





"Native Words, Native Warriors"

Stories of American Indian Code Talkers Revealed in Smithsonian Traveling Exhibition

"My language was my weapon."

-David Patterson (Navajo), 4th Division, U.S. Marine Corps

When the United States issued the call to arms in World Wars I and II, American Indians answered as warriors. Some men discovered that words-in their Native languages-would be their most valued weapons. These unsung American heroes share their stories of strength and courage in a Smithsonian traveling exhibition, now open at The Barrington Area Historical Society, 212 W. Main St., Barrington. The exhibition will be open to society members and the public Monday through Saturday, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., until Oct. 7.

"Native Words, Native Warriors," developed by the Smithsonian's National Museum of the American Indian and the Smithsonian Institution Traveling Exhibition Service (SITES), tells the remarkable story of soldiers from more than a dozen tribes who used their Native languages while in service in the U.S. military

The U.S. military first enlisted American Indians to relay messages in their Native languages during World War I, even though the United States did not consider American Indians citizens until 1924. These encoded messages proved undecipher-





able by the enemy and helped the United States achieve victory

The involvement of the code talkers expanded during World War II. Soldiers from the Comanche, Meskwaki, Sioux, Crow, Hopi and Cree nations, among others, took part in the effort. The best known of these projects is the formerly classified Navajo Code Talker Program, established by the U.S. Marine Corps in September 1942. The encoded messages proved to be a fast, accurate and indecipherable.

Twenty-three years after the end of World War II, the U.S. government declassified the Navajo and Comanche code talker programs and revealed American's unsung heroes. In 1999, the U.S. Army presented the last surviving Comanche code talker with the Knowlton Award for outstanding intelligence work. In 2001, President George W. Bush presented the Congressional Gold Medal to four of the five living veterans of the original 29 Navajo code talkers. Developed by the Smithsonian's National Museum of the American Indian and the Smithsonian Institution Traveling Exhibition Service with generous support from Elizabeth Hunter Solomon, the Smithsonian Women's Committee, and the AMB Foundation.




role is not to make decisions for the parties nor does the mediator give legal advice. The mediator acts as a facilitator to help guide the parties in identifying issues and in engaging in resolving the problem by exploring settlement options. Because mediation is much quicker and less costly than litigation, the courts and governmental agencies have turned to voluntary mediation as an effective way to resolve employment disputes.

Specifically, in order to pursue a claim of employment discrimination in federal court, the law requires that within a specified time frame, that a Charge of Discrimination be filed either with the federal or state administrative agency. The federal administrative agency is the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) and the Illinois state agency is the Illinois Department of Human Rights (IDHR). In either agency, after the charge is filed and if both parties agree, the charge may be submitted to mediation for possible resolution. Participation in mediation is free, voluntary and confidential. During mediation, the mediator will address issues of potential relief for violations which may include, back pay, hiring, promotion, reinstatement and/or front pay. Because this is only a brief discussion of the many considerations involved in whether to consider mediation in the resolution of an employment dispute, consultation with legal counsel is highly recommended. 

Anderson Japanese Gardens and Tinker Swiss Cottage on Tour

Is one of your passions historical artifacts but a trip to Europe is not on your agenda this season? Do you enjoy the tranquility and beauty of Japanese-inspired landscapes but have no plans to tour the Orient? Rockford, Ill., is the destination for the first excursion of the season sponsored by the B/NWCA. On Wednesday, Sept. 19, we will tour the gorgeous Anderson Japanese Gardens and the historic Tinker Swiss Cottage Museum. Following an 1862 European tour where he fell in love with Swiss architecture, business man Robert H. Tinker returned to Rockford and built his home, the Tinker Swiss Cottage. Overlooking Kent Creek, the property includes a barn, lovely gardens and a suspension bridge Tinker built to connect to his gardens and his wife's property. Filled with original furnishings, artwork, and household items, the cottage is a window to life in the 1800s. The home is one of the few existing Swiss-style homes of the 1800s in the United States.

A trip to a distant place also provided the inspiration for John and Linda Anderson to create a remarkable landscape upon returning to Rockford. After visiting Japan, the Andersons decided to create a Japanese garden on their property. Built and designed by Hoichi Kurisu, the director of landscaping at the Washington Park Gardens in Portland, Ore., the gardens were begun in 1978. The gardens include a formal Japanese garden with guest house, teahouse and machiai. A second garden, Garden of Reflection, is a contemporary international garden with strong Japanese influence.



