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
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PROLOGUE

The theme of the year 2000 White House Millennium Council was to “Honor the Past, Imagine the Future.” The intent was to help Americans of all ages to build new bridges and repair old breaches – welcoming the next one thousand years in a spirit of remembrance, hope and joy. It is in this spirit that this project, identifying the township of Barrington’s involvement in the Civil War, is undertaken. We honor all those citizens who participated in this great conflict and pay special tribute to those who gave their lives to enable our country to remain intact and develop to be the great nation that it is today. It is important that significance of the events of the Civil War is not lost in today’s lifestyle both for our own well-being and that of our children.

The Civil War was the most wide-spread and costliest war ever fought on our homeland. The number of men involved and casualties, both wounded and killed, far exceeded all of the military encounters that the United States had encountered at that time put together (6,300,000 involved, 620,000 killed or wounded). Interestingly enough, the inevitability of the encounter between the North and the South was recognized back at the time of our Nation’s birth when the Declaration of Independence and Constitution were being written. In a real sense, the Civil War and its effects are a work-in-progress with the results still being felt today in our every-day lives.

What was the make-up of Barrington at that time? What was its response to our nation’s crisis? It is inevitable in an endeavor of this sort that names of important individuals will be inadvertently omitted along with important happenings. We invite you, the readers, to submit your thoughts and ideas along with any oversights to be used in possible future updatings of this effort.

INTRODUCTION

Our Founding Fathers in 1776 declared that “all men are created equal” but could not reach agreement to abolish the institution of slavery. It was believed and hoped that slavery would soon wither away, but it didn't. It persisted and grew in intensity along with State's rights and beliefs in the South. At 4:30 a.m. on April 12, 1861, the Confederate States fired the opening shot of the Civil War at Fort Sumpter, a Union fort on an island in Charleston Bay. Ironically, both sides thought that the war would last but 3-6 months at the most. Each side thought that the other would not have the gumption nor the means to conduct a prolonged encounter. How wrong they both were!

Barrington was a small but thriving community at that time, growing from the first settlers in 1834, to the naming of the township in 1840 and finally being granted a charter by the State of Illinois on February 16, 1865. Railroad activity began in the mid-1850's, which had great influence in population and industrial growth. The first great battle of the Civil War was at Bull Run (Manassas) on July 21, 1861, which resulted in a Union defeat and the bloody encounter at Shiloh (Pittsburgh Landing) on April 7, 1862, a Union victory, but extremely costly (Union casualties killed, wounded or missing were 13,047 and the South 10,694) made both sides realize that the war would not be an easy one.

BARRINGTON – (1800-1865)

It is hard to believe, looking back at the 1800-1865 period from our viewpoint in 2009, that Barrington, which didn't become a Township until 1863, had to concern itself with Indians peering through their windows, were part of the Indiana Territory for awhile, and didn't enjoy a railroad connection until late in that time span. Take a look at what Barrington and its inhabitants were at that time:

PERIOD	EVENT
1790	Indiana Territory, including Illinois, organized by Congressional Action. William Henry Harrison was Governor.
1809	Illinois Territory was established, to include the present state of Wisconsin. Kaskaskia was the territorial capital and Ninian Edwards the Governor.
1818	Illinois was admitted as the twenty-first state of the United States. The State capital at Kaskaskia was moved to Vandalia in 1820. In 1839, the seat of the government was moved to Springfield.
1820-1845	Pottawatomies and other tribes were active in the area during this period but were mostly friendly. Early settlers tell of waking in the morning to find Indians peering through their windows.
1831-1839	The Barrington area was under the rule of ten county governments from the erection of the Northwest Territory in 1790 (Knox County) to Cook County in 1831 and Lake County in 1839.
1834	The first settlers in Barrington Township were Jesse F. Miller and William Van Orsdal. Amos Flint was also reported as having settled about that period
1841	The first frame house in Barrington Township was built by Shubuel W. Kingsley on Penny Road west of Sutton Road. Before that, all houses were built of logs.
1850	First Town meeting of the Township of Barrington held on April 2 at the south end of Miller's Grove.
1854	First railroad stop in Barrington.
1863	By a vote of 29 to 4, the Township government of Barrington Station voted to incorporate as Barrington. This was chartered by the State of Illinois on February 16, 1865. The population was about 300.

This is what Barrington resembled on April 12, 1861. At 4:30 a.m., in Charleston Harbor in South Carolina, General A. T. Beauregard of the Confederate forces ordered firing to begin on Fort Sumpter, under the command of Major Anderson. The Civil War had begun and the supporters for both sides were quick to respond. The most tragic and costliest war in our nation's history was underway!

