Gentlemen:

As Secretary of the Board of Education of High School District 224, Barrington, I have been instructed to write to you concerning rezoning of a tract of land containing 81.2 acres between Fairhaven Estates and Jewel Park on Route 59, north of Barrington, a hearing of which is scheduled to be before your Commission on Wednesday, March 27.

It is our information that the proposed rezoning will increase the potential density, in that the areas now zoned Residential 1 acre (40,000 square feet), and it is proposed that it will be broken down into 10,000 and 15,000 square foot lots should the developers' proposal be approved by your Commission and later the Village Board. Such a reduction in the size of the minimum square foot requirements will more than double the density; in fact, it will be somewhere between an increase of four and three times the present approved density. As such, it will have an adverse impact on the finances of District 224, within whose boundary the tract is located in its entirety.

District 224 has experienced a declining assessed valuation per pupil for the last ten years. In 1960, the assessed valuation per pupil was \$67,000 and, by 1967, this had declined to \$49,000. The decline in the assessed valuation per pupil has amounted to as much as 10% per year; at the same time the District is experiencing a 10% to 12% annual increase in student body. This means that each year we are faced with a larger student body to support on a smaller tax base per student. The inevitable result is a declining expenditure per child, or increase in tax rates, or both. Since the current assessed valuation per child is \$49,000, this means that any house with a sale price of less than \$90,000 (which would be assessed at something like \$50,000 under a 55% assessment) would reduce the assessed valuation per child in the District taking into account the average family. This is a fact that is not generally understood. Accordingly, even if a house is built on the tract in question, which sells for \$50,000, this will be assessed at something in the neighborhood of \$25,000 to \$30,000 and will materially reduce our assessed valuation per pupil.

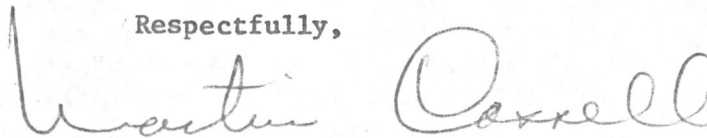

We can anticipate an average of 2½ children per house. If the house sells for \$50,000, it will take all of the taxes from that house for two years to support the child one year in high school. In other words, it would take all of the taxes from this \$50,000 house for ten years to provide the cost of educating one child in the high school alone and, of course, this child will also be spending eight or nine years in the elementary district, so that you would have to take all of the taxes for the foreseeable life of the house in order to support the original children. However, in this time of mobile population, we can anticipate that at about the time the present children get through school the family will move and be replaced with another family of school-age children, so that a \$50,000 house will probably never pay off the education cost of its inhabitants - and, of course, the school districts do not get 100% of the taxes - which makes our potential recovery even more remote.

It is for this reason that we wish to call your attention to the fact that more than doubling the potential density of the area in question will more than double the tax deficit of the Barrington schools. This is particularly critical at the present time when schools are not only experiencing the rapid increase in student body, but are also experiencing a rapid increase in the cost of goods and service.

Dear Mr. Hartlaub:

I have been asked to convey, on behalf of Community Consolidated School District 4, our grave concern with the potential rezoning relative to the 81.2 acres between Fairhaven Estates and Jewel Park.

The problem of an ever increasing school population coupled with an ever decreasing assessed valuation per pupil will be compounded if your commission acts favorably upon the petition to be presented by Mr. Schlachter.

The community has become increasingly sensitive to increasing taxes as evidenced by the numerous bond referendums recently held by Districts 224 and 4.

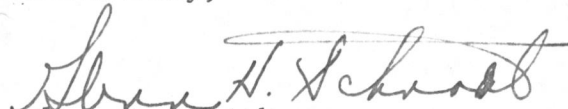
Let me give you a concrete example of what increased density can mean to our school district. Our family had three children enrolled in District 4 last year. Thirty-nine per cent of our \$661.00 tax bill was distributed to District 4 or \$257.00. The \$614.00 per pupil cost multiplied by three (\$1842.00), reduced by thirty per cent, which represents State Aid, leaves a deficit figure of \$1032.40. This is not a unique example but it illustrates how our district's financial problem is made increasingly complex.

We ask that you not compound that problem by relaxing existing zoning requirements.

We further suggest a careful review be made of the tract before final acceptance to be sure that adequate provision has been made for the children's safety as they walk to school.

Finally, we urge that an agreement be reached with the developer of this project whereby development will span five years giving this community some opportunity to prepare for the youngsters which this development will ultimately provide.

Dear Larry:

Thank you for advising us about the proposed annexation of the property to the North of Jewel Park. We discussed this at our Plan Commission Meeting last night.

We would strongly urge you to oppose this annexation under the terms proposed.

Specifically, as you are well aware, the proposal calls for a substantial reduction in the zoning - from 5 acres to home sites of 10,000 and 15,000 sq. ft. Such sites, in our opinion would not be compatible with the surrounding areas.

Fairhaven, a fine home area, is an acre development. Those home sites in Jewel Park, which will be on the edge of the proposed subdivision, are generally quite sizable. To the East and West, I believe, the areas are currently 2 to 5 acres. Sandwiching 10 to 15,000 foot lots in the midst of this hardly seems reasonable.

Generally, homes developed on smaller sites are lower in value. We can only assume that this would be the case in the proposed subdivision. It would be very unlikely that they would generate sufficient tax revenue to pay for the increased burden on the school system. 187 home sites would probably add a minimum of 360 pupils to the school system or four times the number that would occur under the prevailing 5 acre zoning.

