



Good Friends, Great Music Is Theme For Elgin Symphony 47th Season

Under the theme, "Good seats, good friends, great music!" the Elgin Symphony Orchestra under the baton of Robert Hanson, Music Director and Principal Conductor, will perform 25 concerts for its 47th season, opening in October 1996. Programs of classic, pops, holiday and family concerts with several well-known guest artists will be presented at Hemmens Theatre, Elgin, and the Prairie Center for the Arts in Schaumburg.

To underline the theme, classic subscribers may earn a \$5 rebate on their own subscriptions when they bring in friends as new subscribers. This promotion is for a full 6-concert classic season and will be effective through October.

Opening the Classic Series October 5 and 6, pianist Vladimir Leyetchkiss will play the popular Rachmaninoff Piano Concerto No. 2, followed by Enesco's "Rumanian Rhapsody No. 1

and "Swan Lake" Excerpts, of Tchaikovsky. A Gala Reception, presented by the Elgin Symphony League, will be held before the October "Enchanted Evening" concerts.

Popular young violinist Eugene Fodor will be making his third appearance with the Elgin Symphony in a program titled "Strings and Things" for the November 2 and 3 classics. He has chosen to showcase the D minor Violin Concerto of Sibelius. The program will also feature an overture by Samuel Barber and Brahms' Second Symphony in D Major.

"Rhine Journey," set for February 1 and 2, 1997, will bring the "Prelude to Act I of Loehngrin" of Wagner, Beethoven's "Pastorale Symphony," and the tone poem, "Don Juan," of Richard Strauss. This will be an all-orchestral program and special guests for the two performances will be students from area orchestras and bands.

Another artist making a return visit will be the cellist Carter Brey, who will perform the "Concerto No. 1 for Cello" of Saint-Saens on March 16 and 17. A new work by American composer Cindy McTee, "Circuits," will open the program, "Classical Rococo," and two romantic works will complete the offering: Tchaikovsky's "Variations on a Rococo Theme," and Prokofiev's charming homage "Classical Symphony."

The Symphony will give a nod to the French on April 5 and 6, titled "Franckly French," with Massenet's "Le Cid" and Franck's "Symphony in d minor." The Piano Laureate of the Grace Welsh Prize for Piano will be a soloist, with Philip Bauman

This program will also play April 4 in Schaumburg.

Flutist Eugenia Zukerman will join the Elgin Symphony in a "Flute Finale" May 3 and 4, as she plays the Mozart Flute Concerto No. 2 in D Major. The "Unfinished Symphony" of Schubert and "The Pines of Rome" by Respighi will bring the 47th sea-

The Pops series will open November 23 Cole, Piano, and Steven Evans, Harmonica, is in residence at the Institute for



Eugenia Zukerman, flute soloist, will appear with the ESO next spring.

Leroy Anderson. "100 Years of Broadway" with Associate Conductor Stephen Squires will spotlight music from the great Broadway shows from Kern to Webber on February 15 in Schaumburg and February 16 in Elgin. Soloists will be Cecilia Kafer, Kurt Kuehnert, and Jeffrey Norris.

Celebrating the 100th year anniversary of the "Stars and Stripes Forever" by John Philip Sousa will be Keith Brion, conductor, and Virginia Croskery, soprano, on Sunday, April 20, 1997, in Elgin. The program, named "Stars & Stripes & Sousa" will highlight music of great American composers in a patriotic presentation.

Families of all ages will enjoy "Hansel and Gretel," set for April 27, 1997, at Stage 1 of the Visual/Performing Arts Center at Elgin Community College. Also on the Family Series will be "Santa and His Elves" on Saturday afternoon, December 14, with appearances by elves, the Magic Christmas Tree, and the Elgin Children's Chorus singing carols from countries around the world.

The holiday show, "Home for the Holidays," will welcome soprano Patricia Chamberlain Noverr to sing with the Elgin Choral Union Holiday Chorus and Elgin Children's Chorus in a weekend of festive holiday music December 14 and 15, with the show opening in Schaumburg on De-

Season series prices remain the same this season, with 6 classic concerts at \$48-115, and 3 pops concerts at \$30-71, with senior and student prices available. Holiday tickets are \$8-20; Family tickets are \$4-20, and the Schaumburg Sampler is \$55-60. All of these seats are reserved. Flexible series are also available: Pick 4 Classics for \$68, and the Pick 5 package, where music lovers can design their own 5-concert series, for \$88. Another popular option is the 8 Great Seats coupon book for \$120, which allows for last-minute plans; the 8 coupons can be used any time for any regular concert.