This wonderful excursion would not be complete without an enticing lunch site. Members will be delighted when they lunch at the beautiful Rockford Country Club on the Rock River.

Healthy Pregnancy

Many women become more interested in their health once they are pregnant. However, the foundation for a healthy pregnancy begins before conception. Women who are thinking about becoming pregnant should see their health care provider to gain insight into nutrition, vitamin supplements, exercise and laboratory testing, which can ensure a successful pregnancy.

Women who are planning pregnancy or who are pregnant should choose a wellbalanced diet to get the essential nutrients they need each day. Women need several servings of protein-rich foods (meats, poultry, fish and eggs), grains, calciumrich foods, vegetables and fruits per day. Women also need adequate fluid intake: eight or more 8-ounce servings per day. Women who are vegetarian may need to take additional supplements. The recommended weight gain in pregnancy is normally between 25 to 35 pounds. Women who are underweight may need to gain a little more and women who are overweight should limit weight gain to 15 to 20 pounds.

Women often have questions concerning the safety of certain foods in pregnancy. Caffeine can be consumed in moderation, as studies have not shown that it causes birth defects. Artificial sweeteners, such as Aspartame and Splenda, are also acceptable. Certain fish, such as Swordfish, should be avoided secondary to high mercury levels.

A prenatal vitamin, which contains folic acid, is essential to a healthy pregnancy. Many studies have shown that folic acid reduces the risk of a baby developing a type of birth defect called a neural tube defect.

addressed before conception. Pregnant women are advised to avoid alcohol because this has been linked to learning disabilities and birth defects in babies. Smoking can lead to poor fetal growth, preterm birth and sudden infant death syndrome.

Most women can continue to exercise in pregnancy. In fact, this may benefit the health of both the mother and the fetus. Women who maintain a fitness program have decreased weight gain and fat deposition during pregnancy and an improved sense of well-being. They may also have a shorter, less complicated birth and a more rapid recovery after the birth. Recommended forms of exercise in pregnancy include walking, cycling, swimming and yoga. It is safe to exercise several times per week at a comfortable intensity. Women with complications in their pregnancy, such as bleeding, preterm labor or other medical conditions, should check with their health care provider before embarking upon an exercise program.







Cosmetic Dentistry: "I Hate My Teeth!" by James T. Gavrilos, DDS

Those words are heard in dental offices every day. But when the dentist asks the patient, "What do you hate about them?" the answer is usually, "I don't know, I just hate them!'

So many factors contribute to the appearance of teeth. These factors may not be clearly identifiable by the patient but are clearly evident to the dentist that has had training in smile design. When evaluating a smile, the dentist needs to ask himself many questions. Are the edges of the teeth worn? What is the patient doing to wear them down? Do the gums show when smiling? If they show, do they appear to follow the lips or are they canted? Do the edges of the upper teeth follow the shape of the lower lip? Do the upper teeth show while the patient is speaking? Does the midline of the upper teeth line up with the midline of the lower teeth? Do the teeth have a "windswept" appearance that makes the spaces between the teeth look angled? Is the pointed gum tissue that drops down between the teeth even from one side to the other? Is the tooth color appropriate for the patient? The list goes on and on, and it's important to identify what the problem is before **Dr. Gavrilos** at 1-847-381-4040 for an



How do we know if these changes for the patient are the right ones? The dentist can take digital photos of the teeth and make any of the above changes. He can sit down with the patient and show them what their smile could look like. If the patient is pleased, the dentist can then discuss with them their options for treat-

What Age is Best for Certain Procedures? by Gary S. Churchill, MD

Patients often ask at what age it is best to get certain procedures done. This will vary from patient to patient, but there are some general guidelines that apply in most cases. Ultimately, only the patient along with their surgeon can determine if a certain procedure is right for them or if the timing is appropriate.

Eyelid Rejuvenation

Most people will notice the aging process first around their eyes. Some puffiness beneath the eyelids, especially in the morning, will get more and more noticeable. This can create a tired look even when the person is well rested. Although some people will notice this in their twenties, this usually becomes more apparent in the thirties and forties. Although both upper and lower eyelids may age simultaneously, some people will notice only one or the other aging sooner.

Fine lines will begin to appear around the eyes in the late twenties or early thirties. These can be treated with light chemical peeling or the newer glycolic acid creams at home.