RESPONSE TO MR. LINCOLN'S CALL

In July, 1862, President Abraham Lincoln called for 300,000 volunteers which was met most enthusiastically throughout the North with new recruits chanting to a popular hymn of the day "We are coming, Father Abraham, three hundred thousand more" as they marched to the war. 179 men registered for military service with the Township of Barrington as their address. Over the span of the war, the Miller's Grove Methodist Church was an active enlisting center. Today it is the site of a Korean church and has a memorial with the names of 98 Barringtonians who enlisted at that recruiting center. An adjoining cemetery contains the gravesites of 10 Civil War veterans.

In the book entitled "A History of Barrington, Illinois" by Arnett C. Lines, the spirit that existed at the time is beautifully described:

Bob Purcell, who lived on Main Street back of the round-house, and his fireman Peter Miller, next door were an engine crew for years on the in-and-out of Barrington local trains. Purcell was running an engine at the outbreak of the Civil War, with Charles Thorp Sr. and said to his partner, "Come on, let's join up; they are calling for volunteers. We can have this war ended in three months." He "joined up" and so did Thorp, and they were in the same company until Purcell was taken prisoner.

*Regiment became a part of the Army of the Frontier under Generals Curtis and Herron. From the Lamine, the Regiment marched by way of Cassville, Mo., along the “wire road,” skirmishing all the way with the retreating rebel army, to Sugar Creek in Arkansas, where, in the 6th, 7th and 8th of March, 1862, it participated in the battle of Pea Ridge, Arkansas, where, although the rebel army outnumbered the Federal army two to one, we won a complete and brilliant victory, and saved St. Louis from Price’s grasp. At this battle, Col. Julius White commanded the Brigade composed of the 37th and 59th Illinois, and Davidson’s Peoria Battery.

From 10 a.m. of the 7th of March until sundown, this Brigade met and repulsed the onslaught of 6,000 rebels under General McCullough and McIntosh, both of whom were killed in front of this Brigade. The night of the 7th, the Regiment slept on its arms, and the next day renewed the fight, and at 11 a.m. a general charge was made, which resulted in putting Price’s army to flight and our taking many prisoners. The rebel army numbered 35,000 men, and were completely whipped and forced to retreat south by General Curtis’ Union army of 15,000. For his gallant handling of his heroic Brigade at this battle, Colonel White was made a Brigadier General of Volunteers. At this battle the 37th lost, killed, 21; wounded, 114-total, 135.

Mustering Out:

37th was mustered out of the U.S. service at Houston, Texas, and reached Springfield, IL, May 31, 1866, where it received final payment and discharge, having been in the service of the United States for four years and ten months, and having participated in eleven hard fought battles and sieges and innumerable skirmishes, and having marched a distance of 17,846 miles as follows: By steam, 14,560 miles; on foot, 3,286 miles, according to the tabulated statement kept by Henry Ketzle, Veteran of Co. A.

*Of the Regiments of Miller's and Stanley's Brigades of Negley's Division, the Nineteenth Illinois, leading without orders, rushed to the river, and checked the enemy. Then the Nineteenth crossed the river, reformed on the opposite side, protected by the bank of the river, and charged on a Rebel battery, eagerly followed by other troops, which drove the Rebels back to their position, captured four guns and a Rebel flag, and defeated the plan of Bragg to break our left.

** Here, the Nineteenth Illinois did its fullest duty, with other as brave and patriotic commands as itself, performing acts of bravery and devotion to the flag unsurpassed in any battle of modern warfare. Here, during a long hour, between 2 and 3 p.m., all the assaults of three Divisions of Longstreet's Corps., supported by Preston's and Hindman's Divisions, were repulsed with slaughter by our troops, not over 5,000 strong, but the bravest of the brave; but when Hindman's Division was ready to take our position in flank, and the men were preparing to die, Steadman's Division arrived, and rolled back the Rebel wave. Here the Nineteenth Illinois, like others fought till night, and withdrew in the dark. The loss of the Regiment in this battle was great.

The Nineteenth Illinois Infantry Regiment left Chicago on July 12, 1861, one thousand strong, and was mustered out with less than 350, July 9, 1864.

Sharing with the rest of the army in its privations during the siege, The Regiment took an active part in the battle of Missionary Ridge November 25, 1863, its colors being among the first planted on the Ridge. On the 28th started under Sheridan for Knoxville, Tenn., to relieve Burnside. Reached that point December 6. Moving out on the 12th, marched to different points east of

Knoxville until it bivouacked in midwinter at Blain's Cross Roads on the 17th. Re-enlisting at this place January 1, 1864, the Regiment started

January 6 for Chattanooga to arrange details of muster for new term of service, preparatory to veteran furlough. Returning, left Nashville, Tenn., March 26, for Chattanooga, marching nearly the entire route. May 3, started on the Atlanta campaign; was under fire almost daily, with quite severe fighting at Rocky Face Ridge, Resaca, Adairsville, New Hope Church, Kenesaw Mountain, Peach Tree Creek and Jonesboro, marching into Atlanta September 8. On September 25 was ordered back to Chattanooga.

Disbanded at Springfield, Illinois on October 27, 1865.
