





Founded in 1968, the BAHS is responsible for the preservation of the area's history through its programs and exhibits. Additionally, BAHS's Heritage Center contains unique records, genealogical and local historical research available to the public. Funded solely by private donations, the BAHS relies on events such as the Antique Show & Sale, to carry-out its work.

"We are looking forward to our most successful show yet. There are almost 30 vendors from across the U.S.," states Betty Fitzgibbons, chairman of Antiques IV, "And, it's an opportunity to see wonderful

antiques surrounded by the beauty of the Cuneo Museum."

"Art in the Barn, 1994", the Auxiliary of EHS Good Shepherd Hospital's 20th annual juried and invitation exhibition, is an opportunity for everyone to enjoy a day in the country while viewing beautiful fine art.

Students Can Learn To Pay Attention

The ability to focus attention may seem simple to you. But paying attention is a skill that must be learned. Many students cannot control their attention because they have never learned how to direct their thoughts and energies.

Dr. Raymond Huntington, founder and president of **The Huntington Learning Center**, says that parents can help children improve their ability to concentrate. The following are three methods Dr. Huntington recommends in helping your children improve their attention:

1. Using positive self-talk and positive images. At sporting events you often see one player standing alone, muttering to himself, "OK, you can do it! Keep your eye on the ball." This is "self-talk," an important tool for controlling attention. Children can be taught to use it.

People also improve their attention span by controlling the images they see in their mind's eye. When a runner is halfway through the race, she may picture herself crossing the finish line; or a dieter may imagine his new appearance when tempted by an ice cream cone. These images help keep attention focused, and increase motivation to complete the task.

2. Asking questions about the work. Another way to direct attention is to ask questions while studying. Some general

instructions are: "What is this paragraph about? What is the evidence that supports the central idea? Is this argument true or false? Why?" Asking themselves questions helps students bring their attention back to the task at hand.

3. Setting specific study goals. One way to improve attention is for children to work toward specific goals as they study. You might want them to study until they can tell you the main point of the paragraph, or until they can solve a specific math problem. Together set reasonable goals, and discuss each goal with your children. Remember that many small goals are better than a single large one.

Combating Arthritis With Exercise—Part II

Dr. Reffell is a graduate of the National College of Chiropractic. As a chiropractor and full primary care physician, he is uniquely qualified to diagnose and treat the aches and pains that arise from daily living. He has an office in Barrington and welcomes the opportunity to meet with you concerning your health.

You will recall from last month's article that arthritis is a group of diseases that includes rheumatoid arthritis and degenerative joint disease (DJD). We described these disorders and discussed the benefits of a regular exercise regimen that must include three basic elements: stretching, strengthening, and endurance. (Of the three, stretching is the most important component...never neglect it.)

This month, we will discuss some general rules that apply when beginning any serious exercise program and then go over a few exercises to get you started. Before starting any new routine, consult with your physician to ensure your body can withstand the rigors of such a program.

Start gradually. The temptation to avoid when beginning your routine is overkill. Start gradually and work into it... you've got the rest of your life ahead of you. (One concerned reader called in because she'd heard that it's possible to tear a muscle by overdoing a stretch. It's true! You can hurt yourself.) Take it easy and follow your doctor's instructions to the letter. As you begin, some pain will likely develop. Don't let it stop you unless it's unusual or severe, in which case you should stop performing that particular movement and move onto another. **Dr. Reffell** suggests, "You can always cut back but shouldn't stop exercising altogether. Remember, with persistence and regularity, exercise becomes easier and less painful. But pain is never normal because it indicates an underlying problem that should be looked at by a competent physi-

cian."

Always warm up. Warm muscles stretch better than cold ones so walk in place (or on a short course) for a few minutes, then begin with a few gentle stretches once your muscles warm up. If needed, massage tender and stiff joints. Best of all, wear something that keeps troubling joints warm—like sweats or leg warmers.

Vary the workouts. Different exercises affect different muscle groups, so you must perform a number of routines to give your body an overall workout. Start with three repetitions of each exercise, then work up to ten repeats over the course of several weeks (or as many as your doctor recommends).

NOTE: Unless you are healthy and have only mild DJD, talk to your doctor before trying the following, or any, exercises.

Hands -- Twist a large rubber band around all five fingers. Gently spread your fingers wide apart, using the rubber band as resistance.

Low Back -- Sit erect with feet apart. Place fingertips on shoulders with elbows spread wide apart. Gently bend over and twist so that you move one elbow across and down to the opposite knee. Straighten up and gently bring both elbows back. Repeat on other side.

Upper Back & Neck -- Sit on the floor with your back straight and knees straight but not locked. Hold the ends of a long towel and loop it around the feet. Start with arms extended, in front, hands slightly lower than shoulder level. Pull the towel toward the armpits without lifting shoulders or lean-

Good Kitchen Substantially Increases Value Of Home

"It's a proven fact that homes with good kitchens sell faster, and get their asking price," says Jim Walker, Certified Kitchen Designer at **Barrington Homeworks**.

Here are some suggestions Walker recommends that both buyers and sellers consider when analyzing a kitchen.

Adequate Counter Space—The basic requirement is at least 24 inches of space on either side of the sink and 12 to 18 inches on each side of the range.

One common omission is an isolated refrigerator with no adjacent counter space. The need for landing space next to the handle side of the refrigerator is especially important, because we usually remove more than one item at a time, Walker said.

