GERHARD RICHTER FORTY YEARS OF PAINTING

The Art Institute of Chicago will present a retrospective of the 40-year career of one of the most highly acclaimed painters in the world with the exhibition "Gerhard Richter: Forty Years of Painting," which is on view in Regenstein Hall, the Daniel F. and Ada L. Rice Building, now through Sept. 8, 2002.

With nearly 200 works, this is the most comprehensive overview of the paintings of the German artist ever mounted in the United States. Organized by The Museum of Modern Art, New York, the exhibition garnered both critical and popular acclaim during its run there (Feb. 14 to May 21, 2002).

The Art Institute of Chicago possesses one of the great museum collections of Gerhard Richter's work in the world, and the Chicago showing of "Gerhard Richter: Forty Years of Painting" will include several paintings from both the institute and Chicago-area collections only shown here.

Gerhard Richter is considered by many to be the very model of the postmodern artist, a deeply thoughtful painter who has mastered an astonishing range of styles: from black, white and grey photo-based realism to minimalist, gestural and neo-expressionist abstraction; to subtly romantic landscapes; to exquisitely lit old master-

like portraits. Long a respected figure in Europe, Richter is still unfamiliar to the general American public.

Born in 1932 in Dresden, Germany, Gerhard Richter grew up first under the Third Reich and national socialism, then under the East German Communist regime. He left grammar school at the age of 15 and enrolled in a trade school, where he studied accounting, stenography and Russian. Around this time, Richter started to draw. By the age of 16, he knew he wanted to be an artist. His first arts-related job was as a member of a team that made communist banners for the government of the German Democratic Republic. He then applied to the Art Academy in Dresden, but was turned down on his first attempt; he was finally accepted in 1952.

During his five-year stay at the academy, Richter received traditional studio training under Heinz Lothmar, a minor surrealist and dedicated communist who supervised the mural painting department at the academy. This department was known for granting students the greatest freedom to experiment, as mural painting was assumed to be a "decorative" art form by otherwise strict enforcers of the socialistrealist aesthetic. Richter became an accomplished mural painter, and upon graduation, executed several successful commissions. The steady income and success from these commissions enabled him to travel overseas.

This exhibition had a profound effect on the young artistmost importantly, he was exposed to the work of artists Jackson Pollock and Lucio Fontana, whom he credits with helping to open his eyes to modernism. Seeing their work was what exhibition curator Robert Storr calls "the turning point of Richter's artistic life.'

In 1961, shortly before the Berlin Wall was erected, Richter moved to West Germany and began a radically new phase of his career in the heady artistic milieu that developed around Cologne and Düsseldorf in 1960s. He enrolled in the Academy of Art in Düsseldorf in 1961 and discovered art informel, neodada, fluxus and a host of related avant-garde tendencies.

Storr states, "Richter the virtuoso was a product of his own re-education as a painter once he arrived in the West, rather than the strange reincarnation of an accomlished-but-conservative technician schooled in the East."

Richter's professor at the academy was the art informel/gestural painter Karl-Otto Götz, whose influence can be seen in the artist's work throughout his career. Joseph Beuys was appointed Professor of Monumental Sculpture the same year Richter started at the academy. While Richter initially avoided him, he appreciated Beuys for the older artist's influence on art, and they became colleagues in 1971 when Richter joined the academy faculty. Richter also formed ties with other artists of his generation, notably Sigmar Polke and Blinky Palermo. Beginning in 1962 with grey-scale paintings that blended newspaper iconography and family snapshots with an austere photo-based realism unlike anything done by the American photorealists, Richter set his own course through the tangle of "isms" that thrived around him. Although Richter's subject matter, such as the amenities of modern living (Toilet Paper or Klorolle, 1965), superficially resembled that of pop artists like Andy Warhol or Roy Lichtenstein, the selection of such other images as aerial bombardment (Mustang Squadron or Mustang-Staffel, 1964) or a smiling Nazi soldier (Uncle Rudi or Onkel Rudi, 1965) hinted at a more brooding and historically-informed sense of contemporary reality.

Formally, Richter eschewed the graphic, often cartoonish quality of New York pop for a painterly treatment of his snapshot and magazine-clipping sources that resembles photo-realism, but with opposite effects. Systematically reducing the information transcribed from the source image to an elusive—almost ashen—blur, Richter heightens the viewer's sense of the unnaturalness of both original photographs and their painted renditions.

In the early 1970s, Richter went on to paint austere-yet-visually potent monochrome canvases that evoked mainstream minimalism with a significantly different

intent and feeling. In the late 1970s and early 1980s, Richter's brightly colored and boldly delineated abstractions suggested, but also diverged from, the pyrotechnic neo-expressionist painting then in vogue. These gestural paintings continued his methodical yet magisterial deconstruction and reconstruction of the language of painting.