Facial Rejuvenation-**Facelifting**

different procedures. The most common is facelifting. Facelifting improves jowling and looseness of the neck through incisions around the ears. This procedure is rarely done on patients in their thirties. Most patients are in their forties and older. It is common to perform facelifting at the same time as eyelid rejuvenation.

Facial Rejuvenation-Forehead Lifting

A forehead lift allows the brows to be elevated as well as the frown lines smoothed. This is done through an incision behind the hairline. Although some patients

Facial Rejuvenation-**Chemical Peeling**


Chemical peeling is designed to smooth the skin. A number of new light and medium depth chemical peels have become available for younger patients with early, fine lines. Patients in their twenties may undergo light chemical peeling. The more sun damage there has been to the skin, the deeper the lines will be and the deeper the chemical peel needed to affect them. 
Facial rejuvenation involves a number of Rhinoplasty or nasal recontouring is commonly performed on teenagers and young adults though older patients are candidates as well. Church Women United Raises \$18,000 for District 220 School Supplies

In 2001, Church Women United (CWU) Barrington Social Ministries started a new project to reduce the financial hardship that disadvantaged students and their families face at the start of each academic year in Unit School District 220. In most schools, students receive a list of supplies needed for the fall that are sold in prepackaged kits. For elementary and middle schools, these kits range from \$30 to \$90. The project started by supplying kits in some of the elementary schools for the children who qualify for low-income benefits according to federal guidelines.

As the project has grown, this fall all

qualified students in elementary and middle schools in Barrington will receive kits as prescribed by their individual teachers. Having raised almost \$18,000, this fall, CWU will again supply 30 graphing calculators for the math department at Barrington High School for use in its student loan program for low-income students.

"A wonderful aspect of this project is that identical kits are given to students who paid themselves and those we pay for," said Mary Anderson, chair of the project. "They're given out anonymously at orientation in the fall, with no one knowing how the kits were financed. The schools notify the recipient students in Methodist Church Women, Barrington advance, however, that Church Women United will pay for their kits. From the response from parents and school administrators, we know that the purchase of these required supplies at the beginning of the school year is an enormous burden for struggling families and that our assistance is greatly appreciated."

Recent heavy rains in parts of northern Il- ined and belongings waterlogged. In the ongoing battle for dry basements, sump pumps play a pivotal role. A pump typically has to be replaced every few years. But if sized it correctly, the life of the pump can be extended and ensure having the right pump for the job.

When selecting a sump pump, homeowners need two pieces of information: the system capacity and total dynamic head (static head plus friction head). It's cently published a four-page fact sheet on important that the pump can draw water out of the basin (or "sump pit") faster than water flows into it. Therefore, the first thing to measure is the amount of water that drains into the basin during a high-flow period. During a heavy rain, stick a ruler in the basin and measure



basin in 60 seconds. This will indicate how many gallons flow into the basin per minute, which is the system capacity. A good general rule to follow is start with the largest elements: hardscapes (patios, walks, walls, decks), shade trees, tall growing evergreens, etc. If building a new house, try to catch the contractor before putting in the foolish builder's walk and have a design professional create an entrance walk for you. The front entrance garden should complement the architecture of the home, while leading the visitor's eye to the front door along a wide, at least 4 feet, inviting surface. The correct design and placement of all hardscapes, including walks, walls, patios, and decks, sets the stage for good design.

3. Choose the right plant for the right place. The design of the walks and patios creates areas for the ideal placement of plants. However, try to avoid the Geneva, Ill., at 1-630-232-6890.

1. Develop A Comprehensive Master common mistake of forcing too many plants into a limited space. While they might look good at first, they eventually outgrow the area and have to be either removed or severely pruned. Planting shade trees and large growing evergreens first allows these large growing plants to become established, while also creating strong "anchors" in the landscape.

> 4. Use plants that have been proven successful in your climate. Another important aspect of a classic landscape design is using plant cultivars that have been tested over time, and proven successful in the landscape, therefore, avoiding trends in the landscape. This includes choosing plants that are easy on the eye with good characteristics, and avoiding fads such as variegated foliage, bright obnoxious colors, and ridiculous shapes and habits. Quality plant characteristics include soothing colors, pleasant fragrance, beautiful flowers, foliage, and fall color, an interesting habit, and hardiness to the climate. A good landscape design should use these plants to create visual interest, screen unattractive views (driveways, cars, etc.), and develop a natural environment with a sense of enclosure without putting up a solid wall or fence.
