



Songs on Stone

JAMES MCNEILL WHISTLER

and the Art of Lithography

towering figure in 19th-century art, a brilliant creator and theoretician whose original experiments inform and color shocked and enthralled critics and the public on both sides of the Atlantic. While his paintings and etchings are well known, some of his most radical and elegant work was done in lithography. The Art Institute of Chicago is presenting the first major museum exhibition to focus on the full range of Whistler's achievements in lithography within the context of his art as a whole, including some of his greatest paintings, pastels, watercolors, drawings and etchings. "Songs on Stone: James McNeill Whistler and the Art of Lithography" is on view in the Art Institute's Regenstein Hall, The Daniel F. and Ada L. Rice Building, now through August 30,

Whistler was a master painter/printmaker who used the difficult but exquisitely responsive medium of lithography to capture and refine the purest essence of his avant-garde ideas about art-making and subject matter. "Songs on Stone" displays a grouping of more than 200 works in various media that, when taken together, shed new light on the artist's working methods.

Organized by theme, the exhibition features "nocturnes" (Whistler's famous nighttime views of London's river Thames

ames McNeill Whistler (1834-1903) is a and Battersea Bridge); intimate studies of Maud Franklin, the artist's mistress; bustling shop fronts in late 19th-century Chelsea and Paris; young models dancing or posing in translucent drapery; and haunting portraits of family and friends.

While Whistler's paintings were often at the center of public controversy, his work in lithography was less well-known to his contemporaries. This situation freed him to experiment in that medium with both materials and methods of depiction that ultimately played a critical role in his evolution as an artist. "Songs on Stone" juxtaposes Whistler's lithographs with his related works in other media to explore and illuminate the artist's practice of rendering the same subject over and over with different materials, different inks, different papers, etc.-in a dogged search for the technique best-suited to the realization of his vision. One can see in the breathtaking results the process of a master bringing his art and his craft to ever higher levels.

Approximately two-thirds of the works featured in the exhibition are drawn from the Art Institute's extensive Whistler holdings, which include the long-term loan of the renowned Mansfield-Whittemore-Crown collection of lithographs. The exhibition also celebrates the May 1998 release of the Art Institute's definitive twovolume catalogue raisonne of Whistler's

lithographs after more than a decade of research and preparation.

In addition to his prodigious talents as an artist, Whistler was a highly original designer and decorator whose strong views on harmony in arrangements led to an active participation in the display of his works during his lifetime. He designed the frames for his paintings, drawings, prints and made elaborate decorative schemes for his exhibitions-from the typography of the exhibition catalogue and banners to the colors of floor coverings, invitations, flowers and even the clothing of the gallery attendants. "Songs on Stone" illustrates many of Whistler's ideas about exhibition installation, from the color schemes he favored at various points in his career to his own design for the framing of his lithographs.

James McNeill Whistler is one of the greatest artists this country has produced. Born in Lowell, Massachusetts, he lived a remarkable life as an expatriate American in London and Paris. His career spanned half a century, during which he played a defining role in many of the artistic currents of his time, from Realism and Aestheticism to Symbolism and the birth of Modernism. His art and ideas were unorthodox for their time, and by positioning himself as a reformer of popular taste, he invited controversy at many turns. Whistler pioneered the "art for art's sake" credo of the Aesthetic Movement, which he epitomized with a new style of picture: quiet but intense, purely

beautiful and devoid of moralistic or narrative content. It was Whistler who made the startlingly modern declaration that "a picture [is] an arrangement of light, form and color," and it was Whistler who actually gave the title of the famous portrait of his mother as Arrangement in Gray

and Black.

Today, Whistler is revered for the quiet power of his portraits and the mesmerizing purity of his nearly abstract nocturnes —the musically titled genre of paintings and prints he created as arrangements of color and/or tone that were intended to communicate mood, time of day and atmospheric effect. As a printmaker, Whistler has long been admired for the delicacy and freedom of his etchings; less familiar are the 179 images he created in the medium of lithography.


