



On Saturday, Nov. 8, The University of Chicago Cancer Research Foundation the evening featured an appearance by Women's Board hosted its 37th Annual Grand Auction Gala "Cha Cha" at the Four Seasons Hotel in Chicago.

Rare Audubon Engraving Acquired by Woodland Art Gallery






Protecting Your Legal Rights— **Severance Agreements** by Joette S. Doran, J.D.

Typically in a reduction in force or layoff, an employer will offer the severance pay pursuant to an established company policy in exchange for an employee waiving their legal rights to file suit as a result of the termination. In a termination situation that does not involve a layoff, the employer may still offer severance pay in order to resolve any employee termination issues so that the employer is not subjected to legal action as a result of termination. In either situation, to be an effective waiver of legal rights, the release must be made "knowingly and voluntarily" by the employee. Whether the agreement will be deemed knowing and voluntary includes the clarity of the agreement, the time the employee had to consider the agreement, the advice of counsel and consideration, such as the amount of money offered to support the release. For the consideration to be deemed adequate, the severance package offered in exchange for the waiver must be more than the employee would otherwise be entitled to under law, such as earned compensation or accrued vacation pay.

Also, for the release to be an effective waiver of legal rights under the Age Discrimination in Employment Act (ADEA), the employer must comply with the Older Workers Benefit Protection Act (OWBPA). Under the OWBPA, the release will be considered valid to waive an age claim


