BAHS's Annual Housewalk "Doorways Through the Decades"

The Barrington Area Historical Society's annual housewalk, "Doorways Through the Decades" will be held on Sunday, September 20 from 10 AM to 4 PM. This year, five lovely homes from the Barrington countryside will be on the tour, each depicting a different style of architecture during one of the decades in the area's history.

Each of the five homes has a distinct and interesting history. Several of the homes have been modified over the years to accommodate a more contemporary life-style. Each

only a little more history to each of the homes but also more charm.

The first home on the walk was originally a working barn. In the early 1960s, it was converted into a home by the family who owned it. Windows from the kitchen and dinning room look into a beautifully landscaped garden. To add even more nostalgia to the home, it is peppered with wonderful family heirlooms that have been handed down through the years from one generation to the next.

Another of the homes on the tour actually predates the settlement in the Midwest although it was only built in the 1920s. This magnificent structure is a result of three homes from Massachusetts that were dismantled, packed on railroad cars and transported to Barrington where the three houses were reconstructed on this 50-acre estate. Each became a wing of the new house: the center dates from 1699 and is the oldest part of the home; the east wing dates from 1720; and the west wing from 1805. Most of the doors and many of the windows are original to the three homes and the doors and windows open onto lovely gardens that display the owners' collection of superb bronze sculptures.

Two of the homes on the tour were built in the 1800s and reflect the typical agrarian life-style that existed in Barrington at that time. The first farmhouse dates from 1884 and has had two additions to the original house that not only expanded but opened up the home. The current owners who previously lived in Maine have incorporated many New England features, one being an ice box brought with them and installed in the kitchen where it is now used to display a china collection.

Large ceiling to floor windows have been added at the back of the home which overlook an expansive lawn that flows into a natural wetland at the back of the property. An outbuilding on the site that is nestled into a wooded area has been converted into a spacious guest house which doubles as an office.

The fifth home on the tour is a wonderful open contemporary built in the 1980s and furnished with pieces the owners have collected on their many travels in foreign countries. Their collection includes rugs from the Himalayas, puppets from Thailand, primitive masks from Africa, antiques from France and even a folk table from Russia. Each room in this quaint home reverberates with the exotic flair of furniture and accessories from far away places. And just as interesting is the outside of the home surrounded by upper and lower decks that look through tall trees at the nearby Fox River.

The annual housewalk has always been noted for its interesting boutique which offers unique home accessories for discriminating buyers. During the tour this year, there will be boutiques at three of the homes, with one offering quality gifts chosen from the Historical Society's Museum Store. Light refreshments will be served at two of the homes on the walk.

Tickets, \$20 if purchased in advance, are being sold at either the Historical Society located at 212 West Main Street in Barrington or at Ambrosia Patisserie located at 710 West Northwest Highway in Barrington. 





"Ancient West Mexico" Slide/Lecture

On September 10, the Barrington Community Associates of the Art Institute of Chicago kicks off a year which offers a record number of activities for Associates Members. Members, guests and interested persons are invited to the membership tea at 1 PM at the Presbyterian Church of Barrington located at 6 Brinker Road where Clare Kunny will give a slide-lecture on "Ancient West Mexico."

Kunny is a lecturer with the Art Institute's Department of Museum Education. She holds an MA in Art History from the University of Chicago with a specialization in Hispanic art and culture. She is currently working on her doctorate at the University of Chicago, specializing in colonial Mexico.

"Ancient West Mexico" will be a helpful introduction to the exhibit of the same name which will be installed at the Art Institute from September 5 to November 22.

Ancient West Mexico, a region of mountains and basins between the canyon of Rio Santiago and the Pacific coast, has long been considered a comparatively underdeveloped region of the middle American Continent. Now, however, West Mexico is emerging as a rich archeological area where complex societies evolved between 200 BC and 700 AD. The people of this region commemorated their family lineages and passed on their beliefs with earthenware figures and vessels buried deep with shaft tombs. Governed by the forces of nature and cosmic rhythms, the oneness with nature is depicted in scenes







Barrington Community Comes Together for Safety Town

Approximately 300 enthusiastic children and Assistant Director Megan Zaremba for participated in two sessions of Safety Town this summer. This 20-hour course (2 hours a day for 2 weeks) is now held every year at the permanent miniature town at JFK Health World, which was completed in August 1997. Safety Town is an early childhood safety educational program designed to introduce all types of safety conditions to children ages 4, 5 and 6. During the course, children learn safety behavior through role-playing in simulated and actual life situations under the guid-







Sapphire September Birthstone



Sapphire is of the corundum family and consists of any color except red (ruby). Red, light red and red with a violet overtone is always ruby. All other colors of corundum are sapphire. The word Sapphire is derived from the Latin word Sapphirus, Greek (Sappheriros), and Hebrew (Sappir). Historically, sapphires have been called many names. Saphiros was the word Romans used which meant

Lapislazuli, green sapphire was called "emeralds," and purple sapphire was called "amethyst."

Sources include Burma, Thailand, Sri Lanka, Africa, Australia and U.S. (Montana). Kashmir, India produced some of the most beautiful sapphires in its day, but little since World War II.

Colors include blue in various hues, colorless, pink, orange, yellow, green, purple and black. The hardness is 9 (same as ruby), toughness; good. Sapphires are commonly heat treated to produce color in colorless sapphires or to intensify color, make color uniform or to lighten stones.

Star Sapphires are sapphires that are never completely transparent, because they must have enough silky, needlelike inclusions to produce a star. They occur in almost every color ruby and sapphire that exist, although orange and yellow are almost unknown and green is very rare. The most common is black. Today most of the Star Sapphires bought in jewelry stores are synthetic (most colors other than black which is usually genuine).

The procedure was first performed in the United States in 1995 and Genzyme Corporation began providing the cartilage cell laboratory service to orthopedic surgeons here. Orthopedic surgeons must complete special training in order to perform the procedure.

The Medical breakthrough has been performed by Dr. Saltzman more times than any of the other handful of surgeons in the Chicagoland area that are trained in this procedure.

Dr. Saltzman completed his residency in orthopedic surgery at Loyola University Medial Center and is board certified by the American Board of Orthopedic Surgeons. He has been in practice since 1984. Dr. Saltzman and Dr. Armagan are on staffs at Hoffman Estates Medical Center, Alexian Brothers Medical Center, and Elmhurst Memorial Hospital.

Why do Some Children Require Two Phases of Orthodontic Treatment?

Children sometimes exhibit early signs of jaw problems as they grow and develop. An upper and lower jaw that is growing too much or not enough, or is too wide, too narrow or crooked can be recognized at an early age when children are growing rapidly and are beginning to lose their baby teeth. Orthodontic and orthopedic appliances can be used to correct jaw shape and direct the growth toward an ideal relationship between the upper and lower jaws thus providing a good foundation for the remaining permanent teeth to erupt into. This type of early "phase one" or "interceptive" treatment can prevent the need for later removal of permanent teeth to correct overcrowding, or possible surgical procedures to align the upper and lower jaws. Leaving a bad bite untreated could result in a jaw discrepancy too severe to allow achievement of an ideal result with braces alone.