Whistler made his first serious lithographs in 1878, encouraged and guided by the London printer Thomas Way. His early experiments were made in the studio, working mainly with greasy lithographic crayons on stone. At that time, lithography was a young (80 years old) medium, mainly associated with garishly colored reproductions. It was considered the lowly tool of sign makers and adver-

tisers and generally disdained by fine art-

ists, with some notable exceptions. At first, Whistler hoped lithography might help him reach a broader audience, despite the fact that his early lithographs were boldly experimental, already displaying the minimalism that so challenged his contemporaries. Almost immediately, Whistler became even more adventurous in his technique, painting on stones in wash lithography (lithotint) as he sat on a barge in the Thames. By the late 1880s, when he began to work seriously and prolifically in transfer lithography (a process that allowed him to draw directly on specially coated papers that would in turn release images to the surface of the stone,) Whistler came to realize that his lithographs were too refined to achieve widespread popularity.

Undaunted, he continued to use the medium to explore some of his most important themes, abandoning it only in 1897, the year after the tragic death of his wife, Beatrix Godwin Whistler. It is in Whistler's lithographs that we see his most distilled expressions about art; his "Songs on Stone," as he described them, communicate with the purity of poetry or

Judy realized that standards were needed in the industry for women with mastectomies. It would give women the opportunity to make a choice. A woman would be able to go to a facility such as LaBelle that carries forms which accommodate at least the basic four kinds of mastectomy surgery: The Radical, Modified Radical, Simple and Lumpectomy. And a woman would be able to go to a place that carries a full line of bras to accommodate these surgeries.

In the midst of all the controversy over silicone-gel breast implants, there are still voices that haven't been heard—the voices of the breast cancer survivors who chose not to have reconstructive surgery or implants. Retailers, such as LaBelle, provide options for those women, the women who choose breast forms. 





Athletic Mouthgards— They are Not All Alike

The summer is ending and it's time to think about getting the kids off to school. The checklist should include making sure recall appointments are up to date, school dental forms have been filled out and outstanding treatments completed. Student athletes should also have their mouthguards made before sports season.





Latest Technology for Facelift Surgery by Iliana E. Sweis, MD

Aging of the face is inevitable. With time, the effects of gravity, genetics and sun exposure begin to demonstrate their impact on our appearance. Fine wrinkles begin to appear at the corners of the eyes. The sharply demarcated jaw line becomes less defined with the appearance of jowls, and the smooth contours of the neck are lost. The actual timing of when these events take place varies from person to person. But once these signs of aging become apparent, a facelift also known as rhytidectomy could provide the desired facial rejuvenation.

What is a Facelift?

lower two-thirds of the face. It addresses the sagging neck, jowls and cheeks. It may be combined with liposuction of the neck and tightening of the muscles in the neck to provide a tighter, smoother contouring. The incision for the facelift extends from the patient's temple hairline, down in front of and then just inside the ear, and then continues around the lobe behind the ear and back into the hairline. All incisions are placed where they would fall in a natural crease or hidden within the patient's hair. The skin is then raised and the underlying soft tissues are tightened. This places the tension beneath the skin and prevents a pulled or "too tight" look. The skin is then redraped over the underlying tissues. The excess skin is trimmed and the incisions are closed with fine sutures. Depending on the extent of surgery, the procedure can last from two to four hours. Following the surgery, the patient will have a dressing placed to protect the entire area where the incisions have been made and the skin has been raised. A facelift may also be combined with eyelid and forehead surgery to pro-

vide rejuvenation of the upper one-third of the face.

What Can the Patient **Expect After Surgery?**

A facelift allows rejuvenation of the Most patients report very little pain after surgery, however there is some degree of discomfort due to the swelling. The patient will be instructed to sleep with the head elevated on two or three pillows. Medication is prescribed to allow the patient to tolerate the mild pain. The dressing that was applied immediately following surgery is removed on the first day after surgery. Recovery usually takes between two to three weeks, although most patients are able to go back to work in two weeks. The incisions are barely noticeable even early on since they are hidden in natural contours and the hair.

Where Can This Surgery be Performed?

Facelifts are commonly performed at The Plastic Surgery and Laser Center. Some patients prefer to spend the night there while others go home following surgery. Either twilight or general anesthesia is used. Facelifts can also be done in the hospital.





Poor Report Cards: What to Do

dren are concerned about finishing up the school year and are excited about the long awaited summer vacation. But before floating about the pool with ease, there is one last hurdle to jump. Shortly, schools will be distributing fourth marking period report cards. The skills developed during the year will be your child's foundation for the more difficult work ahead. What should you do if you are unhappy with your child's report card?

According to Dr. Raymond Huntington, founder and president of Huntington Learning Center, "Parents know their own children. If you believe your child could be doing better than his or her grades show, you owe it to yourself and your child to remedy the situation."

