Your Committee was appointed to investigate and report to the Post the feasibility of continued ownership of the present Legion building. We have considered this problem and herewith submit our report.

PROBLEM - The Post is confronted with the burden of constantly advancing additional funds to maintain our building. It is difficult to find regular tenants who will pay a rent which is sufficient to offset the cost of operating the building.

PROBLEM • We find that our building has an average gross income of \$1200.00 per year. The cost of operating the premises is approximately \$1500.00 per year. This leaves an operating deficit of \$300.00 a year minimum. All this deficit must be covered by the Post in addition to the annual rent which we already pay. These figures do not reflect any allowance for capital expenses or major repairs and decorating to the premises. If we were to amortize these expenses over the years it is clear that the annual deficit is at least \$500.00 per year. Nor do these figures reflect the value of free service donated by our members in grass cutting, painting and repairs. It would be a conservative estimate that all factors considered our Post is paying approximately \$1200.00 per year to maintain our meeting place. This figures down to \$50.00 per meeting. A price which other organizations are reluctant to pay.

POSSIBLE SOLUTION - Your Committee has considered three possible solutions. (1) Continuing to operate as at present; (2) Sale of the premises; (3) Rental of these premises to a tenant for storage or other purposes.

We are in agreement that it is not economical to continue to operate the building as at present. That we must plan for the future by reducing the expense of our meeting place.

This problem will become increasingly acute as the income of the Pest from paper drives drops. It is our opinion that the gross revenue from the building from new tenants cannot be materially increased. Most organizations and individuals will not pay our actual costs of operation. In event we lower the rents to the point where we can obtain more tenants we feel we are just subsidizing them with below cost meeting facilities.

We do not feel that our situation can be improved by installing a bar. This will put us in competition with local business. We will have to incur a large increase in our insurance rates for dram shop insurance. Such a bar could never hope to be profitable on a part time basis. We will have to employ a bar tender with the attendant problem of supervision to keep his figers out of the till. Those of us who have talked to other organizations which maintain bar have discovered that in nearly all instances they have proved to be more of a burden than a help.

Your Committee is generally agreed that the/solution is the best for our Post. We should now seriously consider selling the premises. At present we are under no urgency financially and can take the time to obtain the very best price.

In considering the possibility of sale your Committee has been advised that vacant property along Northwest Highway should be valued at figures from \$150.00 per front foot and up.

Since our property is ideally located and we can take the time we should be able to obtain the top price. Your Committee has purposely refrained from placing a value on the property because we do not feel this is our province.

Assuming our Post does sell its property your Committee has given thought to the problems which we must face at that time. We will need a new meeting place. However, we feel this can be solved by arranging for space like other local organizations. We feel that we could obtain a meeting place for a nominal charge at the Ten Pin. We would have catering and liquor facilities available for those who want them. As a matter of fact we feel that the Post could probably afford to furnish coffee and sandwiches. If we were to assume that the Post had a fund of \$40,000.00 invested we would receive about \$1200.00 per year. This income coupled with the annual dues available to the Post would mean that we have approximately \$1500.00 per year to spend on the Post and its activities. Sufficient safeguards could be adopted into the By-Laws to insure the principal could only be expended by a sizeable vote of the membership.

We feel that it is to the best advantage of the Post that we do not list the property for sale but that we appoint a member to whom all inquiries can be referred. He can report to the Post periodically and in event that an offer is made it can be referred to the Post for consideration. This will provide a means of procedure and a person to start it into operation if a good offer is made. At the same time we will not be involved in listing with a broker or be in the position of

peddling our property.

We have considered the possibility of the front portion of the property being sold and the present building be retained. It is conceivable this could be done under favorable conditions. Certainly we would not receive top value on such a sale because the reduction in size would destroy part of its value. It is hard to believe this is other than a remote possibility. We would still be saddled with the same expense of operation with less capital to invest and less income from investments.

The Committee feels the third solution is not too practical. If the premises are rented to a tenant we would have the same problem of finding a new meeting place and using the rentals from the building to apply on the expense of operating the Post. If the rent were large enough this might be done.

RECOMMENDATIONS - Your Committee makes the following recommendations:

- (1) That the Post determine that it will sell or rent the present premises provided that a satisfactory purchase price or rent is offered.
- (2) That at this time no figure for sale or rental be fixed by the Post.
- (3) That Roy Klepper be appointed as the sole representative to whom all inquiries regarding sale or rental be referred.
- (4) That he report periodically at least semiannually on any activities.
- (5) That any bonafide offers to purchase or rent be reported to the Post for its action.

(6) That in event of sale the By-Laws be amended to insure that only the income from investments be used for normal Post operations.

This is to notify you that I have completed an audit of the Barrington Post funds for the 2-year period from August of 1960 through August of 1962 and have determined the following to be its current cash position:

The post finance officer's records were found to be in very good order. As near as I could determine, there were no disbursements or receipts that had not been accounted for.

At the time of our last audit of post funds which was as of August 1, 1960, our cash position was determined to be \$568.94 which included some \$544.35 in savings. During the past 2-year audit period it was found necessary to transfer the savings to the post checking account in order to meet current obligations.

In other words the Post's cash position has declined from \$568.94 to \$275.14 during the period just audited. This fact stresses the importance of a stepped-up program for acquiring additional income during the current year.

Attached you will find a proposed budget for the year 1962-3. You will notice this budget is based on a break-even basis. Of course any possible additional income that can be derived from Smokers or other social activities over and above that budgeted will serve to improve our cash position.