Meanwhile, throughout his career, Richter has continued to cultivate a subtly romantic and seemingly antimodernist manner in the landscapes and the hauntingly beautiful old master-like portraits he has intermittently produced even as he has pushed abstraction to new levels of visual intensity. In 1988, Richter completed a startling cycle of 15 black-and-white paintings titled October 18, 1977, based on press photographs of the Baader-Meinhof group-a band of German radicals turned terrorists who died in a Stuttgart prison on that date under highly controversial circumstances. This group of paintings marks a turning point in Richter's career, which had previously been interpreted as detached and ironic. The most recent work in this exhibition, dating from the 1990s to the present and including the Moritz series (2000-2001)-which has not been widely seen in America-reveals a gentle, occasionally elegiac sensibility at odds with the perceived severity of Richter's identity as a painter.

From Arid Arizona Mesas to River Trading Post—Hopi Carvers **Display an Ancient Tradition**

High atop three desolate and remote mesas in arid northern Arizona, the Hopi people live their lives today and practice their religion much as they have since before A.D. 1300.

The Hopi religion is a complex series of rituals and societies that is driven by the urgent need for water in any form: rain for farming, for drinking water in the springs or snow to replenish the land. One element of the very complex religion is the Kachina Cult, with every Hopi over 10 years old being a member.

To the Hopi, Kachinas are the spirit essence of everything in the real world. Hopi children are given dolls that represent the many Kachinas so that they will learn about each of the spirits that are so important to their life.

Today, Hopi carvers create Kachina dolls from a single piece of cottonwood root, not only to educate children, but as prized items for collectors of the prized Hopi pieces.

Protecting Your Legal Rights-**Corporate Downsizing**

The increase of hiring in the late 1990s and the sluggish economy of this decade has caused many companies to reduce their work force through employee lay-

Typically, in a reduction in force or layoff, an employer will offer severance pay in exchange for an employee waiving their legal rights. To be an effective waiver, the release must be made "knowingly and voluntarily" by the employee. Whether an agreement will be deemed such includes the clarity of the agreement, the time the employee had to consider it, the advice of counsel and consideration, such as money, to support the release. For the consideration to be deemed adequate, the severance package offered in exchange for the waiver must be more than the employee would otherwise receive as part of termination, such as accrued vacation pay or severance already provided under a contract of employment or company policy.

Moreover, the waiver of legal rights under the Age Discrimination in Employment Act will be effective where the company has complied with the Older Workers Benefit Protection Act. Under the OWBPA, the release will be considered valid to waive an age claim where the company complies with the act by providing adequate consideration, advises the son of the Employment Law Committee for employee to consult with an attorney, the Northwest Suburban Bar Association provides at least 21 days to consider the agreement, provides seven days to revoke

A Gray Area

One of the greatest challenges in dentistry is finding materials that can withstand the forces generated in the mouth.

In the past, gold has been the material that combined biocompatibility with strength. It is still the standard by which all new materials are measured.

But what do we do when we have to crown a front tooth? Decades ago, gold was used on the front teeth. But as you can imagine, their appearance was far from satisfactory. Technicians started to experiment with different plastics and porcelains to cover the gold and create a crown that was white in appearance. This is the system most frequently used today when making tooth-colored crowns. The drawback to this system has always been the opacity of the crown. Light cannot be transmitted through the restoration because of the gold substructure, resulting in teeth that look like Chiclets. Another problem was the appearance of gold at the gumline. When someone smiles and you see a gray area at the margin where the crown ends and the gums begin, you're looking at unpolished gold that appears to be gray. In some instances, this grayness will radiate into the gum tissue because the metal used under the porcelain was not gold but a cheaper substitute. The molecules of the cheaper metal are leached into the gum tissue, creating a gray tattoo.

structures in order to eliminate the gray appearance and the opacity. Unfortunately, many of them have fallen short on the durability scale, resulting in fractured porcelain. That is, until now. A company from Europe produces a white substructure that is just as strong as gold without the undesirable appearance. The substructure is fabricated in a central lab using digitized information e-mailed to them using the dentist's impression. Then the substructure has porcelain applied to it just like the gold ones would. The result is a natural-looking crown that doesn't show any gray at the gumline.

Our office has been delivering these crowns to our patients for about five years and has seen no signs of early breakdown or fracture. If you are seeing gray and want to make a change, now is the time you can do so with long-lasting, predictable results.

gas derived from the radioactive decay of uranium in the soil. It is an environmental health concern because it is the second leading cause of lung cancer, surpassed only by smoking. It is usually found in the basement or lower level of a home. But the good news is, there is a remedy.

Carbon monoxide, another deadly gas, can escape from a faulty furnace. There have been several tragic cases where people have died in their beds due to carbon monoxide poisoning. Although not easily detected, it is preventable.

Lead-based paint hazards are a concern as well. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency developed standards to help property owners identify lead hazards in residential paint, dust and soil.
