





Urinary Incontinence

Women who have urinary incontinence may leak urine often. They may have to wear a pad to keep from wetting their clothes. Some women with incontinence feel such a strong desire to urinate that they cannot control it. This results in a loss of urine.

A woman with urinary incontinence may also have other symptoms:

Urgency A strong desire to urinate, whether or not the bladder is full. This often occurs along with pelvic discomfort or pressure, as well as the fear of leakage or fear

Frequency Urinating more than every 2 hours or more than 7 times a day. Nocturia The need to urinate 2 or more times during hours of sleep.

Dysuria Painful urination.

Enuresis Bed-wetting or wetting while sleeping.



Age Discrimination and Releases Under the Older Workers Benefit Protection Act

In this time of downsizing, layoffs and terminations, many employers are offering individuals severance pay provided that the employee signs a release which waives their legal rights. In order to be an effective release sufficient to waive a claim for age discrimination under the Age Discrimination in Employment Act, the Older Workers Benefit Protection Act, or OWBPA, provides that the release must contain certain provisions for a release/ wavier to be considered valid.

According to the OWBPA, in order for a release to be found knowing and voluntary, and thus effective to release an age discrimination claim, the release must be written in understandable plain English, must grant the employee additional consideration in addition to anything which the employee is already entitled, must give the employee at least 21 days to decide whether to sign the release (or 45 days if the waiver is in connection with an exit incentive program offered to a group or class of employers) and must advise the employee that they may revoke their acceptance within seven days after signing the release. The release must also specifically state that any legal claim under the Age Discrimination in Employment Act is being waived and inform the employee to consult with an attorney before signing the release.



that a properly drafted release under the OWBPA is effective to bar a claim of age discrimination, you should carefully consider the release and your employment situation with counsel before signing the agreement. This is especially true if you have any reason to believe that your employment was terminated as a result o age discrimination. 





Art Associates to Tour City Gardens

When Chicago was incorporated as a city in 1837, its motto became "urbs in horto" or "city in a garden." In 1849, John S. Wright, a local real estate booster, envisioned a chain of magnificent parks and parkways. The major Chicago parks became reality in 1860. The boulevard system was built and developed between 1869 and 1900.

On Thursday, July 12, the Barrington Community Associates of the Art Institute of Chicago will travel the boulevards on the north and west side to visit Lincoln, Humboldt, Garfield and Columbus parks. Jeanette Muench, landscape design consultant for the Garden Club of Illinois, designed the trip. In addition to the beautiful gardens, she will also elaborate on the sculptures in the parks and how their placement was influenced by the ethnic groups that settled in the area.

In 1837, a municipal cemetery was located at North and Webster. Burials stopped in 1864, and Lake Park was created. Its name was changed to Lincoln Park the following year in honor of Abraham Lincoln. In recognition of Benjamin Franklin's experiments with electricity, a statue of him by Richard Henry Park was placed in Lincoln Park in 1896 when electricity was being introduced into offices and homes throughout Chicago. Statues of de la Salle, von Schiller, Hans Christian Andersen and William Shakespeare are also located in Lincoln Park. The Storks at Play Fountain celebrates the joy of play-

How to Choose a Facial Plastic Surgeon

Your prospective surgeon should spend as much time as you need discussing your desires and options. You should be able to see realistic "before and after" examples of their work. You should never feel pressured to sign up for surgery or undergo procedures you do not want. The surgeon and office staff should be open to any and all questions. If surgery is performed in the office, it should be an accredited facility with a licensed anesthetist or anesthesiologist on staff. You should feel at ease with your surgeon and able to relate well to him or her. You should be able to talk to previous patients if you desire.




