
1977, this newest attraction features over 130 ancient artifacts—gold, silver, jewels and more—reflecting ancient Egypt. The young king's early death still remains a mystery

Tutankhamun and the Golden Age of the Pharaohs at the Field Museum May 26, 2006, to Jan. 1, 2007


For more than 3,000 years, they lay unseen beneath the Egyptian sands: gleaming treasures of gold and semiprecious jewels; statues and chests of breathtaking artistry; magical amulets and articles of ancient life; the mummified body of a young pharaoh.

When the British archaeologist Howard Carter uncovered the remarkably preserved tomb of Tutankhamun in 1922, he created a worldwide sensation. When the boy king's riches toured the world in 1977, the term "blockbuster exhibition" was born. Now a new exhibition, Tutankhamun and the Golden Age of the Pharaobs, offers visitors a chance to see fabulous new treasures and to enter the world that gives them meaning: 250 years that marked the pinnacle of ancient Egypt's culture, wealth and imperial power.

As those who saw the earlier exhibition can attest, coming face-to-face with the treasures of King Tut is an encounter not soon forgotten. Visitors to the new exhibition, twice the size of the original, will have an even broader and deeper experience. They'll see more than 130 ancient artifacts-of gold and silver, jewels and semiprecious stones, alabaster and gilded wood-excavated from the tomb of Tutankhamun and other royal tombs in the Valley of the Kings. They'll learn about life and death in ancient Egypt and the intimate relationship between the two. And they'll discover what the latest technologies are revealing about how the young king may have died.

Treasures Unimagined and Untouched Howard Carter had spent five years searching the Valley of the Kings for the tomb of the storied Tutankhamun. His funding was coming to an end, but he persuaded his patron, Lord Carnarvon, to support his work for one more season. That was all it took. A few days after digging began again, a young water-carrier put his hand on a stone step.

"It was a spectacular discovery-a tomb untouched since antiquity, its inner sanctum never looted by tomb robbers," says James L. Phillips, acting curator of the Near East and North Africa at The Field Museum and professor of anthropology at the University of Illinois, Chicago. The only tomb of its era found intact, it was also, Phillips notes, the first major discovery in the age of easy worldwide com- set with gold.

munication. That, along with rumors of a mysterious curse, helped make Tut the most popular of the pharaohs.

But there is no denying the allure of the treasure itself. More than 5,000 beautifully preserved artifacts were found in Tut's tomb, and the 50 selected for this exhibition—along with more than 70 from other royal tombs-are among the most breathtaking objects of ancient Egypt. Only a few of these were in the original exhibition, and many have never before traveled outside Egypt.

Among the dazzling artifacts on display are a gold diadem, inlaid with semiprecious stones, that graced the boy king's head in life and death; a miniature gold coffin, in Tut's image, that held his inner organs; and a gold dagger, wrapped with his mummy to protect him in the afterlife. A wooden bust shows the king as a young and very human figure, while exquisite gilded statuettes portray him as the ruler of all Egypt. A small shrine of wood covered in gold and silver is engraved with tender scenes of Tutankhamun and his young wife. And most poignant of all is a child-size throne of ebony and ivory in-

Though less well known, the treasures from other royal tombs are equally spectacular, especially those from the tomb of Yuya and Tjuya, believed to be Tut's greatgrandparents. Tjuya's coffin is a stunning sight, covered in a bright reddish gold inlaid with colored glass that forms her broad collar. Another fascinating artifact comes from the tomb of Amenhotep II: a model boat shaped like the royal barge and painted a bluish green, the color of life reborn. In such a celestial boat, the soul of the pharaoh would travel the heavens with the sun god, dying each night and resurrected each morning with the

Behind the Treasures, the Story of a Mighty Civilization

Tutankhamun reveals ancient Egypt as a land of artistic and spiritual richness as well as material wealth.

"Like the earlier exhibition, this one is filled with beautiful objects," James Phillips says. "But now we also have the context that gives those objects meaning-the history, religion, ideals and daily life of the people the objects were made

Tutankhamun tells the fascinating story of Egypt's 18th dynasty, the golden age of the pharaohs. It was the height of Egyptian culture, wealth and power: the empire extended from Libva to Gaza, from Syria to Sudan; art and literature flourished, and architecture and technology advanced. But Tut was born into an era of great cultural upheaval: his father, Akhenaten, had replaced the worship of many gods with a radical new monotheistic religion, only to have it overturned by Tutankhamun's advisors soon after the old king's death.

Visitors will learn much about Tut's family and his royal predecessors and about the pervasive connections between religious beliefs and daily life in ancient Egypt.

"Religion, and its emphasis on the afterlife, contoured every aspect of Egyptian society," Phillips explains. "Just think about where all

these objects came from: tombs. Ancient Egyptians spent their lives accumulating objects they would need to carry on in the afterlife-furniture, jewelry, games, weapons, amulets, canopic jars to store the organs where the soul resides. And of course, offerings for the gods. You could say they lived to die."