Considering the above, such a development would appear to be a liability to the community. First, it would downgrade the general area, possibly hurting property values of present homeowners. Secondly, it would undoubtedly put a financial burden on the total community with homes that would not pay their way in school tax revenue.

We note also, Larry, that a good part of the site is in a flood plain area. We assume, if an annexation does take place - hopefully with more zoning

than that proposed - that the flood plain area will be preserved in some form.

We have passed the feeling of our Plan Commission to our Village Board. Presumably, they will formally advise your village of our concern over this proposed annexation.

As President of the North Barrington Association, and on behalf of Cuba Township residents who are voluntary members of this Association, I appreciate the opportunity to make the following statement as a part of the public hearing by your commission on March 27 at 8:00 P.M. in the Village Hall, Barrington, Illinois. This hearing relates to a proposal to change the zoning of 81.2 acres located on the east side of Highway 59 immediately north of Jewel Park.

The North Barrington Association and property owners in Cuba Township seek to maintain the high level of land use and development that has been established by the Lake County Zoning Ordinance and by the various communities in this area. These residents have purchased and developed valuable properties because of the unique living values offered by the general character and nature of this area. The control of population density and land use through restrictions established by zoning ordinances, municipal codes and other recognized means have helped to provide and maintain the value of properties located in the Barrington area.

The proposed change in zoning of this property to permit the addition of 187 homes will:

1. Create a severe traffic hazard on a busy two-lane highway and thereby impair public safety.
2. Place an additional enrollment burden on the Barrington schools with resulting further tax increases.
3. Adversely affect the value of residential properties immediately adjoining this area.

We commend the Village of Barrington for its support of the comprehensive study of the entire Barrington area and for its favorable action toward a planned program of area development.

Rather than permit a change to 10,000 and 15,000 square foot lot sizes as requested by the petitioner in this hearing, we urge that you maintain the present zoning classification for one (1) acre minimum lot sizes.

Dear Sirs:

The Timberlake Civic Association representing over 172 residential and property interests of Cuba Township asks that the annexation and rezoning petition of the LaSalle National Bank of Chicago, Illinois (as trustee under Trust #22322) be denied for the following described property.

The northwest quarter (NW $\frac{1}{4}$) of the North-east quarter (NE $\frac{1}{4}$) and the north-east quarter (NE $\frac{1}{4}$) of the north-west quarter (NW $\frac{1}{4}$) all in Section thirty-six (36), Township forty-three (43) North, Range nine (9) East of the Third Principal Meridian in Lake County, Illinois.

The Petitioner requests the Village of Barrington to annex said land according to zoning requirements (5 acres) subject to it being understood and agreed that the final zoning will be R-6 (15,000 sq. ft. lots) for the first 400 feet of land lying north of the south line between Hwy. 59 on the west and Lake Zurich Road on the east. The balance of land to be zoned R-7 (10,000 sq. ft. lots).

This property is located immediately north of Jewel Park and under the petitioners proposal, the parcel of land which consists of 81.2 acres would be divided into 187 building sites.

The public hearing will be held on Wednesday, March 27, 1968, at 8:00 P.M. at the Village Chambers, 206 S. Hough Street, Barrington, Illinois.

The reasons for our denial request on the above property are as follows:

1. Public health and safety would be jeopardized by the tremendous increase in density should the 15,000 and 10,000 sq. foot lot zoning be approved. Local highways cannot safely handle increased traffic pressures.
2. Local schools, elementary and high school, cannot accommodate additional enrollments of pupils to follow increased residential density.
3. Will result in an increase of the tax burden for both school districts.

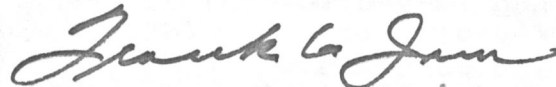

Dear Mr. Heninger:

In response to your letter of March 16, we are pleased to submit this proposal to develop a program for the business district of Barrington.

This program will consist of three steps, as follows:

1. Traffic Circulation

We will develop plans for relieving traffic congestion in the business district first by measures which can be accomplished quickly and inexpensively. These may include control of curb parking, installation of traffic signals, restrictions on turning movements, possibly one-way traffic routings and similar traffic engineering measures. The second step to relieve congestion will be measures to reduce the traffic concentration aimed at the heart of the business area. This may involve the designation of new arterial streets or relatively simple street widening or extentions.

This study of the downtown area should not concern itself with the development of a city-wide arterial street plan. Even so, the development of a circulation system at the downtown area should consider opportunities and needs on a city-wide basis. Also, in dealing with the whole matter of circulation, the nature and timing of metropolitan highway development should be investigated to determine when and to what extent the through movement at downtown Barrington will be reduced as a result of the construction of metropolitan highways elsewhere.

2. Parking

The development of automobile parking facilities should be an important part of the downtown program. Our study, therefore, should develop recommendations regarding location of parking facilities, their size, their layout, how they should be regulated, and how they may be financed. Costs of the proposed parking system should be evaluated in comparison with Barrington's financial resources.

3. Form of the Business Community

As the traffic circulation system is being planned and the location for parking facilities selected, various effects are being exerted upon the growth and form of the business area. Consequently, such traffic planning work should be guided by a generalized land-use concept for the business area.

Until the analysis being made for the BADC has clarified issues and presented guides for policy decisions, it would not be possible now to define size, function, form and similar qualities of downtown Barrington on a long-range basis. It should, however, be possible to establish principles to guide its development over the short term, pending consideration to broader issues which will effect its long-range position. As a part of our study, therefore, we would seek to define short-range developmental goals, defining in principle the various types of actions that will lead in the desired direction.

