ing on the patio of your condo or elaborate landscaping on your country mansion, this occasion is sure to be informative, fun and a visual treat.



Bankruptcy—Is it for You?

by Sharon L. Keller, J.D.

Bankruptcy is defined as a legal process under the law intended to not only insure fairness and equality among creditors but also to help the debtor by enabling him to start anew with property he is allowed to retain as exempt from his liabilities. An individual facing bankruptcy has the following two overall concerns: (1) shield property from the reach of creditors and (2) to ensure the discharge of debt to the fullest extent possible.

If a debtor must seek protection of the bankruptcy courts, he must decide the Chapter under which he should file. If a liquidation of all assets and a discharge of debts is desired and the debtor lacks sufficient income to fund a plan of reorganization under Chapter 11 or 13, then a Chapter 7 proceeding is appropriate.

One of the primary goals for filing bankruptcy is for the debtor to receive a discharge of debts. Discharge is broadly construed in keeping with the policy of granting the debtor a fresh start. There are a number of specific debts that cannot be discharged including the following: taxes, alimony or child support, debts incurred through fraud, embezzlement or larceny, certain fines and penalties, educational loans, debts from a prior bankruptcy, and damages resulting from operating a vehicle while intoxicated.


From Feared to Fabulous Adler Art **Exhibit Traces History of Comets**

When comet Hale-Bopp makes its predicted fly-by during the coming weeks, comet mania will take hold, and a rejoicing, wide-eyed public won't be able to get enough of the natural attraction. Take a look at the Adler Planetarium & Astronomy Museum's newest art exhibit however, and you'll see that the euphoria associated with today's comet sightings is far removed from the time when comets evoked fear and

"Up until the end of the 17th Century, comets were thought to portend terrible things like war, storms, and plague," said Anna Felicity Freidman, curator of "Comets through the Ages." When astronomers later discovered that comets orbit the Sun and that they could precisely calculate their orbits, the public's attitude changed, according to Freidman.

"Comets through the Ages" outlines the progression from early misconceptions about comets through the development of accurate theories. The exhibition includes rare books, broadsides, and other prints from the Adler's prestigious history of astronomy collection. The earliest work on display dates from 1532 and the most recent are two 19th Century cartoons.



The Legacy of Shaker Craftsmanship (Part II)

Production and sale of garden seeds were among the Shakers' most profitable industries. The Shakers were first to prepackage garden seeds. Pine boxes were made to transport seeds to market and then used for seed display in the general stores. Boxes were built with leather hinges and painted, then filled with neat rows of brown paper seed packets.

These high-quality seeds were often transported to southern markets such as New Orleans and Florida. It was the collapse of the Southern economy during the Civil War that signaled the decline in deeconomic revolution followed, Shakers couldn't compete and Shaker seed production came to a halt.

Carter Brey, principal cellist of the New York Philharmonic, returns to the ESO to perform two concertos; one of which is the rarely heard original version of Tchaikovsky's Rococo Variations. Brey will also perform Saint-Saens' Cello Concerto No. 1. Other featured works will be Prokofiev's Classical Symphony and McTee's Circuits.

This performance of Tchaikovsky's Rococo Variations will be substantially different from the version normally heard, and will include a different order of variations. Variations on a Rococo Theme for Cello and Orchestra was written for cellist Wilhelm Fitzenhagen, a colleague of Tchaikovsky's who apparently assumed that he had a proprietary

customary performing edition for over a century. The March 15 and 16 performances by Carter Brey with the Elgin Symphony Orchestra, are based on Tchaikovsky's original version and offer a rare opportunity to hear the variations as the composer intended.

Brey will also perform Saint-Saens' beautiful Concerto in a minor for Cello and Orchestra. This work was one of Saint-Saens first compositions after the Franco-Prussian War of 1870, and combines the solidity of the German school with a beguiling French suavity and elegance. In Illinois, property held by spouses as tenants by the entirety will be protected from creditor's claims.

Insurance and annuities held in spendthrift or other protective trusts can be protected from creditors claims. Insurance and annuities may be exempt if payable to a person other than the debtor.

In Illinois, the following personal property is exempt from judgment:

- 1. Necessary wearing apparel, bible, school books, family pictures;
- 2. Debtor's equity interest, not to exceed \$2000 in value, in any other property (not personal residence);
- 3. Debtor's interest, not to exceed \$1,200 in value, in any one motor vehicle;
- 4. Debtor's equity interest not to exceed next month.

- 5. The debtor's right to receive:
- a. social security benefits
- b. veteran's benefits
- c. unemployment benefits

d. alimony, support or maintenance Debtors should avoid bankruptcy if at all possible. It can be expensive, and it may affect the debtor's ability to obtain credit later on. Whether nonbankruptcy proceeding should be used depends on the cost and ability of the debtor to obtain the cooperation of the creditors. Bankruptcy is not a panacea, but judicial process that must be seriously considered and not perceived as an end all for financial distress.





Environmental Benefits. Climate control is obtained by a tree's ability to moderate the effects of sun, wind and rain. With de-

To care for trees is like putting money in the bank and will insure their health for many years to come.

Mulch your trees. The best and easiest thing is to duplicate the mulch nature provides her trees in the forest. Apply four inches of composted wood chips, leaves or other matter around the base of the tree at least three feet in diameter. (Keep the mulch away from the bark.) This mulch tree's leaves filter helps conserves moisture, cools the soil and prevent erosion.

> Prune properly. Beware of "tree topping." This occurs when large branches of a tree are severely cut back, disfiguring it permanently and usually causing its' premature death.






