

### "Industrial Strength Design: How Brooks Stevens Shaped Your World"



Oscar Mayer Wienermobile by Brooks Stevens, 1958, Brooks Stevens Archive, Milwaukee Art Museum—Stevens redesigned the famous Oscar Mayer Wienermobile in 1958, giving it a futuristic glass bubble nose and a streamlined bun.

the exhibition "Industrial Strength Design: How Brooks Stevens Shaped Your World" from June 7 to Sept. 7, 2003.

The exhibition, organized by the Milwaukee Art Museum, highlights one of the most influential industrial designers of the 20th century and one of the most significant artistic personalities ever to work in Milwaukee. Virtually all Americans have been affected by Stevens' creations, ranging from the Oscar Mayer Wienermobile and the Miller Brewing logo to the widemouthed peanut butter jar.

The exhibition is an appealing blend of the nostalgic, the familiar and the futuristic and provides a compelling retrospective of the evolution of American popular and material culture from the 1930s to the '70s. The exhibition presents four time periods covering Stevens' 60-year career.

Because of his passion for vehicles, his innovative designs will serve as the visual and spatial anchors of the four sections, among them a customized 1930s Cord, a postwar Willys-Overland Jeepster, a Harley-Davidson Hydra-Glide, a prototype Nowhere did Stevens make a bigger mark

The Milwaukee Art Museum will feature 1960s Studebaker, a six-wheeled Briggs and Stratton electric hybrid car, and an Allis-Chalmers tractor. The exhibition brings together objects with which visitors are intimately familiar, such as irons, radios, lawnmowers, logos and a jukebox, as well as designs that bring back memories of the '50s and '60s, the Oscar Mayer Wienermobile and a model of the Olympian Hiawatha train for the Milwaukee Road.

#### Styling

Steven's design work included many "firsts" for the household, helping define the look of the modern home. His pioneer efforts include the first steam iron, the first modern clothes dryer and the first professionally designed mobile home. Stevens was the first to bring what he called "styling" to many ordinary consumer products. For example, he added a glass window to the front of his clothes dryer for Hamilton, turning what he called a "sheet metal box" into an exciting demonstration of the new technology

than in transportation design. His innovative vehicles included the first streamlined tractor-the famous bright orange Allis-Chalmers model B which farmers were proud to own and felt was "pretty enough to drive to church." Stevens' Olympian Hiawatha train, built in the late 1940s for the Milwaukee Road, was among the last and most innovative of the midcentury "streamliners" that defined luxury railway travel. In 1958, he also redesigned the endearing Oscar Mayer Wienermobile. Stevens was extremely influential regarding America's love affair with cars. He worked with more than 50 different automobile lines in the United States and Europe, including American Motors, Volkswagen, Studebaker, Willys-Overland (the original manufacturers of Jeep), Kaiser-Frazer and his family's own company, Excalibur.

#### **Design Philosophy**


The exhibition introduces the concept of design as a major factor in the development of material and popular culture. As the originator and promoter of the concept of "planned obsolescence," Stevens identified himself with the opportunities resulting from America's explosive postwar capitalist growth. To Stevens, planned obsolescence meant the creation of some-

thing a little more stylish, making the former version look unfashionable although still functional. He was interested in shaping the buying patterns of consumers by persuading them to buy something "a little newer, a little better and a little sooner than absolutely necessary." He designed with the next thing constantly in mind. Stevens often said that he considered himself "a businessman, an engineer and a stylist, in that order."

Brooks Stevens was astoundingly prolific. He had more than 2,000 clients during the course of his career and in 1993 claimed that the annual volume of sales of products he had influenced exceeded \$300,000,000.







### Protecting Your Legal Rights— Workplace Harassment by Joette S. Doran, J.D.

The federal anti-discrimination statutes, such as Title VII (race, gender, religion or national origin), the Age Discrimination in Employment Act (an employee over 40), and the Americans with Disabilities Act, are created to protect employees from illegal discrimination and harassment. Harassment is generally defined as unwelcome conduct that adversely affects an individual's employment by unreasonably interfering with work performance or creates an intimidating, hostile or offensive work environment. Today, most compa-

to complain regarding the offensive conduct without fear of retaliation. After receipt of the complaint, the company is legally obligated to investigate the allegations and take prompt remedial action to stop the harassing behavior. A company can be held liable if it fails to take prompt remedial action sufficient to stop the offensive behavior. Additionally, any adverse action by the company against the employee for reporting the harassing conduct can subject the company to legal action for retaliation.