In executing the proposed study, we will first carry out the field work including parking studies, traffic counts, origin-destination studies and the like. As soon as we have reached tentative conclusions, they will be discussed with you and other concerned Village officials. When we have obtained the local reactions we will prepare our recommendations in report

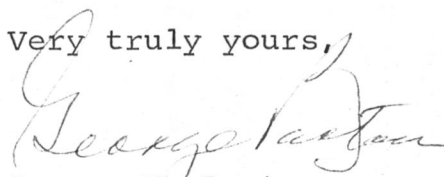

form, submitting 25 copies. We will be in a position to undertake this assignment within 10 days after we receive authorization. Thereafter, 90 days would be needed to collect data, analyze it and present our findings in report form. Our fee for this service would be \$4,300.

In addition to the program for the downtown area, you have asked whether this would be an appropriate time for updating the master plan for the Village. It is our feeling that the Village plan should reflect the facts and decisions which would be the outgrowth of the BADC study of development potentials. Therefore, we believe that the updating of the master plan should be deferred until the work being done under the leadership of BADC is farther advanced.

I hope that this proposal meets your needs. If it does not, please call me so that it can be modified in accordance with your requirements.

Dear Mr. Meyers:

I wrote you on August 26th, 1967, about the large number of grass fires along the railroad right-of-way. You replied on August 28th that the matter was being referred to your Mr. J. W. Alsop. To date I have not heard from Mr. Alsop.

The situation this spring has been worse than ever, probably as a result of no snow cover, and represents a very serious situation. The fire department has responded to innumerable calls at a cost of thousands of dollars. As this was just in our district, I imagine that the cost to all fire districts along your tracks has been immense.

The Village of Barrington is concerned about the matter as we use their facilities and man-power, and there is the possibility that the men will be fighting a grass fire at the time of a village fire call. Furthermore, the frequent use of fire equipment presents an unusual traffic hazard.

I believe that the problem demands positive action by someone in your organization. It is the considered judgment of all people I have talked to that most fires are caused by sparks from the locomotives, and that spark arrester screens would alleviate the problem. There are probably other solutions, such as keeping the right-of-way free of weeds and grass, cleaner engines, etc.

As a result of the many recent fires the fire district's tax levy will be increased which will increase your taxes. Furthermore, we feel the added burden to other taxpayers is rather unfair, and that unless you initiate some corrective action the district should explore the possibility of legal means to force corrective measures.

I will appreciate hearing from someone as to what is being done or considered. Thank you for your interest.

YMCA Formally Launched; Director Nominations Due

Nominees to the Countryside YMCA Board of Directors Monday will be announced to supporters of a "Y" organization for the far Northwest suburbs.

Advisor Herman Hertog of the Chicago Metropolitan YMCA this week said a report of a 32-man nominating committee will be sent out to 650 supporters who have pledged financial support and participation.

They will elect directors, chairman, vice chairman and secretary from the slate of nominations at a "Founder's Day" program at 8 p.m. May 9 at Barrington High School.

THE MEETING will formally mark the founding of the "Y"

organization, which will serve communities of northwest Cook and southwest Lake counties.

In January, the Chicago Metropolitan YMCA agreed to advise and lend facilities to an ad hoc group of residents after financial pledge card showed strong commitment.

Howard K. Hill of Barrington is heading up a charter membership drive. He is seeking supporters who will pledge an annual \$100 contribution to the first four operating budgets with agreement to elect and serve on the board of directors.

BOTH TYPES of support qualify a resident as a governing member.

The membership drive is under way in north and northwest Arlington Heights, Barrington, Barrington Hills, Deer Park, Forest Lake, Hawthorne Woods, Inverness, Kildeer, Lake Barrington, Lake Zurich, North Barrington, Palatine, Rolling Meadows, South Barrington and Tower Lakes.

Residents are also seeking annual pledges of less than \$100 from supporters who do not wish to participate in the organizational work.

Air Cleared on Pollution

Problem is 'Local' But . . .

It was a fine color movie, "Ill Winds on a Sunny Day."

It started off showing a victim of emphysema lying in a hospital bed and ended with President Johnson's voice pleading for clean air against a backdrop of a smoke - and - haze-shrouded White House.

In between there were many dramatic sequences of society's burning wastes billowing smoke into the air, sequences filmed amid the skyscrapers of Chicago and New York and amidst the towering mountains of Missoula, Mont.

WATCHING ALL this were the members of the Northwest Municipal Conference (NWMC) meeting at Wheeling for a monthly get-together, this one devoted to the problem of air pollution.

In the film they heard interviews with other governmental officials and with doctors and housewives who related various aspects of the problem.

And the problem was given a price tag in the film of \$11 million a year, just to take care of the effect air pollution has on "things" - cattle, plants, buildings, etc.

"The toll in human illness cannot be calculated," the film said.

THEN CAME that oft-stated air pollution axiom, "State and local government must take the initiative" in tackling the problem.

So the NWMC members turned to Albert J. Mullins, director of the Cook County Air Pollution Control Board, and asked him just how they were to seize that initiative.

His answers conveyed three underlying points.

First, "local" enforcement will be done by the county and the state until such time as the various municipalities or any combination thereof can show they have the manpower and equipment to operate their own

detection and enforcement program.

SECOND, THE staff for and operation of such a program would cost a sizeable chunk of money.

Third, the Northwest suburban area is going to get about as much attention, so far as the county officials are concerned, as a penny-ante poker player in a Las Vegas casino.

And this will continue to be the case so long as the major violators are to the south and west ends of the county.

