MEETING OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES VILLAGE OF BARRINGTON HILLS August 22, 1966

The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington Hills was called to order by the President, Mr. Thomas Z. Hayward, at 7:30 PM Monday, August 22, 1966 at the Countryside School, Brinker and County Line Roads, Barrington Hills, Illinois. The roll call showed the following Trustees present:

Raymond J. Grigsby John J. McLaughlin Richard S. Pepper John I. Shaw Leslie T. Welsh Austin M. Zimmerman

The following were also present:

Ralph Hummel - Chief of Police
David Truninger - Attorney
Norman Tucker - Treasurer
William Renshaw - Acting Supt. of Public Works

Minutes of the meeting of July 18th having been read by the Trustees prior to the meeting, the President asked for additions or corrections. The Clerk was directed to change the last sentence on page 4 to read: "Mr. Husted stated that since the last bond issue, it was a policy of the Village of Carpentersville not to sell water rights outside the corporate limits of the Village of Carpentersville." The second line on page 5 should read: "said he interpreted it as a policy restriction not a legal restriction." Thereupon, the minutes were approved as corrected.

The regular order of business was suspended, with the consent of the Board, in order to hear from Mr. Clifford Cherry, 88 Dundee Lane. Mr. Cherry spoke to the Board relative to a Resolution adopted by Barrington Lakes, Inc. which urged the adoption of an ordinance by the Village of Barrington Hills to provide for licensing of dogs for a fee, and requiring rabies inoculations, and which would also provide the necessary authority

for the police to impound stray dogs. Mr. Cherry read the letter which had been sent to the President care of the Clerk but which had not been received by the Clerk. After thorough discussion, the Board adopted Mr. Grigsby's suggestion that the matter be referred to the Public Safety Committee for study and report. The Clerk asked Mr. Cherry to send her a copy of the letter and Resolution. The Chair thanked Mr. Cherry for bringing the matter to the Board's attention.

The regular order of business was resumed. The Treasurer gave his report, copy of which is attached to and made a part of these minutes. After discussion, the report was approved. The Treasurer also presented the audit of the Motor Fuel Tax funds for 1965.

Mr. Welsh, Chairman of the Finance Committee, presented the proposed Levy Ofdinance for fiscal year 1966-67. The Board referred it to the Law Committee which in turn recommended its adoption. Motion was made and seconded that the proposed Levy Ordinance be adopted. After full discussion, the Trustees present voted unanimously by roll call vote for adoption of Ordinance 66-4 and the Clerk was directed to file same with the four County Clerks pursuant to statute.

Mr. Pepper presented the following bills:

Liberty Asphalt - Road work over and above contract 126.56 Cuba Township - mowing weeds 244.80 William Renshaw - 537 miles @ 8¢ per mile 42.96

Motion was made and seconded that payment of the above bills be approved. During the discussion, the Board asked the Chairman of the Public Safety Committee to discuss with Bob Burrow Chevrolet the practicality of raising the rent for the squad cars in order for Burrows to bear the cost of the Comprehensive ACD Collission insurance which the Board said should be his expense. The Board approved payment of all the above bills by a unanimous roll call vote. Mr. Pepper then asked the Board for its approval to release a check to Liberty Asphalt for general road work in the amount of \$12,591.45 which had been approved at the April 25th meeting to be paid out of the 1965-66 corporate funds, but was being held by the Treasurer until Mr. Pepper should ask for its release when all the work had been satisfactorily completed. After discussion, the Board voted its unanimous approval for said release.

Mr. Grigsby, Chairman of the Public Safety Committee, reported that Officer Zons had resigned as of July 26th, and that Chief Hummel is requesting the appointment of Alfred Schuld, Jr. at a salary of \$425.00 a month for six months with an increase at the end of that time to \$450.00 a month if his work is satisfactory. After discussion, the appointment of Officer Schuld was confirmed unanimously by the Board, his work to start September 1st, unless Chief Hummel notifies the clerk to the contrary. Mr. Zimmerman suggested the Chief consider having a squad car patrol Rt. 62

between 7:00 and 9:00 AM to try to halt speeding and tail-gating by gravel trucks.

Mr. Pepper, Chairman of the Roads and Bridges Committee, reported that the roads are in good shape and should require only a minimum amount of expense for the rest of the year. He also advised that permits had been issued for two new homes.

Mr. Renshaw reported that he had talked to the owners of the Everett property and that they had said they are continuing to clean up their property on Helm Road. Regarding the Frisbee property on Spring Creek Road, Mr. Truninger wrote to Mr. Frisbee. Mr. Frisbee wrote Mr. Grebe of the Barrington Fire Department asking that they clean up the property for him. Mr. Grebe has to obtain authority from McHenry County. Appropriate action is being taken in the matter. Regarding the Shcurecht property on Braeburn Road, Mr. Truninger wrote to Mr. Schurecht but has not heard from him. Mr. Welsh asked about the Noxious Weed control Ordinance. The Clerk advised that the usual procedure is for complaints to be submitted to her in writing and that she then writes the property owner to advise him that action must be taken.

The Health Committee had no report.