Lunch is included and will be served in four locations including the Grand Ballroom of the School of the Art Institute.

Tax Implications Upon Divorce

It was a pleasure to see many of you at the Fourth of July Parade in Barrington last month. The turnout was fantastic and the weather could not have been better. School begins at the end of this month. It seems like summer just began. I will be returning to the classroom to complete my final class to obtain a Masters of Law degree in taxation, with specialties in corporate tax and estate planning.

Recently, I have had many calls from people who have queried about the rights of individuals going through a divorce in the state of Illinois. In particular, many have questioned what is a fair and equitable property distribution and what are the relevant tax ramifications. There are many tax implications incident to a divorce, capital gains tax upon the sale of the marital residence, how to divide the onetime \$125,000 exclusion from capital gains on the sale of a residence, taxes on maintenance by the recipient, no taxes on child support by the recipient, etc. I am surprised to find that many individuals believe that property in Illinois is split 50-50 in a divorce. However, this is not the case. Illinois, unlike California, is not a community property state. In fact, the Illinois legislature has enumerated a specific list of factors that must be taken into account to determine what percentage of property distribution would constitute an equitable distribution upon a couple's dissolution of marriage. These factors are weighed by the court and then a determination is made as to the percentage of property awarded to each individual.

"Back To School"

The theme of this month's Lifestyles is "Back to School"—ah, the pursuit of wisdom. So let's discuss "wisdom," or more specifically wisdom teeth, since "wisdom" is not my area of expertise.

Just the name wisdom tooth is synonymous with pain and suffering. But why are these teeth a problem? Wisdom teeth are the third and last molars to erupt into our jaws. If they grow into proper position behind the second molars, they can be useful and cause no problems.

In modern man, however, our jaws are usually not long enough to accommodate these teeth. Some have speculated that this is because our jaws do not develop to their fullest due to softer diets than primitive people were forced to cope with.

For whatever reason these teeth frequently grow in sideways or only erupt partway out of the gums. In this position they are trapped behind the second molars in a fluid-filled sac. This sac accumulates bacteria and a painless chronic infection results. This infection destroys good bone around the second molar eventually causing loss of both teeth.

The problem may develop into a tumor or acute infection with pain, swelling and fever. This seems to occur at inopportune moments like before school exams or weddings. Wisdom teeth may even grow directly into the second molars causing direct (847) 381-4040.

If these teeth are not fully developed, they have shorter roots and removal results in fewer complications. In my practice patients are referred to an oral surgeon, who is a dentist that specializes in wisdom tooth removal and other surgical procedures. Comprehensive dental examinations followed by action, not procrastination, will save adolescents a lot of time and suffering.



Keep That Winning Smile

Why do teeth discolor?

 Some teeth are naturally too pigmented or stained as they develop.

 Exposure to tea, coffee, juices, colas or tobacco accounts for much of the darkening as we age.

darken faster if exposed again to staining products such as tobacco, coffee or juices. However, the teeth will probably remain significantly lighter than if no treatment had been done. Your dentist may recommend a toothpaste to help minimize the formation of external stains on your teeth. Touch-up bleaching is available if you and your dentist feel it is appropriate. Two to four nights of bleaching performed at six month to four year intervals may be all that is necessary.

Some difficult, darker stains may naturally require longer treatment than some milder stains. Depending on your teeth and type of staining, results will vary. Your dentist can explain the type of results you can expect from treatment. Some patients experience increased tooth sensitivity to cold while using bleaching products. This will disappear in one to three days after interruption or completion of the treatment.

Sometimes your dentist may prescribe a fluoride gel.





Laptop Warning

Do you ever read something that pulls you up short. That's what happens to me when I read what nationally syndicated columnists write about realtors.

Up On The Roof

provided by Illinois law.

Generally, but not always, properly handled transfers of property between the couple pursuant to a divorce are not taxable transactions. However, capital gains taxes must be paid on the sale of the marital residence to third parties. Withdrawals from allocated retirement plans are subject to ordinary income tax. Maintenance, formally known as alimony, is taxable to the recipient and is included in the recipient's gross income.

In Illinois, there is no magic formula to determine an equitable, not necessarily equal, distribution of property. Illinois courts attempt to come to equitable deci-

sions by taking each case as a unique entity. The courts look at each individual case and identify the particular facts and circumstances surrounding it. The court process is complex as are the factors that are used to determine a fair and equitable dissolution of a couple's jointly held assets. However, a couple that can discuss a settlement of their own dissolution of marriage and come to an agreement, can circumvent the court's imposition of the distribution of their assets. 