The most positive endorsement of the evening followed the suggestion by NWMC chairman Ted Scanlon, Wheeling village president, that the county pollution control agency might send its mobile air monitoring unit into this area to "see just how we stand . . . At no cost to the municipalities."

Mullins' answer was that the county "would certainly attempt to help" in a program such as

that "within the limitations of staff and priorities."

SCHAUMBURG Village Pres. Robert Atcher also asked how a municipality could check out a plant planning to relocate in that municipality as to its air pollution potential or lack of it.

Mullins said that if the company has a similar plant operating in the state, information on its pollution problem and attempts being made to remedy it can be obtained from the state.

As for plants coming in from outside the state, "They're not going to bring in samples of the particulates coming out of their smokestacks," said Atcher.

Mullins agreed, but pointed out that a study of the processes involved in the plant's operation can provide an idea of its pollution potential.

The conference next will meet April 24 in Buffalo Grove, where expressway routes will be the primary topic.

Tax Rates Soar

Lake County taxpayers this year will hand out close to \$10 million more than last year, it was learned today.

That is a 15.5 per cent increase.

The highest increase in taxes for city, county, school and other units was 99.4 cents per \$100 — or \$99.40 per \$10,000 — assessed valuation in District 67, Lake Forest, Shields Township.

The greatest decrease was 2.9 cents per \$100 — or \$2.90 per \$10,000 assessed valuation in

District 96, Long Grove, Vernon Township.

District 61, Waukegan, had an increase of 54.8 cents per \$100 — \$54.80 per \$10,000.

Highland Park's eight districts all had increases — from \$56.60 to \$97.40 per \$10,000.

Antioch District 34 had an increase of \$54.90 per \$10,000. Fox Lake's three districts had increases ranging from \$51.30 to \$63.20 per \$10,000.

Grayslake's two districts had increases of \$18.60 and \$29.40 per \$10,000.

Mundelein's four districts had hikes of \$12.40 to \$27.10. And

Wauconda District No. 113 had an increase of \$5.60.

There will be a few thousand more taxpayers this year and the total valuation of property in the county is up almost \$50 million.

What new tax rate means for most Waukegan property owners:

The total city, county, school and other taxes for property owners living in Waukegan Grade School District will be increased 54.8 cents for each \$100 of assessed valuation. This would be \$54.80 on an \$18,000. (Continued on Page 6, Col. 7)

house which would normally be assessed at \$10,000.

Meanwhile, the percentage of the tax tab for schools will be higher and all but four of the dozens of school districts in the county will have a higher tax rate.

Lowell Wirth, tax extension expert under Lake County Clerk Truman G. Gerretsen, released the statistics on tax extensions to The Waukegan News-Sun today.

The total tax bill for Lake County, Wirth said, will be \$73,924,228.

That is \$9,911,872 more than last year's \$640,012,356.

Lake County, he said, has 249,347 taxpayers this year — up 3,222 from last year's 246,125.

The total valuation of all property — real estate and personal property — in the county this year is \$1,391,656,689.

That is \$48,593,879 more than last year's \$1,343,062,810.

Wirth said that \$52,137,472 will go to the county's grade and high schools.

The amount, he said, represents an increase of \$6,675,033 from last year's \$45,462,440.

"That's a 14.7 per cent increase," he pointed out.

Based on the entire tax levy,

it means that 70.7 per cent of the tax dollars will go to the schools.

Both real estate assessments and personal property assessment will be up this year.

So, too, will be personal property assessments of telephone and telegraph companies — but assessments of railroad property is down.

New real estate assessments are \$1,191,545,415 — an increase of \$39,406,495.

Personal property assessments are \$174,285,840 — up \$3,976,563.

For telephone and telegraph companies, the new personal property assessments total \$19,289,865 — an increase of \$327,820.

But for railroad property assessments, the total is \$8,535,569 — a decrease of \$116,999.

Cost Of County Govt.

Lake County's 18 township supervisors get a wide range of salaries and expenses.

The highest got \$22,553 in 1967. The lowest got \$6,643.

Four of them received at least \$15,000. Ten others got at least \$10,000, leaving four in the below-\$10,000 bracket.

The 18 supervisors and the 19 assistant supervisors form the Lake County Board of Supervisors and the board of commissioners of the Lake County Forest Preserve District.

But the assistant supervisors are far down the salary line because they do not get paid, too,

by their townships — as the full supervisors do.

The total "take" of the supervisors was figured by The Waukegan News-Sun on the basis of their annual township salaries, their daily pay and mileage for attending board and committee meetings, their membership on key agencies like the county liquor commission and board of review and their convention expenses.

The top salary — \$22,553 — went to Antioch Township Supervisor Lloyd E. Murrie, the County Board chairman.

And two-thirds of it — \$14,900 — came in his role as county liquor commission chairman, which Illinois law prescribes is the only real way to pay a County Board chairman.

Murrie got \$7,000 as township supervisor and the rest for board meetings, mileage and trips.

Second in salaries was Cuba Township Supervisor Joseph P. Welch, chairman of the county board of review, who received \$21,505.

Welch received \$11,800 as township supervisor and \$7,875 as review board chairman.

No. 3 was Wauconda Township Supervisor Robert J. Dickson.

He got \$18,066 — \$8,400 from his township, \$4,272 for board and committee meetings, \$3,207 for liquor commission and \$1,770 for conventions and trips.

Libertyville Township Supervisor Guy L. Grinnell received \$17,125 — including \$10,000 from his township, \$3,540 for board and committee meetings and \$2,871 for liquor commission.

Fifth on the list was Benton Township Supervisor Kenneth A. Henke, who got \$14,807.