Ample Storage—Cabinets should be positioned at point of first or last use. There should be storage for dishes near the table or dishwasher, drawers for utensils near the range, and shelves for canned food near the food preparation area.

Adequate Ventilation—This is especially important in open-plan houses, where the barriers between kitchen and the rest of the home are minimal.

This "great room" concept demands adequate venting of smoke, grease and odors to the outside.

Safety Considerations—This can be as basic as developing a traffic pattern that does not interfere with the work triangle. The fewer the number of people who enter the

work triangle, the less chance there is for an accident to occur.

Other safety considerations in the kitchen should include avoidance of sharp corners on islands, which are usually eye level with children and hip-level with adults.

Adequate Clearance Spaces—For safety, comfort and efficiency, it's imperative that clearance spaces be allowed for opening the oven, refrigerator, dishwasher and cabinet doors, using the appliances, passing behind seated diners and passing other family members in the kitchen.

Appliance Placement—In most families, the refrigerator is the most-often-used appliance. Regardless of the model chosen, good kitchen design places the refrigerator in a spot within the work triangle, but still accessible to the rest of the family without entering the work area.

Professional Design—The rapid growth of the kitchen industry has spawned a whole area of specialization in design of this room. The National Kitchen & Bath Association has a certification program for kitchen designers (CKD).

The Art Institute of Chicago is presenting the final showing of the important retrospective exhibition *Goya: Truth and Fantasy, The Small Paintings* now through October 16, 1994, following runs at the organizing institutions: the Museo Nacional del Prado, Madrid, and the Royal Academy of Arts, London. 

Delftware From Colonial Williamsburg At The Art Institute

More than 120 pieces of pottery from the collection of British delft at Colonial Williamsburg—the most comprehensive in any U.S. public museum and among the best in the world—will be on view at The Art Institute of Chicago this fall. The traveling exhibition *British Delft from Colonial Williamsburg* will open in Galleries 141 and 142 at the Art Institute now through November 6, 1994, before returning to The DeWitt Wallace Decorative Arts Gallery in Williamsburg, Virginia (January 27, 1995-January 5, 1996). The exhibition is organized by John C. Austin, Colonial Williamsburg's consulting curator of ceramics and glass. *British Delft from Colonial Williamsburg* is made possible by Sara Lee Corporation.

The predominantly blue-and-white palette of delft pottery, inspired by Chinese porcelains, was imported in growing quantities into Europe in the seventeenth century. European potters, unable to replicate the white, translucent body of Chinese porcelain, instead masked cruder clays with an opaque tin-oxide glaze to create a white foreground for decoration with blue, as well as other colors. Delft, though made throughout Europe, took its name from the Dutch town Delph, which became, an important center for its manufacture. Because it was relatively inexpensive to make, delft was available to a wide spectrum of society, both in Britain and in the American colonies during the eighteenth century. During the first half of the eighteenth century, delft was

probably the most commonly used ceramic in America.

The pieces on view in *British Delft from Colonial Williamsburg* were crafted in Great Britain from the sixteenth through the early nineteenth centuries and range from utilitarian to spectacular. Included are objects used in drinking and dining both in taverns and at home, such as posset pots, mugs, goblets, jugs, punch bowls, and teawares. Other items on view will be large dishes for display, known as chargers, painted with British monarchs from Charles I to George

Book Banning On The Rise, 1994

Winner of the 1991 Pulitzer Prize for fiction, *A Thousand Acres*, was banned at the Lynden, Washington High School because "it has no literary value." The award-winning author Jane Smiley is in good company. In 1993-94, she joins authors such as Katherine Paterson, Mark Twain, Toni Morrison and Laura Ingalls Wilder, whose works were banned or challenged in the last year. Paterson's book, *Bridge to Terabithia*, which won the Newbery award, was challenged for its alleged profane language. The *Adventures of Huckleberry Finn* has also been banned for language offensive to African-Americans, as was Morrison's *Song of Solomon*. *Little House on the Prairie* was banned in Sturgis, S. Dak., due to statements considered derogatory to Native Americans. Even the seemingly innocuous children's book, *Where's Waldo?* was banned in East Hampton, N.Y. because part of a tiny drawing shows a woman lying on the beach wearing a bikini bottom, but no top.

Books like these, challenged or banned on similar grounds during the past year, will be displayed at **Jordan Temple Book Center** in Crystal Lake during Banned Books Week - Celebrating the Freedom to Read, September 24 - October 1, 1994. Most of these books are well-known but are considered dangerous or objectionable by individuals or groups who would deny others

access to them.

Jordan Temple Book Center is participating in Banned Books Week - Celebrating the Freedom to Read, which is sponsored by the American Library Association, the American Booksellers Association, the American Booksellers Foundation for Free Expression, the Association of American Publishers, the American Society of Journalists and Authors, and the National Association of College Stores. It is endorsed by The Center for the Book of The Library of Congress. The sponsoring organizations believe that most would-be book banners act with what they consider to be the highest motives—protecting themselves, their families and communities from perceived injustices and evils and preserving the values and ideals they would have the entire society embrace. The result, however, is always and ever the denial of another's right to read. **The Jordan Temple Book Center** believes that Americans support our basic right to read guaranteed in the First Amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

"The whole month of September we will be featuring books that have been challenged or banned in America," says Elizabeth Jordan Temple. "Come see them, some are real shockers."