The failure to have an anti-harassment policy can be detrimental to an employer's defense. However, an anti-harassment policy can help protect the employer from legal action in certain circumstances, such as when an employee fails to bring a claim of harassment to its attention. Because under some circumstances, if the employee fails to report the conduct which the company could not have reasonably known for the Northwest Suburban Bar Associaabout, then the company will have a valid tion and is the past-president of Barring-

legal action to hold the company responsible for the offensive conduct. As such, an employer should have a well-drafted and distributed policy against harassment. Also, if you are an employee being subjected to harassing and offensive behavior in the workplace, you are well advised to review the policy, facts and circumstances surrounding the harassing conduct with legal counsel to be certain that your legal rights are being addressed without fear of retaliation. 





### **River Trading Post Partners** with American Indian College Fund

Native American colleges have been called "under-funded miracles" and "economic lifelines" for U.S. Indian reservations.

There are 32 tribal colleges, all founded by Indians to fight high rates of poverty, educational failure and cultural loss. These colleges created the nonprofit American Indian College Fund to raise desperately needed scholarship, endowment and operating monies.

Renowned Native American artists designed the Pendleton Indian trade blankets at River Trading Post. They include United States Senator Ben Nighthorse Campbell (Northern Cheyenne) and Wendy Ponca (Osage). Ponca has won seven first place awards at the Santa Fe Indian Market. Her work is a part of permanent museum collections throughout the nation.

### **Plastic Surgery and People's Fears** by Gary S. Churchill, MD

Many people think and talk about getting plastic surgery for years but fear prevents them from taking that final step and actually carrying through with it. Their concerns are understandable, and undergoing surgery is certainly not something to be taken lightly. Yet many of these fears can be eased with a little more knowledge and some accurate information.

### Fear of the Results

A facelift is probably the procedure most feared by patients. One concern they have is that a facelift won't look natural; nobody wants to look pulled or too tight. The goal is to look refreshed and not as if surgery was performed. So how is this accomplished? Rather than depending on extensive skin undermining and pulling as is commonly done, we use a less invasive technique that depends more on tightening the deeper layers beneath the skin. This lifts and tightens the skin in a more natural way, distributing the tension from beneath the skin rather than directly from the incisions. The result is a faster recovery, a longer lasting result and a very natural look. This technique also minimizes the tension on the incisions resulting in far better healing.

### Fear of Scars

Patients also worry that their scars will show. Unfortunately, many surgeons still use incisions that result in visible scars. But this is not the case with our incisions. After years of experience and constant refinements, we have developed an incision that is virtually undetectable when it has healed. The uniqueness of our incision is that it preserves the hairline in its natural position. While most surgeons place their incision in a straight line in front of the ear where a telltale scar will be seen, we hide the incisions in all the natural creases around and then just inside the ear. We also use dissolving sutures in all the incisions so no staples or sutures ever need to be removed.



Cities Series, including Berlin, New York and Frankfort. His collages combine different media including oil and acrylic paints, canvas and Japanese papers, watercolors, graphic asphalt, and shellac. Another exhibit, "Peter Sehringer: Contemporary German Painting," will show how he alienates motifs through a playful treatment of ambivalent forms, enlargements, color tones and optical illusions.

For over 500 years, the Joan of Arc Chapel was located in the little French village of Chasse in the Rhone River Valley. In 1966, it was moved to Marquette University. He was responsible for much of the stained glass in the cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York.

opened in 1966, was designed and built in the style of an Italian Renaissance village by architect David Adler in 1923. It was originally the residence of former A.O. Smith President Lloyd Smith and his family. This is the only home that Adler designed in his birth city of Milwaukee. The museum features fine and decorative arts dating from the 15th through 18th centuries, with an entire wing of wroughtiron works by master craftsman Cyril Colnik. The Renaissance-style garden with authentic Italian water stairs and stone fishpond was created by Rose Standish Nichols, one of the most influential landscape designers of her day. It was newly restored in 2002.



While thinking about the storage cabinet, I was there once more, standing in the bright afternoon autumn sunlight, the air filled with the smells, not only flowers but of simmering beef, jalapeños, napolitos and mesquite. My host stood at the work counter hand-shaping tortillas.

I recreated the entire scene in the delightful cabinet I made for my client. The cabinet structure itself was designed to replicate and honor joinery fashioned by hand, likened to the influence of the Roman Catholic German immigrants who had brought with them to the New World wonderful woodworking skills and techniques. In the end, my clients really loved