That included \$8,500 from his township, \$3,084 for board and committee meetings and \$2,514 for liquor commission.

Warren Township Supervisor Robert W. Depke was sixth on the list with a total of \$13,826.

Included was \$7,000 from his township, \$4,014 for board and committee meetings and \$2,312 for conventions and trips.

Next was Grand Township Su-

pervisor Frank Valenta, who received \$13,280.

That included \$9,000 from his township and \$4,164 for board and committee meetings.

Waukegan Township Supervisor August P. Cepon received \$13,183.

Included was his \$11,000 township salary and \$1,782 for board and committee meetings.

Rounding out the top 10 were Supervisors Ronald R. Coles, Lake Villa Township, and Harry Knigge, Ela Township.

They got \$12,984 and \$11,881, respectively.

Included in the Coles total was \$7,500 from his township, \$3,821 for board and committee meetings and \$1,044 for conventions and trips. In the Knigge total was \$7,000 from his township and \$3,566 for board and committee meetings.

The other eight and their totals are:

Frank B. Peers, Deerfield Township, \$10,963; LeRoy E. Fritz, Newport Township, \$10,165; Clarence B. Pontius, Vernon Township, \$10,082; Alex S. Brebner, Shields Township, \$10,003; Norman C. and County Board finance committee.

On the liquor commission are Murrie, Dickson, Fritz, Grinnell and Henke.

Welch is the only County Board member on the board of review. Under Illinois law, the chairman must be a supervisor.

On the finance committee which meets most days are Henke, chairman; Grinnell, vice chairman; and Welch, Dickson, Depke and Fritz.

Depke, Dickson and Coles were the only ones to garner

more than \$1,000 in conventions and trip expenses. Five others had such expenses of several hundred dollars. The other 10 had none.

Depending on when they were elected, supervisors and assistant supervisors are paid \$20 or \$25 for attending County Board meetings. Those elected in 1965 — up for re-election next year — are paid \$20. Those elected last year get \$25.

All County Board members are paid \$15 for committee meetings.

For attending forest preserve

district board and committee meetings, all of them get \$15 apiece.

According to County Board rules, convention expenses can run only to transportation, expenses of \$25 a day and registration fees.

County Board members, the rules state, are allowed the per diem rate for each day of attendance at the convention.

An assistant supervisor — E. Kenney Harlan of Shields Township — is president of the county forest preserve district.

Harlan logged just over \$3,000 — \$1,803 for County Board meetings and mileage and \$1,200 for his \$100-a-month pay as forest president.

Gentlemen:

This will acknowledge receipt of the letter of March 4, 1968 from Village Manager, R. D. Heninger, concerning your application for a Federal Grant for improvement and expansion of the Village of Barrington Sewage Treatment Works.

We note that the Village of Barrington will not be able to provide necessary local financing to proceed with this project at this time. This project will, therefore, be removed from the list of projects eligible for a Grant offer from Federal funds allotted to the State of Illinois for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1968.

The application will remain on file until June 1, 1968, when it will be re-evaluated, together with all other application on file at that time, for the next fiscal year. In that regard, we understand that your engineers have proposed changes in the scope of the improvements described in your application of May 22, 1967.

We suggest that a revised application be submitted, based on the revised concept. This should be submitted and received as soon as possible, but in any event, no later than May 31, 1968.

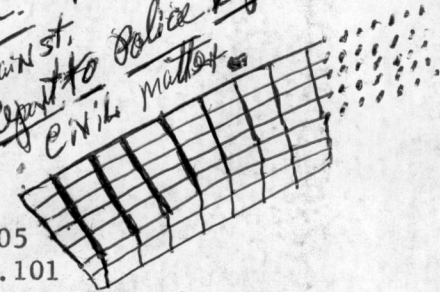

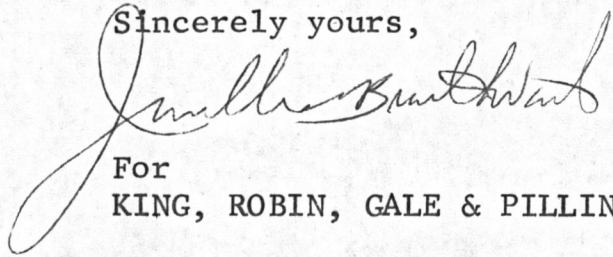

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING THE OFFICES OF
VILLAGE MARSHAL AND DEPUTY MARSHALS AND
PROVIDING FOR THE OPERATION THEREOF
(VILLAGE CODE AMENDMENT)

BE IT ORDAINED by the President and Board of Trustees
of the Village of Barrington, Cook and Lake Counties, Illinois,
that:

Section 1: Chapter 4 of the Municipal Code of Barrington
of 1957, as amended, is further amended to add thereto the
following Article X, consisting of Sections 4.1001 through
4.1007:

"ARTICLE X -- VILLAGE MARSHAL AND
DEPUTY MARSHALS

"4.1001 Office of Marshal. There is hereby established
the office of Village Marshal. The Village Marshal shall be an
officer of the Village and shall be appointed by the Village
President with the advice and consent of the Board of Trustees.

"4.1002 Office of Deputy Marshals. There is hereby
established the office of Deputy Marshal. Deputy Marshals
shall be officers of the Village and shall be appointed by
the Village President with the advice and consent of the
Board of Trustees in such number as the corporate authorities
shall from time to time deem necessary.