The Mystery Remains

Tutankhamun's early death has long been shrouded in mystery. He had ruled for about 10 years and was scarcely out of his teens when he died-unexpectedly, to judge by the relatively small and simple tomb in which his mummified body was buried. X-rays taken in 1968 suggested to some that he might have been killed by a blow to the head. But the exhibition offers a series of recent, more detailed CT scans that show no signs of trauma. The mystery remains.

The CT video brings visitors closer to the mystery-and the science-through a "virtual autopsy" of Tut's mummy. (The mummy itself remains in the Valley of the Kings.) They'll also see a newly commissioned bust, offering a lifelike interpretation of Tutankhamun based on the CT scan. In a large display, "The Faces of Tut," visitors can compare that version with photographs of two other busts made from the scan and with images drawn from the art they've seen throughout the exhibition.

Elgin Academy Raises More Than \$200,000 at Extravaganza XXIX







"Cocktail Table" Talk with Sarah Davis

The other day I was at the new Starbucks on Northwest Highway ordering my usual soy peppermint mocha and noticed a group of women sitting around a small round table. I suppose eavesdropping isn't the most polite way to start my morning, but they seemed to be having so much fun that I couldn't help myself! I imagine that it is a monthly tradition for the group so they can get caught up on what is going on in their lives. My attention was grabbed when they started discussing a restaurant one of them had been at the night before. The other ladies all chimed in with their personal experiences at this particular restaurant which inspired me to wonder; what would my clients say about me and Designs Of The Interior (DOTI) with regard to my interior design work in a similar round table chat? What did they think about working with me? What were their expectations for their designer? Did I fulfill their expectations? Was it fun?

Instead of just daydreaming about what they would say, I decided to ask some of my clients to share their experiences with you in our own little "Cocktail Table" talk. Here's a bit of background scoop on each of them. Jenny, a stay-at-home mother of two young boys, lives in the village of Barrington. Becky is a newlywed living in an older home in Barrington Hills. Nancy, a working mother of two young boys, moved to Kildeer from the East Coast.

Sarah: "What prompted you to seek me and my firm out?"

Becky: "My husband, John, was actually just walking around downtown Barrington when he walked into DOTI. When you greeted him and started talking about our design projects, he could tell that I would want to meet you. I came in to meet you a few days later and instantly made a connection. You quickly became not only our designer, but also our friend.'

Jenny: "I was struggling for quite a while with our unusual configuration of the living and dining rooms. I didn't want to make any costly mistakes and shopping with two little boys is not the most convenient way to put a design together. Sarah, all your fabric and frame resources gave me more options to create a room just as I imagined.

Nancy: "I decided to seek out a designer because, even though I have some pretty creative ideas on my own, I really needed a professional to pull a cohesive look together. I also knew that I wouldn't be able to get the look I wanted without the resources of a design firm like DOTI."



Sarah: "Did either of you have any initial fears or reservations about establishing rapport with me?"

Nancy: "I actually worked with a designer back in New Jersey-she never listened to our ideas and I couldn't seem to develop a relationship with her. I wasn't sure if that is typical of designers or not, until I met you-you were much better at listening to my ideas."

Becky: "My only reservation was that you looked so young, which translated, in my mind, to inexperienced! You quickly overcame that concern—you are truly a professional in every way.

Sarah: "Thanks Becky! I have a feeling that others may have reservations about my youth as well. My first reaction is that I'm flattered and it must be genetic! But when I give it more thought, perhaps the Tiger Woods analogy is more appropriate, it's not your age but your passion and skills that will carry your success.'

Jenny: "I could tell immediately that you were a good listener, so we clicked right away. I honestly didn't have any fears because I was so excited to get started as soon as possible.'

Sarah: "At what point did you develop a trust for me as your designer?"

Becky: "I started trusting you during your first visit to our home. You quickly assessed me and my personality and worked around my tastes in colors, patterns, fabric, and furniture styles.'

Nancy: "Same for me! Pretty early on it was evident that you understood what I was looking for and what my taste is."

Jenny: "I think that I knew I could trust you at the second appointment when you brought over your design ideas—I could tell you were on the right track with my vision and you were so flexible with letting me be involved in the design process.

Sarah: "You each took risks on colors and fabrics that you might not have taken without my guidance... how do you feel about that now that your project is done?"

Jenny: "You opened our perspective because you envisioned the design before completion and you worked hard at helping me visualize all your ideas. I am so happy with the results and there really isn't any risk with your ideas for new projects.

Becky: "All I have to do is look at the family room—I would not have been able to pull it together without your help. You helped me step outside my narrow ideas and I absolutely LOVE it!"

Nancy: "I'm not too shy of a person when it comes to decorating, so I probably would have tried risky fabrics and colors on my own, but I definitely wouldn't have been able to pull together the combinations that you did."

1. Minimize the change of the immediate environment. Recreate the same comfort zones from the former home to the new home. If you have been getting out of bed on the right side for the last 20 years, set up the new bedroom the same. To Convert or Not to Convert?

If you own a Traditional IRA and your AGI is \$100,000 or less, should you convert these funds to a Roth IRA? By doing so, you will gain the benefit of tax-free withdrawals sometime in the future; however, current taxes, but no penalty, will have to be paid at the time of the conversion.

