





### Sapphire September Birthstone

Mitchell's Jewelers, as always, wants you to know as much as possible about gems and jewelry. So here is some information about sapphire, the birthstone for Septem-

Sapphire is of the corundum family and consists of any color except red (ruby). Red, light red and red with a violet overtone is always ruby. All other colors of corundum are sapphire. The word Sapphire is derived from the Latin word Sapphirus, Greek (Sappheriros), and Hebrew (Sappir). Historically, sapphires have been called many names. Saphiros was the word Romans

used which meant Lapislazuli, green sapphire was called "emeralds," and purple sapphire was called "amethyst."

Sources include Burma, Thailand, Sri Lanka, Africa, Australia and U.S. (Montana). Kashmir, India produced some of the most beautiful sapphires in its day, but little since World War II.

Colors include blue in various hues, colorless, pink, orange, yellow, green, purple and black. The hardness is 9 (same as ruby), toughness; good. Sapphires are commonly heat treated to produce color in colorless sapphires or to intensify color, make color uniform or to lighten stones.

Star Sapphires are sapphires that are never completely transparent, because they must have enough silky, needlelike inclusions to produce a star. They occur in almost every color ruby and sapphire that exist, although orange and yellow are almost unknown and green is very rare. The most common is black. Today most of the Star Sapphires bought in jewelry stores are synthetic (most colors other than black which is usually genuine).

the bleaching treatment usually lasts for years. Teeth may darken faster if exposed again to staining products such as tobacco, coffee or juices. However, the teeth will probably remain significantly lighter than if no treatment had been done. Your dentist may recommend a toothpaste to help minimize the formation of external stains on your teeth. Touch-up bleaching is available if you and your dentist feel it is appropriate. Two to four nights of bleaching performed at six month to four year intervals may be all that is necessary.

Some difficult, darker stains may naturally require longer treatment than some milder stains. Depending on your teeth and type of staining, results will vary. Your dentist can explain the type of results you can expect from treatment. Some patients experience increased tooth sensitivity to cold while using bleaching products. This will disappear in one to three days after interruption or completion of the treatment.

Sometimes your dentist may prescribe a fluoride gel.

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
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### Julio's Celebrates Their 5th Anniversary With Grand Opening

### Asset Transfer

Since the unfortunate accident of TWA Flight #800 I have received many calls requesting information on the necessity of Wills and Trusts and the consequences of not having either. The Olympic bombing incident further evidenced the possibility of terrorism at any time and in any place. As a result, it is imperative to have your affairs in order. Because of the numerous calls concerning this topic, I thought I would talk again this month on the basics of Wills and

If you do nothing to plan for the disposition of your assets, the state in which you reside will do it for you. Under the Illinois Probate Act, the surviving spouse is entitled to one half of the decedent and the decedent's descendants per stirpes will be entitled to the other half of the entire estate. If the decedent leaves no descendants and no Will, the surviving spouse is entitled to the entire estate.

A Will is a legal document that distributes your property in accordance with your wishes. It does not control jointly-held property or assets that pass directly to a named beneficiary. A Will, when combined with a Trust, can provide your family financial security through asset management, satisfactory property distribution and estatetax planning.

A Will contains instructions for distribution of all the assets you currently own and also those you may eventually acquire. It is important to prepare a Will whether you are single or married, with or without children, and without regard to the size of your

A Trust accumulates and distributes income and principal from your assets and can pay out income to the beneficiaries according to your directions. Securing your assets in a Trust is convenient and can provide continuity for your family upon your death or incapacitation, shielding them from additional paperwork and the hassles of Probate.

The main objective of estate planning is to maximize your ability to pass along your assets to whom you choose by minimizing estate taxes and administrative costs. ### Beat The "Back To School Anxiety"

The first day of the new school year can be ther behind in school. an exciting time of new clothes, new teachers and new friends to look forward to. So why is it that some children dread starting school in the fall?

According to Dr. Raymond J. Huntington, founder and president of The Huntington Learning Center, it is natural for children to experience some anxiety when entering a new classroom environment. However, when the anxiety turns to fear and reluctance, it is important to identify why and help them move past it. The following are the four most common reasons why children are fearful and reluctant to return to the classroom.


1.Lack of self-confidence—If a child does not have confidence, he or she may not feel capable of success in school. To build the child's confidence, set reasonable expectations and attainable goals, and praise his or her achievements. When children find that they can complete small tasks, they will feel better about moving on to bigger and better challenges.

2. Fear of failure or fear of criticism from others-Children having trouble keeping up in school may feel anxious or embarrassed to ask questions in class, for fear that they not ask for help, they fall further and fur- The Huntington Learning Center offers


3. Lack of motivation—When a child is unmotivated, he or she may be expressing boredom or frustration with the materials being studied. When textbook knowledge is not being applied in everyday life, the information may seem meaningless. The key to motivating children to learn is to make learning interesting. Reading food boxes and cans, counting cars on the highway and writing letters to friends are just a few things to give real-world meaning to schoolwork. Lack of motivation may also come from a child feeling incapable of doing the work. Again, show the child all of the little things he or she can accomplish and the larger tasks will follow.

4. Lack of basic skills—Children become frustrated when they can not keep up with classmates or school assignments due to a lack of basic skills. If a child was having problems at the end of the school year, the introduction of new material will be even more overwhelming. By working on a child's weak areas through tutoring, knowledge will fall into place, then self-confidence and motivation are sure to follow.