"4.1003 Appointment and Term of Office. The Village
Marshal and the Deputy Marshals shall serve at the discretion
of the President and Board of Trustees and may be removed from
office at the will of the President and Board of Trustees.
The Village Marshal and the Deputy Marshals shall receive such
compensation for their services as determined by the corporate
authorities.

"4.1004 Status. The Village Marshal when functioning as
Marshal and the Deputy Marshals shall not be members of the
regular police department of the Village and shall not perform
services on a full-time basis. Uniforms and identification
symbols of the Marshal and Deputy Marshals shall be different
and distinct from those used by members of the police department
of the Village in at least the following respects: shirts,
shoulder patches, emblems and hats.

"4.1005 Duties. Deputy Marshals shall perform such duties
as directed by the Village Marshal or by the corporate authorities.
The Village Marshal shall cooperate with the Chief of Police
of the Village and shall coordinate his duties and the duties
of the Deputy Marshals with such Chief of Police. Deputy
Marshals shall not carry firearms except with the permission
of the Chief of Police and while in the performance of their
duties.

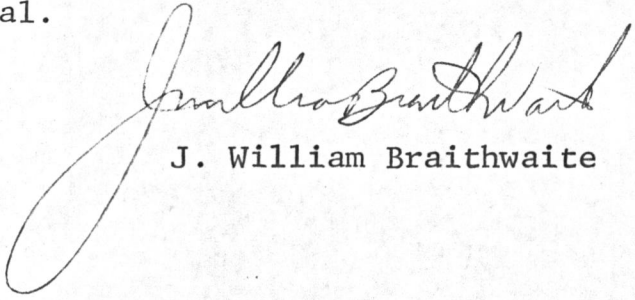

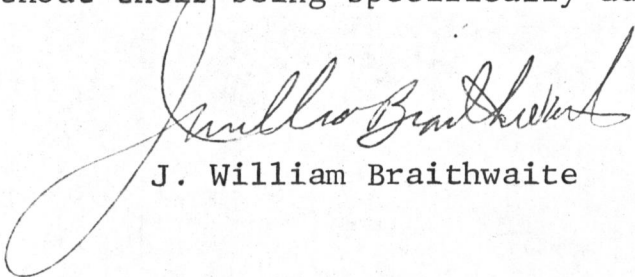

RE: ELECTRICAL CODE

We enclose an amendment to Section 20.102 of the Village Code. The present Village Code adopted by reference the National Electrical Code which was in existence in 1957. This Code has been updated several times and the amendment adopts by reference the latest issue of the National Electrical Code, the 1965 Edition.

The present Village Code Section 20.102 adopts by reference the existing Illinois Commerce Commission rules and regulations as applicable to public utility companies. The National Electrical Code expressly excludes such public utilities. The enclosed revision of 20.102 deletes any reference to Illinois Commerce Commission rules because the Statute requires a new Village Code Amendment each time you wish to adopt by reference such Commerce Commission rules. We think it highly unlikely that the Village would be able to keep up with constant rule changes and the Village's failure to do so would mean that the utility companies would be bound by two conflicting sets of rules as to operations in the Village.

When we discussed this matter with the Village Manager, we both felt that the Commerce Commission rules would provide adequate safeguards without their being specifically adopted by the Village.

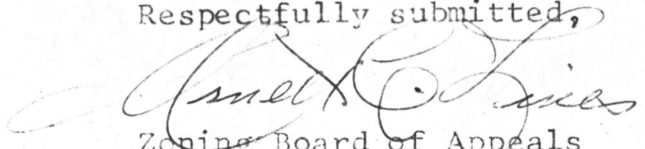

MR. CADWALLADER: All right gentlemen, we shall proceed with the next petition. John Walbaum and Herb Walbaum shall be sworn in. State your case.

MR. H. H. WALBAUM: We decided several months ago that we would need a new sign at our place of business, 131 West Main Street, Barrington, for several reasons. We are down at the end of town where it is dark at night. We propose to put up one which would light the area up until 10 PM. (Shows artist's rendering of proposed sign and location.) Secondly, we are not complaining that we do not do enough business, but we do not get walk-in business, because we are at the end. The sign that has been doing well for us for eight or ten years is hidden between trees. We are very proud of these trees, have them trimmed every year, and I honestly think the Rest Home and our business are the only ones that have beautiful trees. We have maples and elms, had to take some down, but trying to keep the maples. Our landowners and partial partners are the Work family and they have been going along with us and liking what we are doing.

However, there is a cross in the sidewalk which we thought was our lot line, but the Building Commissioner tells us that we have to stay inside of our building line or lot line in a business zoning. I think our problem is a little deep, because we learned that the cross in the sidewalk was not our lot line. Therefore, if we conformed to the lot line requirements in placing this sign it would mean trimming of the trees. This we hate to do. The sign is 6 ft. 6" wide by 8 ft. high and would be 9 ft. above the sidewalk, all of steel.

This sign has been purchased and completed and will be maintained, cleaned, etc. by the makers of the sign. We wanted to put this fancy attractive sign up, not a cheap one.