The Zoning and Planning Committee and the Law Committee presented a joint report. Mr. Shaw advised that several joint meetings had been held regarding the petition by Lyle Ritzenthaler as agent for the Cosmopolitan National Bank of Chicago for annexation, Light Industrial Zoning and for certain variations therein of certain described properties formerly known as the Transolene property. The Board had referred said petition to the Zoning Board of Appeals for public hearing and recommendation. They held a Public Hearing on the matter July 19th, 1966. Mr. Zimmerman read

the recommendation of the Zoning Board of Appeals, copy of which is attached to and made a part of these minutes. Mr. Zimmerman also strongly advised that the Light Industrial section of the Zoning Ordinance be amended to make it quite plain that the Village does not intend to permit general wharehousing in Industrial districts. In this connection, Mr. Zimmerman had asked the petioners to submit a letter to the Board defining what they are doing and intend to do with the property. Mr. Zimmerman then read a letter he had received from Mr. Harry D. Strouse, counsellor for Mr. Ritzenthaler, which outlined their intent. This letter is attached to and made a part of these minutes. The President of Alabar Corporation whose property adjoins the above mentioned property, has had the letter read to him and has agreed to its content. Mr. Zimmerman then moved that the Board act upon the petition to annex certain described lands of the Alabar Corporation, contingent upon annexation of the Ritzenthaler property. The motion was seconded. the ensuing discussion, it was brought out that the proposed granting of Light Industrial zoning to the Ritzenthaler property after annexation was the lesser of two evils because said property is presently to be zoned for heavy industry under Lake County's recent zoning plans. After further discussion, Mr. Zimmerman withdrew his motion.

Motion was then made and seconded that the Board adopt an ordinance granting the petition by Alabar Corporation for annexation of certain described territory to the village. The motion was seconded. The proposed ordinance was read to the Board, and, after discussion, was adopted unanimously by roll call vote. The Chair declared Ordinance No. 66-5 had been adopted.

Mr. Zimmerman then moved adoption of an ordinance pursuant to the recommendation of the Zoning Board of Appeals to annex certain described territory known as the Ritzenthaler property.

The motion was seconded. The proposed ordinance was read to the Board. After discussion, the motion was adopted unanimously by roll call vote. The President declared Ordinance No. 66-6 had been adopted.

Mr. Zimmerman also moved adoption of an ordinance pursuant to the recommendation of the Zoning Board of Appeals to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Village to re-zone certain described property known as the Ritzenthaler property to Light Industry. The motion was seconded. Mr. Zimmerman read the proposed ordinance to the Board, and, after discussion, the ordinance was adopted unanimously by roll call vote. The Chair announced that Ordinance No. 66-7 had been adopted and directed that the annexations, together with proper maps, be filed with the proper county authorities.

The President read a letter regarding the proposed Youth Council. The matter was referred to the Public Safety Committee. He also reported on a meeting with Mr. Rezny of Commonwealth Edison Company regarding a proposed Light Industry development south of our village. Mr. Hayward had suggested that Mr. Rezny contact Mr. McLaughlin, Chairman of the Plan Commission.

Under the order of new business, Mr. Zimmerman said that a gas utility company has negotiated an easement through the Dawes property on Plum Tree road without consulting the village. After discussion, the Board asked the Attorney to contact Mr. Dawes to learn the identity of the gas company involved and then to contact them regarding a permit for work they may contemplate doing in the village.

There being no further business, meeting adjourned.

Gentlemen:

Enclosed are findings of fact and recommendation of the Zoning Board of Appeals with respect to petition for annexation and rezoning of the so-called Transolene property situated in the County of Lake, public hearing with respect to which was held by the Zoning Board of Appeals pursuant to notice on July 19, 1966.

In its findings of fact and recommendation the Zoning Board of Appeals considered the request of petitioner in said petition that in addition to rezoning to "Light Industrial District" if annexed, it be given the additional right "to use said land for contractors vehicles, equipment, machinery and bulk materials storage yard and inside warehousing."

The Zoning Board of Appeals, of course, has no jurisdiction to make any recommendation for rezoning except within the scope of permitted uses set forth in the Zoning Ordinance with respect to Light Industrial District.

Public hearing was held by the Zoning Board of Appeals of the Village of Barrington Hills pursuant to notice as provided by law at the school building of Community Consolidated School District No. 1 located at West County Line Road and Brinker Road, Barrington Hills, Illinois, on Tuesday, July 19, 1966, at the hour of 8:00 p.m., upon the petition of Cosmopolitan National Bank of Chicago, a national banking association, Trustee under Trust Agreement dated March 3, 1958, and known as Trust Number 7373, by Lyle Ritzenthaler, Agent, owner of the following described premises located within the County of Lake and State of Illinois:

PARCEL 1: The Northerly fifty (50) feet of uniform width of that part of the North East Quarter of Section 34, lying immediately South of and adjoining the right-of-way of the Chicago and North-western Railway Company, in Township 43 North, Range 9, East of the Third Principal Meridian, all in Lake County, Illinois:

