUBLIC SAFETY - Alexander MacArthur and Lt. Allan K. Meyer

Mr. MacArthur reported that the resolution sent to the State of Illinois regarding the traffic hazards on Route 62 has produced results. Route 62 has been made a "no passing" zone from Route 59 to Route 25. The meeting of July 20, 1977 with the gravel trucks drivers and various transportation and State officials has been most productive.

Mr. Craig was asked to prepare an amendment to the Vehicle Sticker Ordinance increasing the fines for violation of the ordinance.

For the month, 35 accidents were recorded (25 with injuries and 4 deaths), 5 criminal damage to property, 3 burglaries, 1 theft over \$150., 4 thefts under \$150., 2 recovered stolen autos, 1 recovered stolen motorcycle and 1 case of obscene phone calls.

The Police Department responded to numerous calls concerning a rock concert on Ridge Road on July 23. Mr. A. V. Mitchell was arrested on a charge of "tumultuous conduct". Mr. MacArthur will report further.

### LEGISLATION, INSURANCE, HEALTH - Louis J. Klein, Jr.

The Village Hall building has been appraised at \$141,500. replacement value, with an insurable rate of \$138,000. This does not, however, include the proposed remodeling.

The Police Department is without police liability insurance, however, one avenue is still open and Mr. Klein is pursuing the matter. Collision and Workmen's Compensation insurance will expire September 1, and the Hartford Umbrella policy was due to expire August 1. In the absence of a letter of cancellation, it is assumed it will be renewed.

James F. Jackson & Associates are unable to supply us a letter stating the reason we have been turned down for liability insurance. Mr. Klein is presently waiting to receive a proposal for insurance coverage from Mr. Wine of J. F. Wine & Sons.

### ATTORNEY - Sydney G. Craig

Mr. Osran has filed a countersuit against the village. Mr. Craig advised that Northwest National Insurance Company will be defending the Village.

A summons has been served on the Village regarding a suit filed by Shearer, O'Brien, Blood, Agrella & Boose in a Kane County complaint for a declaratory judgment against the Village regarding the denial of rezoning on Route 25.

### ADMINISTRATION - Barbara P. Hansen

Mrs. Hansen had no BACOG report at this time.

In response to a request from the RTA, Mr. Hansen sent a reply stating that since the residents do not reap any benefits, there are few who are in favor of the RTA.

A request was made from the audience that copies of the bills be distributed with the agenda for members of the audience.

The meeting was then adjourned to Executive Session.

After the reconvening of the regular meeting there being no further business before the board, a motion was made and seconded to adjourn. Motion carried.

AN ORDINANCE TO INCREASE SUBDIVISION REVIEW AND INSPECTION FEES BY AMENDING ARTICLE VI E OF THE SUBDIVISION ORDINANCE (73-8A) OF THE VILLAGE OF BARRINGTON HILLS

BE IT ORDAINED by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington Hills, Cook, Lake, McHenry and Kane Counties, Illinois:

Section 1: That Article VI E of the Barrington Hills Subdivision Ordinance, entitled "Inspection and Review" be amended by deleting the same as follows:

### "E. INSPECTION AND REVIEW

- All required public improvements proposed to be installed under the provisions of this Ordinance shall be inspected during the course of construction by the Village Engineer and/or other qualified and authorized employees of the Village. The cost of such inspection shall be one and one-half (1 1/2) percent of actual construction cost for improvements costing \$50,000 or less, one (1) percent for improvements over \$50,000 but less than \$250,000 and three-fourths of one percent (3/4) for improvements over \$250,000. One-half of the cost of inspection shall be paid at the time of execution of the final subdivision plat by the Village President. The remaining one-half of the review cost is to be paid at the time funds are released from the subdividers guarantee of improvement completion.
- 2. The subdivider shall pay the cost of all engineering inspection services. The fee shall be the actual cost of such inspection and any work connected with soil inspection.

### SCOPE OF SERVICES

### A. The Study Area

For the purpose of this Agreement the study area is defined as the Village of Barrington Hills and all unincorporated land contiguous to and within  $l_2$  miles of the Village boundaries.

### B. The Comprehensive Plan

The CONSULTANT will assist the Village and its Special Comprehensive Plan Committee to revise and update its adopted Comprehensive Plan in accordance with the following steps:

### 1. Existing Resources and Trends

- a. The CONSULTANT will carry out an inventory and analysis of environmental resources in the study area, including geology and soils, hydrology, vegetation, wildlife, air, and scenic features. Emphasis will be placed on the assembly and interpretation of available information from environmental related sources and experts, rather than on new surveys. Such sources include the U.S. Soil Conservation Service, BACOG, Northeastern Illinois Planning Commission, Illinoise Environmental Protection Agency, State Water Survey, Cook County Forest Preserve District, Citizens for Conservation, Barrington Historical Society, and the residents of Barrington Hills.
- b. The CONSULTANT will carry out an inventory and analysis of existing <u>land uses</u>, including agriculture, developed uses, and open space uses. Consideration will be given to sites or buildings worthy of landmark designation. Sources of information include aerial photographs, BACOG, field reconnaissance, and residents of the Village.

- transportation systems serving the community, the plans and programs of state and county highway departments, impacts of system usage, and the needs of Barrington area residents.

  Consideration will be given to the existing character of roadways in the Village, their ability to accommodate traffic, and their contribution to the countryside environment.
- d. The CONSULTANT will review existing governmental <u>services</u>
  and <u>utilities</u>, or private systems where applicable, to determine their effect on the comprehensive planning process. These will include schools, water supply, waste disposal, recreation, public safety, fire protection, etc.
- e. The CONSULTANT will review and evaluate existing <u>plans</u> and <u>ordinances</u> of Barrington Hills, BACOG, adjacent villages, related counties, and the Northeastern Illinois Planning Commission to determine their applicability and appropriateness to the Village.
- f. The CONSULTANT will review and evaluate <u>development trends</u> in the Village of Barrington Hills, the study area, and the region to identify important population, economic, and improvement factors influencing the comprehensive planning process.