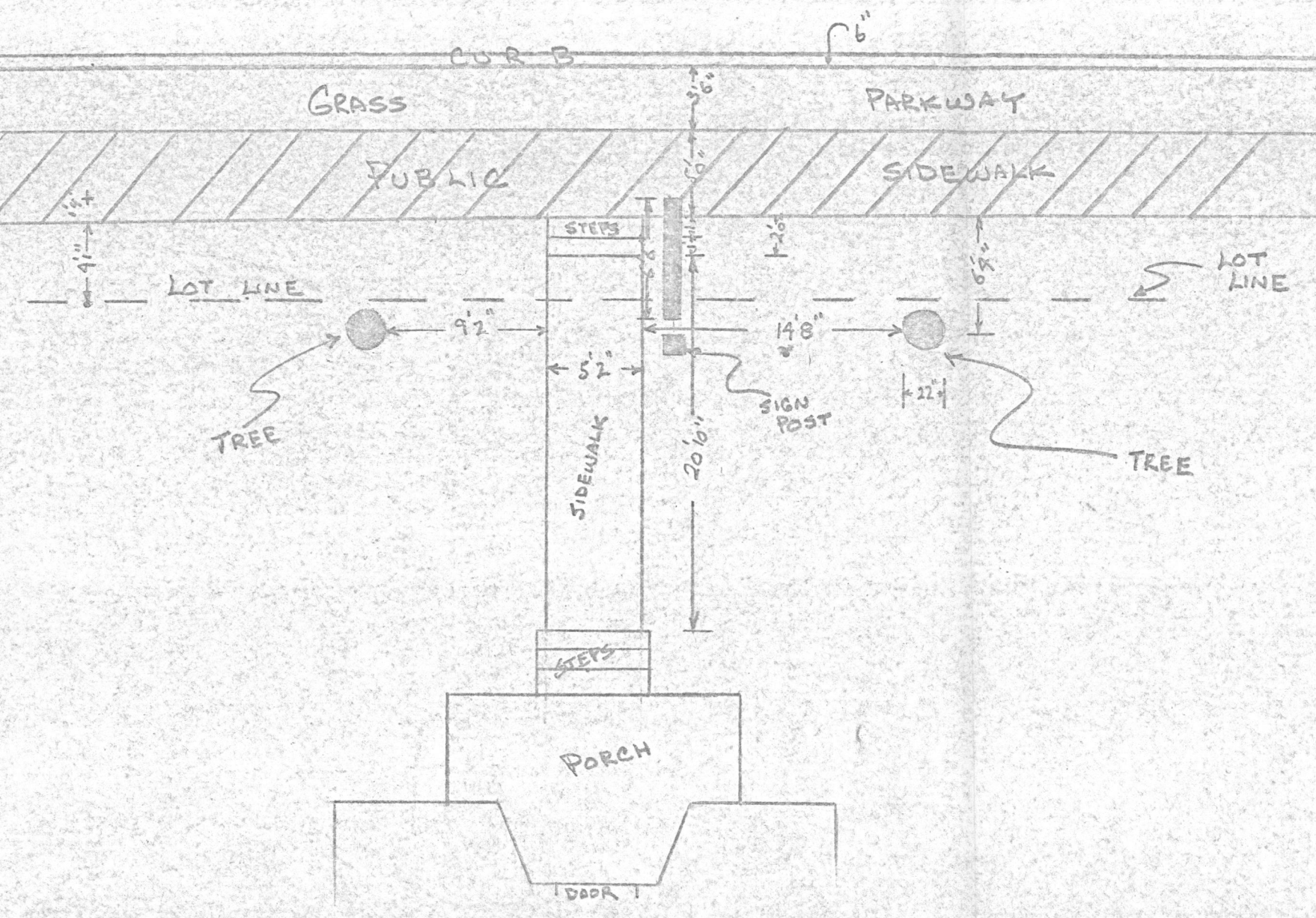
MR. SEEGERS: You have a beautiful building and your present sign has grace and charm. This new sign would have to be about 18" over the sidewalk. If this variation would not be granted by the Village Board, what would be your alternative.

MR. JOHN WALBAUM: We would have to trim the trees, which we feel are valuable to us and the Village. It was only recently that we found that the property line was not out to the cross. The trees are on the property line, four of them across the front; the sign would be between two trees, about ten feet from each.

MR. H. H. WALBAUM: We have 150 ft. of frontage, not a small lot. If times change and we do have to move, we are told it has a steel center and we can move the sign if necessary in the future. Our present sign would be moved back to Station St.

MR. JOHN WALBAUM: Our new sign is similar in size to the Jewel sign across the street.

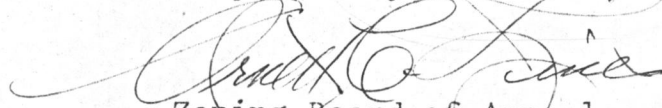

On May 26, 1966, there was an examination held for Lieutenants in which Sgt. Hemmingson and Sgt. Mittelhauser, at that time, participated. Sgt. Hemmingson made the highest score and became our Lieutenant and Sgt. Mittelhauser was placed on the availability list, which is held open for 2 years.

On May 26, 1968 the 2 years will be up and I am recommending that Sgt. Mittelhauser be advanced to Lieutenant before that time has expired, to avoid holding another Lieutenant's examination in the future. The Ordinance provides for 2 Lieutenants. My recommendation is based on the following:

He has handled himself well, showing initiative and cooperation. He has attended Fingerprint Classification School in Champaign and is well versed in riot control, having served as an instructor. He is the department 'time-keeper' and has developed a new scheduling system which is working out very well, ironing out some of our past problems in regard to overtime compensation, days off, etc. He is a good all around officer and well liked in the department. His conduct shows dedication to his work.

I would also like to point out that his grade when he took the Lieutenant's examination was 113, well over the minimum passing grade.

I hope you will consider my request favorably and recommend to the Board and Fire and Police Commission that he be promoted from Sergeant to Lieutenant before May 26, 1968, the salary to be appropriated for in the next fiscal year.

