

## "Cocoanut Grove" Is Week-End Bill at Catlow Theatre

"Doctor Rhythm," Starring Bing Crosby, Begins Run Wednesday

Wayne Morris, star of "Kid Galahad," further proves his acting ability in "The Kid Comes Back," coming to the Catlow theatre this Friday and Saturday.

On the double feature bill on Friday and Saturday with "The Kid Comes Back," is "Rascals," starring Jane Withers, with Rochelle Hudson and Norrah Minnervich and his Gang.

Before his movie days, Fred MacMurray was a band leader. As a band leader, his highest ambition was to play an engagement in the famous Cocoanut Grove of the Biltmore Hotel, Hollywood. Well, he's in "Cocoanut Grove," at last—but it's a picture, named after the night-spot.

In the new film, which comes to the Catlow Sunday and Monday, MacMurray plays a part that is an almost exact prototype of his own life. He is a swing-happy young head leader, hurrying across the country, never more than two leaps ahead of the sheriff, and trying desperately to get the much sought after audition at the Catlow.

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## News Briefs

### Oldest Resident in Lake County Dies at Antioch

Mrs. Sarah Emmons, who celebrated her one-hundredth birthday on February 1st, died last week at the home of her daughter, Miss Alice Emmons, in Antioch. Mrs. Emmons was the oldest resident in Lake County. She came to the Antioch vicinity 95 years ago with her parents, Joseph and Sarah Hana. They travelled from Syracuse, N. Y. Mrs. Emmons' birthplace, by boat to Kenosha.

### State Senate Approves Sanitarium Bond Issue

The state senate last week passed legislation enabling Lake County to issue bonds on anticipated revenue for the construction of a tuberculosis sanitarium. Passed previously by the house of representatives, the enabling act is now before Governor Henry Horner for his signature. When approved by his signature, the county board will consider the feasibility of a bond issue and the application for a federal grant of \$100,000 to construct the sanitarium near Waukegan.

### Heights Motorists May Transmit Fines By Mail

The village of Arlington Heights has adopted a plan whereby motorists charged with violation of traffic regulations may transact the necessary business through the assistance of Uncle Sam's mail carriers and he saved the bother and embarrassment of appearing before a police magistrate. Arrest tickets now being used in Arlington Heights carry on the reverse side a price list, showing the amount of the fine and costs for the various infractions. The motorist is given the privilege of mailing the fine and costs to the village hall, and is not required to appear. However, if the arrest is

to be contested, the motorist party is advised to appear in court. The tickets are numbered and failure to comply with the law will bring further police action, it is reported.

### Divorced by Spouse, Man Attempts Suicide

Dependent because his wife had divorced him, William Watson of Chicago attempted to commit suicide by slashing his wrist with a safety razor blade in Des Plaines last week. He was found lying on a North River road early Wednesday morning and taken to the Northwest hospital at Des Plaines for treatment. Although suffering from the loss of considerable blood, hospital authorities said he would survive.

### 18 Months Old Elgin Girl Victim of Rabies

Patricia Ann Manson, 18-month-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Manson of Elgin, died at the Sherman hospital in Elgin Thursday night of complications that resulted from two minor bites by a stray puppy seven weeks prior to her death. Regarded as insignificant at the time, the cuts were treated at home with an antiseptic and nothing more thought of the matter until last Thursday when the child became seriously ill. Death was attributed to rabies. The puppy had been taken in for the night by the Manson family and the child was bitten the next morning when she attempted to pet the dog as it was feeding. The animal was later turned loose.

### Swollen Glands Kills Girl After Fall From Swing

An enlarged gland was blamed for the death of Mary Martha Yonce, six-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Yonce of Lake Forest, who died at the Lake Forest hospital last Thursday while being treated for a minor injury. The child fell from a swing in the yard and struck a bicycle belonging to her brother, and was taken to the Alice Home hospital to be treated for a wrist gash. She died while under a gas anesthetic. Members of the Lake Forest fire department worked over

her for more than an hour with a palmator but could not revive her.

### Des Plaines Gets Smaller As Land Is Withdrawn

The city of Des Plaines finds itself shrinking, and not because of any rainy weather. A court decision earlier this month permitted the disannexation of 40 acres of land from the city proper. The same decision, however, denied a petition that an adjacent piece of property be disannexed. A second piece is due to separate if proceedings started in court are successful. The property no longer part of the city is located north of Thacker street between Mount Prospect road and the Chicago and Northwestern railroad property.