PARCEL 2: All that part of Lot 21 described as all that part of the North East Quarter of Section 34, Township 43 North, Range 9, East of the Third Principal Meridian described as follows: Commencing One Hundred (100) feet West from and at right angles to the East line of said Section and Fifty (50) feet South Westerly and at right angles from the South Westerly line of the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad Company's right-of-way; thence Northwesterly parallel to said South Westerly line of said right-of-way seven hundred fifty (750) feet; thence South Westerly and at right angles to the last described line, four hundred (400) feet; thence South Easterly parallel with said South Westerly line of said rightof-way, seven hundred fifty (750) feet thence North Easterly and at right angles to said last described line, four hundred (400) feet to the

place of beginning, all in Lake County, Illinois:

PARCEL 3: A strip of land sixteen and a half (16-1/2) feet wide extending over and across the North East Quarter of the North East Quarter of Section 34. Township 43 North, Range 9. East of the Third Principal Meridian said strip lying between two (2) lines both parallel with the center line of the Northerly or East-bound main track of the Chicago and Northwestern Railway Company as said main track is now located and established one (1) of said lines being fifty six (56) feet South Westerly, measured at right angle and the other one (1) being distant seventy two and a half (72-1/2) feet South Westerly measured at right angles from said center line of said main track, all in Lake County, Illinois:

PARCEL 4: That part of the East Half of the South East Quarter of Section 27, Township 43 North, Range 9, East of the Third Principal Meridian, which lies South Westerly of a line parallel with and distant 56' South Westerly measured at right angles from the center line of a track of the Chicago, St. Paul and Fond du Lac Railroad Company, now Chicago and Northwestern Railway; said track center line being the center line of the North Easterly or South-bound main track. as located and established on May 12, 1954, of the Chicago and Northwestern Railway Company. Said premises, conveyed hereby, are likewise described as follows: That part of the East Half of the South East Quarter of Section 27, Township 43 North, Range 9, East of the Third Principal Meridian, in Lake County, Illinois, described as follows: Commencing at the South West Corner of the East Half of the South East Quarter of Section 27, thence Northerly along the West line of the said East Half of the said South East Quarter a distance of 372.82' to a point, thence South Easterly parallel to the Chicago and Northwestern Railway Company's right-of-way a distance of 671.13' to a point, which point lies in the South line of said Section 27, thence West along said South line of said Section 27 a distance of 558.68' to the place of beginning, in Lake County, Illinois;

for annexation to the Village of Barrington Hills and rezoning.

Having heard and carefully considered the statements of counsel for petitioner and the sworn testimony of said Lyle Ritzenthaler in support of said petition, no one having appeared in opposition to said petition, and being fully advised in the premises, the Zoning Board of Appeals, by unanimous vote of its five (5) members present at a meeting at which said vote was taken, makes the following findings of fact and recommendation to the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington Hills:

- 1. Existing use of property within the general area of the property in question is residential. However, the property in question abuts the tracks of the Chicago and North Western Railway and is presently improved by structures usable only for light industrial or business purposes.
- 2. Zoning classifications of property within the general area of the property in question are varied.
- 3. The property in question appears to be unsuitable for the uses permitted under the zoning classification Rl, Single-Family Residence District, for which it would be zoned if annexed to the Village of Barrington Hills.
- 4. The trend of development, if any, in the general area of the property in question is toward zoning classifications less restrictive than Rl. Single-Family Residence District.
- 5. The adoption of an amendment to the Zoning Ordinance of the Village of Barrington Hills rezoning the above-described premises if annexed to said Village as a portion of the "Light Industrial District" would be in the public interest and not solely for the interest of petitioner.

Based upon the foregoing facts the Zoning Board of Appeals by its vote as aforesaid recommends to the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington Hills that in the event the above-described property shall be annexed to the Village of Barrington Hills, an amendment to the Zoning Ordinance of the Village of Barrington Hills be enacted rezoning the above-described premises as "Light Industrial District."

In re: Conditional Annexation to Transolene Property

Gentlemen:

Please be advised that I have received a copy of the recommendations of the Zoning Board of Appeals of Barrington Hills in connection with the above property. It is my understanding that you are further interested in a letter indicating the use of said property now contemplated by the owners. I have discussed this with them and report the following:

- 1. All present use would be light industrial as provided in the portion of the zoning ordinance furnished us. This would include outside storage of motor vehicles and certain equipment regularly used by Roadhome Construction Company in its business, including trucks, blacktop paving machines, steam rollers, road graders, crawler tractors, asphalt distributors, trailers and similar pieces of equipment.
- 2. Further, there will be outside storage of material other than asphalt or asphalt products. The outside material will be gravel of various types. It will be stored in a three sided bin between 6 and 8 feet high made of concrete, concrete block, timber or other related material. They would be located with reasonable access to present parking facilities and not within 50 feet of any boundry. Total storage bin space will not exceed an area 20 feet by 45 feet.

3. Other buildings will be used for storage of material by various leasees. At the present time, Chicago Metallic Products are storing cardboard cartons of their manufactured product in one of the buildings. Another smaller storage area will hold carpeting and carpet liners used by a small installer in his regular business. There will be other storage or warehousing use all of an inside nature.

I trust this is the information you required.