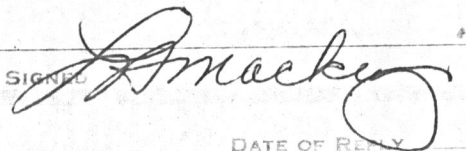

I am enclosing a copy of a letter from Mr. Baumann as well as his Appraisal Report whereby he states the fair cash market value is \$3,000.00.

This area is adjacent to our entrance to parking lot Number One and, in my opinion, would only be valuable to improve the ingress and egress. It might be possible to provide parking for four additional vehicles but improvement costs would run high.

We lease this lot from the Park District and pay them 33-1/3 % gross for the purpose of said lease. Gross income for the last twelve months was approximately \$9,300.00 which nets the Village approximately \$6,000.00 annually. This lease expires on November 30, 1968.

I have given considerable thought to this project and it is my recommendation that the Village should not purchase this parcel because if we should have to give up our lease with the Park District, we would then only have an isolated parcel of land. In my opinion, from the standpoint of use and value, there is a much greater benefit to the Park District.

Howard St. Chicago, to make a study of the traffic flow to be affected by the proposed Draper development area and submit recommendation to the Board at an approximate cost of \$200. and then that Barton-Aschman Assoc. be further requested to submit an intermediate program proposal as to time and approximate expense and objectives for amenities with respect to definitive developing of the traffic flows in connection with the central part of Barrington and,

further, that copies of the proposal submitted by Barton-Aschman Assoc. also be submitted to the Plan Commission for their review and recommendation to the Village Board; 2nd Trustee Voss. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, Shultz, Wyatt, Voss, Hollister, Kaiser. Village Clerk was requested to forward copy of above motion to Plan Commission.

ORDINANCE: to amend Ordinance #983 was proposed to correct a typographical error as explained - ref. Barrington Meadows S/A #75 & read. MOTION Trustee Capulli to adopt; 2nd Trustee Voss. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, Shultz, Wyatt, Voss, Hollister, Kaiser. #1020

E. MAIN ST. SIDEWALK: Trustee Kaiser noted estimated cost \$5500. He felt there would be no benefit derived by residents of Barrington Meadows; could be benefit to Village & save annual cost of crossing guard at Fox Point which runs about \$1500. per year & felt it could be installed for less than \$5500. Fox Point has agreed to put in sidewalk adjacent to their property. Discussion. Manager felt this could be studied at the Budget meetings and could then probably be considered at the April 22nd meeting of Board. Chief noted we now use two guards in the area and since department is short of crossing guards regular patrolmen are being assigned to this duty.

RUSTY WATER: Trustee Hollister asked reason for this in area of laundromat recently. Supt. Johansen explained hydrants were being flushed and in answer to specific question stated when this is done they are fully tested.

NATIONAL CODES: Village Manager Heninger advised 3 copies each of several codes have been filed with Village Clerk and at next meeting something could be done about adopting same.

OCCUPANCY CODE: Manager Heninger advised that it is hoped to have items on this in hands of Attorney shortly.

BARRINGTON AREA DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL INC.: Trustee Voss reported Barton-Aschman Assoc. were appointed to make study of each Village making contributions to the Council and a Committee is to be appointed to meet regularly with representatives of this Company; first meeting to be March 18 or 19 and asked President Blanke to appoint someone to be member of Committee. Discussion. (LATER: President appointed Roy Crumrine.)

AREA SOUTH OF VILLAGE: In answer to question from Trustee Wyatt Manager Heninger said he would reproduce letter received from Consoer, Townsend & Assoc. and distribute to representatives of this area and meeting with them would follow. In addition to this he had received another letter from the Engineers stating that if the horsepower of the lift station pump was increased from 25HP to 30HP we would be able to handle the sanitary sewer from the 143 acres in area. He wondered if developer would be agreeable? Mr. McBride stated difference in cost would be nominal. Trustee Wyatt felt Village should move along on this matter.

Trustee Shultz discussed some additional items he added to his list previously given to Manager including 2 more tornado warning sirens - 1 for Northside Park and one for Middle School area, asking status of installations. ^{referred to his} Mr. Belz has met twice with Manager Heninger and is to submit drawings and Chief Muscarello stated one installation is now being checked out. Discussion.

110 E. STATION ST. PARKING LOT FINALIZING: This work to be done when frost leaves ground. Manager Heninger stated that since he has not heard from Mr. Millin on his program he has contacted Public Service Co. for other lighting plans.

EASTERN AVENUE: Finalizing of this project will be done when weather permits.

SUMMIT & RUSSELL SEWER T-V PROGRAM: Manager Heninger stated he would present proposals at Budget meeting. President stated he felt there was a correction that could be made by Public Works Dept. in area.

COMMUTER PARKING LOT IMPROVEMENTS: Discussion on whether or not this is time to request Engineers to prepare working drawings. Some Trustees not ready for this until after traffic survey is made and studied.

MOTION TO ADJOURN by Trustee Capulli. Attorney Canby asked to be heard and permission granted. MOTION WITHDRAWN.

Attorney Canby stated that on July 7, 1967 he had presented, on behalf of William Panker, an application for a liquor license which has been twice amended to conform to new ordinance requirements; felt they are entitled to some kind of answer at this time and asked if a license can be made available to be issued at the discretion of the Liquor Commissioner? President Blanke, Liquor Commissioner, stated he has received application and it has been amended; he has to do more checking before he submits copies, adding no license will be issued if space is available unless they qualify under Village ordinance, adding further he felt Board could make space available but he would not issue license unless applicant does qualify. Attorney Canby: Is a Class E license going to be made available? Trustee Capulli stated it does not seem that the Board is ready to make this decision. No other comments heard.
