

Barrington United Methodist Women are busy preparing for their spectacular annual "Rummage Sale" on Friday, Oct. 16 and Saturday, Oct. 17 at the Barrington United Methodist Church, 98 Algonquin Road (southeast corner of Route 59) in Barrington. The sale will take place Friday from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. and Saturday, 9 a.m. to noon. There will be a half-price sale on Friday from 5 to 7 p.m. in selected departments. Those departments will close at 4:45 p.m. and then reopen at 5 p.m. for the half price sale. Saturday shoppers can take advantage of their bargain Bag Sale in selected departments, with all of the goodies you can fit into a \$5 bag!

Proceeds from the sale are distributed to many groups, including many local and Chicago-based organizations that work with women, children, and youth. Funds are also sent to the national organization of United Methodist Women, which is often described as "one of the largest organized women's group in the world!" The group has nearly one million members who contribute to charitable programs and projects throughout the United States and more than 100 countries worldwide.

Looking for "gently used" treasures? The sale. It's an institution in the community. United Methodist Women's (UMW) Rummage Sale was begun during the Depression. Women of the congregation gathered items they no longer needed and brought them to the church, trading with other families. As more items were gathered than could be used, it was decided to begin a rummage sale so others experiencing hard times could share the abundance. The Rummage Sale is an opportunity to pass along unwanted, usable items instead of adding them to a landfill. "Donating items is a great way to 'be green'it's a way of recycling and keeps usable

"You can find most anything from new homes: furniture is donated to St. Anne's Project Hope, children's clothes, books, and toys were given to a local school's rummage sale; books, CDs, videos/DVDs were sent to Red Carpet Books, and specialty items were given to Hands of Hope

Originally, the sale was held at the previous church site on South Hough Street in just a few rooms, where a handful of women spent a few days organizing clothes and kitchen items. The sale now fills up an entire wing of the new building and a tent full of furniture. The lower level contains clothing (including men's, women's and children's), shoes, purses and toys. Departments upstairs include electronics, lamps, books, CDs, videos, computer hardware and software, house wares, tools, linens, holiday items, crafts and fabrics. Countless volunteers help to sort, organize and price the incredible array of items. Furniture, bikes, sporting goods and lawn items are just some of the departments that fill the tent to the seams. One of the outstanding areas not to be missed is the "French Room," filled with carefully selected items of high quality, including china, jewelry, clothing, antiques and collectibles, and other amazing trea-

designer label clothing and famous maker purses to fine lace antique tablecloths, a cute Christmas ornament or a piece of heirloom jewelry," remarked committee chair Mary Mellon.

### **Supreme Court Holds Employers** Not Required to Retroactively Calculate Benefits by Joette S. Doran, Esq.

The United States Supreme Court recently held that an employer's policies qualified as a bona fide seniority system under Title VII, and therefore immunized the company from liability since the policy was not based on an intention to discriminate because of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin In AT&T Corp. v. Hulteen, 129 S.Ct. 1962 (2009), AT&T provided pension and other benefits to employees using a seniority system in which benefits were calculated based on an employee's leave time not credited. In the 1960s and period of service at the company, less any

got full service credit for any period of absence, however those who took a personal leave of absence received up to 30 days of service credit. At that time, the company regarded pregnancy as personal leave. In accordance with the law, in 1977, AT&T instituted a Maternity Payment Plan wherein pregnant employees received disability service credit for up to six weeks of leave but leave beyond six weeks was treated as personal. In 1978, Congress amended Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and enacted the Pregnancy Discrimination Act of 1978 (PDA) which made it unlawful to treat pregnancy related conditions less favorably than other medical conditions. While AT&T changed its policies in accordance with the law it did not make any retroactive adjustments to the service credit calculations of women who had been subject to the policies before the PDA. As a result, four female employees who had taken leave for pregnancy under the pre-PDA policy filed charges of discrimination claiming that their pension benefits were reduced under a discriminatory seniority policy of AT&T. The govern-

discrimination found reasonable cause to determine that AT&T had discriminated against the employees. Thereafter, the female employees filed suit and the trial and appellate court held in their favor. AT&T appealed to the United States Supreme Court which reversed in favor of the company finding that since the policy was based on a then legal interpretation of Title VII, the policy did not reflect the intent to discriminate against female employees on the basis of gender.

