"I believe that by working with local banks to provide loans that are below the prevailing interest rates to community organizations, we are investing in our communities, helping them to grow and flourish," said Treasurer Topinka.

"The Treasurer's Targeted Initiative Program is designed to support organizations that provide nurturing care for children of working parents, help individuals find jobs, prevent the early institutionalization of the elderly, care for the disabled, cure the ill and many other initiatives that revitalize and strengthen the community," Topinka said.

Some of the organizations that have recently utilized the Treasurer's Targeted Initiative Program, with an estimated \$10-\$12 million per year savings to the State of Illinois, are listed below:

Summer brings warm weather, outdoor symptoms. Some people also find that a activities and opportunities for insect bites and itchy rashes. A little knowledge about these things can go a long way to identifying, treating and then preventing additional bites.

What summer would be complete without bumblebees gracefully dancing among the flowers? Unfortunately, the downside to this romantic picture is that they-along with many other flying insects-can produce annoying and painful stings. Bites of bees, hornets, yellow jackets and mosquitoes are common during the summer August.

Local reactions to bites occur in two phases. First, the skin around the bite, may develop a "bump" associated with pain or itching. When this happens, make sure the stinger is out and, if it isn't, use a scraping motion to drag the stinger out of the skin. Do not grab or squeeze the stinger—this may actually release more venom into the bite leading to more pain or itching. Next, you can apply cold packs, calamine lotion and topical anesthetics containing Benzocaine to help relieve some of the

paste of baking soda or meat tenderizer mixed with a little water helps relieve pain and decreases the reaction.

Hours later, you may experience the second phase of the local reaction to a bite. The area around the bite may become red and even a little swollen-this is normal. Call your doctor, however, if signs of a severe allergic reaction develop: difficulty breathing or wheezing; swelling around the face, lips or tongue; or severe swelling, such as an entire arm or leg. Anybody who has had a severe allergic months with their numbers peaking in reaction to insect venom in the past should carry an emergency kit. Ask your doctor about these and how to use them.

To avoid bug bites, wear light colored, solid fabrics that cover arms and legs. Bees are especially attracted to bright colors and floral prints. Avoid perfumes and colognes. And apply insect repellent containing DEET every three to four hours when in insect infested areas and during the cooler evening hours when the mosquitoes are out in large numbers. (For children and pregnant women, however, avoid products containing DEET.)

#### **Back Problems: The Psoas Major**

How often have you heard the term or hips "double-jointed"? In reality, being double-jointed is a myth. It is confused with hypermobility or laxity in the joints. #### When Should Your Child Visit the Orthodontist?

The American Association of Orthodontists recommends that a child's first visit to an orthodontist should take place no later than age seven. This may surprise you, because orthodontic treatment is usually associated with adolescence. #### **How to Choose a Dance School** for Your Child

You should always visit the school in person. The following are some guidelines as to how to choose a school in order to insure your child's proper instruction and personal safety

Facility—The dancers should have a large room with a special sprung floor. Dancing on concrete covered with tile or other hard surfaces is dangerous. There should be ample mirrors and well-constructed ballet barres for older students.

Observation of Classes-Before enrolling in any school, you should make an appointment to observe a class. Even if you are not knowledgeable, you will be able to judge certain critical things.

1) Is the teacher well organized and pleasant?







In his 1998 annual address, US Secretary of Education, Richard W. Riley, lamented that "Reading scores are not where we want them to be." Many parents agree. Increasingly, they are looking outside crowded classrooms to local learning centers to help their children become better readers.