"More than current grades are at stake," Huntington continues, "If grades are mediocre or poor, it means your child is not gaining valuable skills. This can come back to haunt children later. The skills children learn in school are like building blocks. If a skill is not learned adequately, future skills will suffer. When a child tries to build advanced skills on a shaky foundation of knowledge, there is likely to be trouble ahead."

Mediocre or poor grades can result from a variety of problems. Dr. Huntington offers the following suggestions for what to do when a child brings home a


This is the time of year when many chil- It is important to remember that every drop in grades indicates that valuable skills are being missed. An effort should be made to learn and reinforce those missing skills. While this is being done, it is also important to identify and remedy the basic problem, so it does not continue to hurt your child's education.

> 2. What is really the problem? Is there a behavior problem? Sometimes, bright students get bad grades for behavior related activities. Does your child hand in homework? Is it correct and on time? Is your child bored with schoolwork, and therefore is not paying enough attention? These are not excuses; they are symptoms of different problems. You must identify the problem before you can remedy it.

> 3. Talk with your child. Why does your child think he or she got poor grades? Does he or she take the situation seriously? How does he or she plan to do better? It is important that your child knows you take the situation seriously. Work with your child to develop a plan that will help achieve better grades. Let your child know that you are supportive and that you believe in his or her abilities.

4. Talk with your child's teacher or counselor. Your child's teacher or counselor is a professional educator. What are his or her observations? What does he or she recommend?

Red Oaks in Long Grove, Illinois, will host a special signing event featuring Mr. Janssens of HB Henriot Quimper on Friday and Saturday, July 10 and 11, from 11:00 am to 4:00 pm. Come experience the Provence through the craftsmanship of Quimper pottery. View a video of the 300-year-old handpainting process of the charming French folk pottery inspired by Breton country life. Mr. Janssens will be personally signing Quimper pieces selected that day.

The handpainted French faience known as Quimper (kam-pair) dates back to 1690. The pottery takes its name from the town of Quimper, located in northwestern France, where potter Jean-Baptiste Bousquet built his kilns. Quimper Faience is a fine grain earthenware decorated with

an opaque, tin-based glaze. Each piece of Quimper Faience is completely hand painted without the use of decal or stencil. Signed by the artist and completely painted by one person from start to finish, it reflects the individual touches which makes each piece unique.

During the late 1800's, items featuring sturdy Breton peasants in their traditional garb, men in bragoubraz (baggy pantaloons) and women in long dresses, aprons, and towering headdresses known as coiffes, and elaborate botanical scenes were introduced. Slowly, these are being revived, and today the atelier produces 30 patterns as well as special orders for decors presently not in production. IRAs for Your Children

by Sharon L. Keller, J.D., LLM

Summer is upon us. It is wonderful to hear the birds singing and to feel the warmth of the sun.

During the summer months, many of our children work part-time for additional spending money. This article focuses on discussing the opportunities for our children to save and invest their earnings while taking advantage of the time value of compounding interest.

Generally, when you think of an IRA, you think of an adult work force. However, your children can contribute funds to an IRA for themselves with their earnings from their summer jobs. Further, you as parents-or anyone else for that matter-can make a gift to your child equal to the amount being contributed to the IRA, and it can be made gift-tax free.

No matter how small a contribution you make to an IRA, if it is made at an early enough age, it can grow substantially over time. For example, \$2,000 contributed to an IRA for each year from age 14 to age 20, with interest at 10%, will yield an astounding \$1,811,484 by the age of 70! In fact, a mere six years of funding starting at age 14 yields almost \$1 million more by age 70 than ongoing annual funding started at age 30.

One drawback is that on reaching the age of majority, age 18 in Illinois, your child may withdraw the money. However, under the present tax laws, a 10% penalty is applied to any withdrawal prior to the age of 591/2. In addition, income tax will be imposed on withdrawals from the stan-



There are a number of types of IRAs that may be utilized, including the new Roth IRA established by the "Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997." There are basic rules for IRAs that must be considered before a contribution can be made for a child. All IRA contributions require earned income and the filing of tax returns reflecting that earned income. In most states, a person must be over the age of 14 to be employed.

With a little guidance from you, your children may begin a savings plan at an early age and experience the managing of their own investments. Have a safe Fourth of July! See you next month.