# Cosmetic Dentistry: "I Hate My Teeth!"

Those words are heard in dental offices every day. But when the dentist asks the patient, "What do you hate about them?" the answer is usually, "I don't know, I just hate them!"

So many factors contribute to the appearance of teeth. These factors may not be clearly identifiable by the patient but are clearly evident to the dentist that has had training in smile design. When evaluating a smile, the dentist needs to ask himself many questions. Are the edges of the teeth worn? What is the patient doing to wear them down? Do the gums show when smiling? If they show, do they appear to follow the lips or are they canted? Do the edges of the upper teeth follow the shape of the lower lip? Do the upper teeth show while the patient is speaking? Does the midline of the upper teeth line up with the midline of the lower teeth? Do the teeth have a "windswept" appearance that makes the spaces between the teeth look angled? Is the pointed gum tissue that drops down between the teeth even from one side to the other? Is the tooth color appropriate for the patient? The list goes on and on, and it's important to identify what the problem is before trying to fix it.



How do we know if these changes for the patient are the right ones? The dentist can take digital photos of the teeth and make any of the above changes. He can sit down with the patient and show them what their smile could look like. If the patient is pleased, the dentist can then discuss with them their options for treat-

Learning what do to when you "hate" your teeth should not be a stressful experience. Visit your dentist and ask him to review your smile and give you some guidance so you can someday say, "I love

### **New Native Seed Gardener Program** for Barrington Area

This past spring, enthusiastic volunteers of the Native Seed Gardeners (NSG), sponsored by Citizens for Conservation, Audubon-Chicago Region, Friends of Spring Creek Forest Preserves, and Chicago Botanic Garden, placed over 3,000 rare native plants. In its inaugural year, the program offered 22 prairie and savanna plants, with species as rare as baptisia leucantha (white false indigo) and as beautiful as lilium Michiganense (Michigan lily)

The NSG program starts with a seed and ends with a seed. Trained volunteers collect seeds from natural populations in the Barrington area. A portion of the harvest is allocated to the Chicago Botanic Garden for propagation in their greenhouse over the winter. In spring, the seedlings are given to the NSG program.

NSG focuses primarily on plants whose seeds can be a challenge to find or collect in the field, as home gardeners can more easily monitor the ripening process. Program coordinators help volunteers learn when and how to pick the seeds when the plants are mature.

This year, during a five-day period, 311 volunteer gardeners throughout the Chicago area, some from as far away as Steger, Ill., came to Citizens for Conservation's headquarters to pick up their two-monthold seedlings.

As Native Seed Gardeners quietly tend to their gardens, they cultivate a new source of precious native seeds that will restorations. These lands include various org and SpringCreekStewards.org.

### "It's Just My Hygiene Appointment" by Shelley Berg

nomically strained lives, take for granted the health status of their mouths. I hear things like "I need to cancel my appointment because... it's just my hygiene appointment, right? I'm not having any problems. I'll call back to reschedule when..." This raises the question: How and when are cavities, gum disease and oral cancer detected? By the time disease is causing noticeable problems, pain for instance, it may be more difficult and costly to satisfactorily restore a healthy status. Deficits in dental health, much like high blood pressure and other diseases, are easier and less costly to treat when diagnosed early.

As part of a routine dental hygiene appointment, your dentist has the opportunity to find, either by visual exam or by studying the updated X-rays, any cavities that may have silently developed. Some decay can only be found on an X-ray. It's not very easy to see every nook and cranny of the teeth in your own mouth, studying them in the bathroom mirror without X-ray vision!

Just one undetected cavity can result in throbbing pain, the need for a root canal, and then a crown to rebuild and protect the weakened tooth-an investment of over a thousand dollars. A small cavity, detected early, costs up to roughly 10 percent of the aforementioned procedures. The fees for a routine hygiene appointment, including bitewing X-rays, may also Lake.

So often, people in their busy, hectic, eco- add up to approximately one-tenth of major restorative treatment. Maintaining regular hygiene visits, in this case, would be a savings of just 90 percent, not to mention the pain!

Oral cancer is highly curable if diagnosed early. According to data from the Oral Cancer Foundation, one person dies of oral cancer every hour of every day in the U.S. alone! During just a hygiene appointment, both the hygienist and dentist conduct a thorough oral cancer exam. If any suspicious lesions are found, a follow-up appointment to reevaluate the status may be recommended. In this case. the time and financial expenditure for the planned appointment could be the saving of your life!