- · Your traditional IRA has been open for a short period of time and most of the balance comprises nondeductible contributions.—Since there is little growth in your current IRA and no taxes are owed on nondeductible IRA contributions, your tax liability will be low at conversion because taxes are only paid on the growth of the funds and on the deductible con-
- · You do not need your existing IRA funds for support during retirement.-You will have a longer time to recover the taxes paid at the time of conversion if you don't take distributions out of your Roth IRA. Also, minimum distributions are not required from a Roth IRA at age 701/2 and, in fact, if you have earned income, you can continue funding a Roth IRA after age 701/2. Your Roth IRA has more time to grow tax-deferred and funds can be passed on to your heirs tax-free.
- · You are many years from retirement. -The further from retirement you are, the more time your Roth IRA will have to recover from the taxes paid at conversion and the longer the account will benefit from years of tax-free growth.

• You anticipate your tax bracket will remain the same or will be higher during retirement.—You will pay taxes at a lower or at the same rate at the time of conversion than you would if you took money out of the existing IRA after retirement. Also, any growth in the account after the conversion will be tax-free after five years and at age 591/2.

Peterson: Governor's Capital Plan Would Condemn Future Taxpayers, Measure Fails

roads, bridges, water works and school buildings, but a plan to help pay for those projects failed Thursday when propothe details, including how the projects would be selected or even how the \$4.3 billion would be paid for.

State Senator Bill Peterson (R-Buffalo Grove), who voted against the measure, said it was the responsible thing to do. because it would add to the state's already staggering debt. The proposals, Senate Bill 668 and Senate Bill 3053, did not receive the 36 votes necessary to pass the Senate.

"I want to bring a capital program home to the 26th district, but I want to do it in a responsible manner that lends integrity to the budget process and respects the pocketbooks of future taxpayers," said Peterson, who said the two measures were presented to senators only an hour before it was pushed through the Senate Executive Committee.

The plan was composed of two separate bills. Senate Bill 668 would have authorized \$1 billion in school construction grants, while Senate Bill 3053 would have dedicated \$3.3 billion in borrowing revenue for new transportation, transit and higher education programs.

Peterson noted that once again the spending proposal failed to identify a separate revenue source to pay off the debt

The state of Illinois has a need for new completely. In the past, any new bonding program, such as Illinois FIRST, was funded with new revenue sources. However, this spending initiative would rely on nents could not answer questions about more bonding, driving the state's total debt to \$26 billion or a whopping \$1,400 per each household in Illinois.

"Illinois already has record-high state debt, record-high spending, and a \$2 billion backlog in unpaid bills," Peterson pointed out. "We cannot sustain this kind of spend-as-you-go policy."

Additionally, Peterson noted that neither SB 668 nor SB 3053 provided specific details—such as dates or dollar figures for specific projects—about how the \$4.3 billion would be spent. Furthermore, over \$650 million earmarked for the road program has to be put on paper—in any form much less a road program format.

"Road projects, new schools, water and sewer system improvements are important to the vitality of communities all across Illinois. We all agree on that. But based on Gov. Rod Blagojevich's demonstrated lack of honest, straightforward dealings with lawmakers, we need a lot more information about this plan as well as other spend- ing projects that have been promised but never seen," Peterson commented, referring to several projects that the state has appropriated money for that have vet to be released.

Family Interactive Drug Testing—A New Approach to Parent-Teen Communication

The investments by all trustees of American youth-of love, education and moral guidance-are succumbing to market penetration by the most effective criminal multilevel network ever imagined. Today, cell phones, Web sites and e-mail technology effectively accelerate the marketing of illegal drugs while making it harder for parents to protect their children.

A new player in the field, however, is Family Interactive Drug Testing (FIDT), a start-up, not-for-profit public charity. Its founders intend to arm all parents with free immediate detection technology for use as a deterrent in the most effective environment-the home.

Parents' determination in the home can be voiced confidentially and sincerely with all of the consequences of choosing drug use openly discussed. Government research concludes that the parent is the most effective "antidrug." Parent "antidrug" momentum is greatly enhanced when each parent knows that other parent-neighbors are, at the same time, addressing drug use with their children. Parents have the right to remove all doubt and a need to know.

Psychologists say that all children have a basic need for approval from their parents, though it may be masked by adolescent behavior at times. Not all negative behavior is due to adolescent phases; it could be because of drug use. There is



still intact if you call in your "emotional markers" in the right setting.

FIDT is in the process of accepting donations to provide all parents of seventh to 12th graders a free drug-testing kit. The kit tests for the four most popularly marketed social drugs. It is a simple urine test with an indicator if the sample has been contaminated. The results are within minutes and highly conclusive. These types of tests are extensively used for pre-employment screening and random employee drug testing in commerce and industry.

Random drug testing is here to stay. FIDT is confident that most parents will want the on-the-spot ability to test for assurance. FIDT deterrent programs are based on random drug testing at home at the discretion of parents, fully informed in advance, on how to apply the testing as a deterrent.
