Opening 'Fling' Called Success

As predicted, this fall's operetta, "Brigadoon," will go on record as one of the best high school productions of its kind. "The best all-around production I have ever seen you kids do," said a member of the Saturday night audience. Occasional technical difficulties were the only detraction from an otherwise excellent performance.

After the audience (which filled the auditorium to overflowing both nights) was settled, the lights dimmed and the orchestra put us on location by playing a lively Scottish air.

Russ Stamm led the team in scoring

with 97 points. Stamm scored 15 touchdowns and 7 extra points for his total. Behind him was Russ Schulke scoring 25 points. Third was Mike Westfall with 21 points. The rest of the JV's points were scored by Dave Freder-ick (16), Rick Voss (8), Phil Knud-son (18), and Art English (2).

Quarterback Frederick completed 34 out of 74 passes to lead in this cate-gory. Catching most of these was Russ Stamm, who was on the receiving end of 17. Passes to Stamm netted 377 yards.

Rushing was another category in which Stamm led. The halfback gained 764 yards on the ground. Fullback Mike Westfall gained 451 in 61 at-tempts for an average of 7.3.

In the general statistics column, the figures show that Barrington outplayed its opponents in every category.

The JV's had the most points (220), touchdowns (33), first downs (75), yards gained by passing (775), TD passes (10), yards gained by rushing (1,627), net yards gained (2,320), and average yards gained per player (7).

Maine West Halts Bronchos

Although a last period rally fell short, a scrappy Broncho five finally succumbed to a much taller Maine West team, 60-50.

It was the Warriors' height all the way from the opening jump ball. The Bronchos gave Barrington rooters a pleasant surprise when capitalizing on a Maine West mistake, they took a 3-0 lead at the start.

That was the only time that the Bronchos captured the lead. The War-riors promptly took over a command-ing lead which the Bronchos could never close.

At one time during the fourth quar-ter, the Warriors held a 20-point lead, but the Bronchos whittled it to only 10 as the game ended.

Both of Barrington's tall men fouled out before the fourth quarter. Six-foot 3 inch sophomore John Jusits collected eight points on three field goals and two free throws before getting his fifth personal foul during the third quarter. Tom Malmgren, 6 foot 2 inch senior, was accredited with two points before he left the game also in the third period.

Gary Showers was leading scorer for the Bronchos. He added 12 points on three buckets and six free throws be-fore fouling out midway during the fourth quarter. Wayne Graver and Jim Condill each had 10 points to their credit.

Graver hit for five baskets and Con-dill for four. Condill added two free throws. Tom Jahne hit two free throws for two points.

Both teams collected approximately the same number of free throws. The Bronchos hit on 14 of 23 attempts while the Warriors received 19 out of 30 extra shots. The Bronchos earned a 61% and the Warriors got a 63%. The Ponies couldn't find the range

either as they went down to the tune of 37-21.