Attending your scheduled hygiene appointments allows your dental hygienist and dentist to assist you with maintenance of healthy gingival tissues (gums). Periodontal disease silently causes bone loss when left untreated. Loss of bone ultimately leads to loosening of teeth. Detection of gum disease often serves as an alert to underlying health issues such as diabetes, high blood pressure and heart disease. Sure, you can reschedule or postpone "just your hygiene appointment." Again, just your time, money, teeth, health or life may be saved! It's your call!

### Overuse of Contact Lenses Can Lead to Scary Stuff

contact is worn longer than the cornea can tolerate. Not enough oxygen gets to the cornea, resulting in temporary discomfort and blurred vision. Patients sometimes suffer from stabbing pain, extreme light sensitivity, tearing, cloudy, blurred vision and grittiness. Discontinuing the use of contact lenses and wearing glasses for a few-days can ease these early signs of overwear. In some cases, overwear can lead to patients developing long-term changes, such as: corneal thinning, corneal sensitivity, and abnormal blood vessels growing into the otherwise clear cornea. Severe overwear may also result in the inability to wear contact lenses.

There are certain preventive measures you can take as a contact lens wearer to help reduce your chances of overwear. Make sure to use the most-effective updated materials. Silicone hydrogel lenses let the most oxygen pass through to nourish the cornea, although patients wearing these lenses can still experience symptoms. Poor hygiene and noncompliance can also interfere with getting comfortable wear out of your contacts. College students, for instance, may wear their lenses well into the night while studying. They may even start sleeping in daily wear lenses. If no immediate problem occurs, they may continue to overwear their lenses until they develop complications. Some patients also tend to wear their lenses beyond the recommended replacement in-


Contact lens overwear occurs when the terval until their vision becomes significantly blurred or their eyes become red and irritated. In both scenarios, a noncompliant patient can end up with permanent, irreversible corneal damage. When patients disregard cleaning and replacement recommendations, they may be decreasing their contact lens's ability to transmit oxygen to the cornea as deposits accumulate on the lens surface. Patients who continue to wear lenses that have been compromised risk developing infections, giant papillary conjunctivitis (GPC) and most importantly, potentially serious long-term changes. Many patients regard contact lenses as commodities, not medical devices. They don't understand they're risking temporary, even permanent, eye damage when they take shortcuts with their contact lens care.

Listen to your body. There should be a feeling of having nothing in your eyes while wearing contact lenses. And give your eyes a break one day of the week and wear your glasses. If you're experiencing symptoms, call Dr. Gebert or Dr. Prate for an appointment. They will discuss options for each individual. 

### Don't Let Heel Pain Keep You Out of the Game

If foot or ankle pains are interfering with your daily activities, Dr. Baird is ready to help. Dr. James Baird is a local Podiatric Physician and Surgeon and is now accepting new patients at his Barrington office. Here is his answer to a common question from those dealing with plantar fasciitis.

After six months of treatment for my heel pain (diagnosed as plantar fasciitis) I am still suffering. I do not have time for surgery. Are there any other options for relief?

Plantar fasciitis çan be very stubborn at times. Most people respond to conservative treatments consisting of rest, ice, stretching, orthotics, night splints, oral medication and injections. If after that conservative treatment you still are experiencing pain in the heel, we would classify it as resistant plantar fasciitis and proceed onto the next form of treatment, which is either surgery or a noninvasive procedure called Extracorporeal Shockwave Therapy (ESWT).

ESWT is a safe and proven, noninvasive therapy that relieves pain by directing sound waves into the plantar fascia, the band of fibers that run from your heel to

your toes. It is a 25-minute procedure done in the office under a local anesthetic. The procedure breaks up the scar tissue in the plantar fascia, essentially waking up the body, to allow the healing process to occur. This being said, the results are not instant. It will take approximately 10 weeks to feel the full benefits of the procedure. During this time you can perform all normal daily activities and no time off of work will be needed. You will want to continue to do daily stretching and wear appropriate shoe gear at all times. The ESWT procedure is attractive to many because it is not an invasive surgery and there are very few risks or complications related to the procedure.

There is no reason to live with heel pain. If you fall into the group that has not responded to conservative treatment then ESWT may be the procedure you have been looking for. To schedule a consultation with Dr. James Baird call 1-847-381-5011.
