Workplace Protection Under the Family by Joette S. Doran, J.D. and Medical Leave Act

The Family and Medical Leave Act of 1993 requires an employer with 50 or more employees at a given work site to provide up to 12 weeks of unpaid leave in a 12month period to eligible employees. To be eligible, the employee must have worked for the employer for at least 12 months and have been employed for at least 1,250 hours during the 12-month period immediately prior to the leave. Leave is allowed for an employee who needs time off as a result of a "serious health condition" or for the serious condition of a parent, spouse or child of the employee when the employee is needed to care for the family member. Under the Family and Medical Leave Act, a "serious health condition" is defined as an illness, injury, impairment or physical or mental condition that involves impatient care in a hospital, hospice or residential medical care facility or continuing treatment by a health care pro-

In the situation of a foreseeable leave of absence, the act requires the employee to provide at least 30 days notice to the employer. If the leave is not foreseeable, the act requires the employee to provide notice "as soon as practicable" under the facts of the particular case. Under the regulations which help to define the Family and Medical Leave Act, a request for leave should be, at a minimum, verbal notice within one to two business days after the employee learns of the need for the leave. It is unlawful for an employer to discriminate against an employee who uses the Area Professional Women.



act. Also, leave may not be used as a negative factor in employment decisions, such as promotions or disciplinary actions. An employee whose rights have been violated under the Family and Medical Leave Act is entitled to certain legal remedies which include job reinstatement and monetary

• Rebalance your portfolio to help match your objectives. Additionally, you can use net losses up to \$3,000 to reduce ordinary income, such as wages, interest and dividends, in a single year. After the offset, any further capital losses above this amount can be carried forward to offset capital gains and/or ordinary income in subsequent years.

• Beware of the wash sale rule. If you plan to reduce your tax liability by taking losses, make sure you understand the wash sale rule. It comes into play when you want to own a security long term but also realize losses on selling part, or all, of your position. The wash sale rule states that a tax loss is disallowed if you buy the same or substantially identical securities within 30 calendar days before or after the sale. The intent of this rule is to help ensure you take a real market risk to claim a tax loss.

· Take advantage of long-term capital gains. Before selling any investments, make sure your profits qualify as tax-favored long-term gains. You receive long- SIPC, AR-27-1003-BAR

For the past 12 years, Anne Wilson has created physical drawings, sculptural objects and Internet-based projects that explore themes of time, loss, private and social rituals. She predominately uses handstitching and found-object materials like table linen, bedsheets, human hair and lace that are familiar and rich with cultural meaning.

Her art is in the permanent collections of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, The Art Institute of Chicago and the Museum of Contemporary Art-Chicago among others. Her work was part of the 2002 Biennial at the Whitney Museum of American Art in New York. Anne Wilson is currently a professor in the Department of Fiber and Matieral Studies at the School of the Art Institute of Chicago, where she has taught since 1979.

In the afternoon, there is time for a selfguided tour of the Juan Muñoz exhibit in Regenstein Hall. This Spanish sculptor began in the early 1980s, creating highly

On Wednesday, Oct. 16, members of the original work most often featuring architectural elements and then, later, the human form. His pieces allude to history, literature and the arts but also find discomfort in the normal.

During the 1990s, Muñoz created his signature "conversation pieces," large ensembles of figures installed in indoor or outdoor settings. Casting his figures in resin, papier-mâché and, eventually, bronze, he limited their size and descriptive details in order to heighten their psychological impact.

Muñoz's art explores the nature of psychological interaction and the art of looking. His conversation pieces allow the viewer to interact with the figures. Suddenly, the viewer becomes the object on view. Figures are almost identical with generic, vague facial features-a characteristic apparent in his compelling work titled Five Seated Figures.
