REPORT OF THE PASTOR TO THE FOURTH QUARTERLY CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH OF BARRINGTON

June 1, 1939

When I came to Barrinton last fall I found a church building far more beautiful than I anticipated, a church membership of of friendly and highly intelligent people, a comfortable and homelike parsonage, a village clean, enterprising with a lovely countryside. I found a splendid choir, a very capable finance committee, and an official board of very high caliber.

On the other hand, I found the three met important organizations in the church, the Woman's Association, the Sunday School, and the affizia Epworth League, all with new and inexperienced leaders, two of these were not even members of a church. I found the Official Board, not under my humanish but of a layman, sanew experiment of find a debt, not of \$11,000 as reported in the Conference Journal, but a debt of \$22,000. I found a small congregation difficult to increase be cause the membership, with the exception of three or four aged people and a few families whose children were out of public school, was made up of younger married people with small children, and with families from the Jewel plant, where the head of the family had often to be away, and used Sunday naturally both for Manually and for returning.

However, most of these uncertainties have worked out exceedingly well. The Women's Association has reaced its full goal financially of \$215 for each Circle., due to the splendid leadership of the Circle chairman, Mrs and Gunthorp, Mrs Mitchell, Mrs Forsberg, and Mrs Sandford Rieke. This money is to be used to defray the church debt. The monthly meetings of the Association have been a high quality. The W.F.M.S. an integral part of the Association, has functioned well under the leadership of Mrs Dotterer, The Monthly hearing of the Circles have brought friendship and relaxation to many women. This church like many churches is greatly indebted to the work, who are hard working and deeply interested.

The EEpworth League, depite its handicaps, has turned out to be the out standing youth organization in Barrington, for it is the only church group of youth made up of Senior high school students. In the other church the young people's organization is dominated nby the older people. The president of the League has joined the church as have some of the other young people. Next year a boy and a girl are to share the leadership togeth er. Bruce Miller and Ellen Jensen. An atturbure 20. - Later 12.

The Sunday School has been gaining momentum after a slow start. It is he has capable teachers in all departments. This year an orchestra has been added and two new adult classes. Twenty three members of the School united witht the Church on Easter. Of these 17 were junior and senior high school students. This is the test of a successful Sunday School.

The experiement of organizing the Official Board with a layman as chair man, backed by an Executiveve Council to secure functioning power, has been very in teresting. Mr Kaylor the chairman is Vice pres-ident of the Jewel Tea Company, and his leadership has brought many executives and and highy Krained Jewel employees into the Board and the church. The Executive Council has not been able to carry on as planned because Mr Kaylor suddenly found the salesmanagership placed upon his shoulders which made it impossible for him to give time to this part of the church machinery. Edwin W. Read, however, has been elected as Vice-chairman of the Board and of the Executive Council that he might take the lead when Mr Kaylor is too busy. It seems to me this is carrying out the plans of th New Church as outlined by the Unifying Conference. The Board may have a: layman as chairman, for often the minister lack executive: leadership and capacity. The Policy Committee, with us the Executive Council, will plan the work of the church for the coming year. At the Annual Meeting of the entire church membership and fellowship, called at the beginning of the new year, the plan for the year, having been finally adupted by the Official Board will be presented to the church, its organization and exstanding comittees, and the part assigned to to each person and group in the achievement of the program, after the annual Meeting had ace the program, adopted by the Board, will be discussed annual rade

We have received 46 members into the church this year. I have letters of othersto make this over fifty. Rev. Stauffer tells me that this is more than he has received during the four years he has been in Barrington., depite their annual revival and evngelist, and their large Sunday School. New people are moving into the community constantly of a high quality. Some of these are Methodists, Many have no church here of their kind. All this makes the future of this church very promising. We have lost one member by death, Mrs Roselle, whose sudden gling brought grielf to the entire congregation. Mr Muir was not a member, but he at the very heart of the church, and active on the Board and in various committees. His going brought a great sense of loss. Five letters of transfer have been given all of them long on the noneresident list.

Dr and Mrs Miron A Motrill have brought much life and happiness into the church by their residence here. Both are active in choir and Sunday School, and in other ways. We are hoping that their residence here may be permanent.

This new organization of the Board frees the pastor from certain duties and gives him more time for calling which is very important here, as well as for studying anf and sermon preparation. All thro My ministry I have called upon all of my members once a year, in addition to the many sick calcalls and calling upon new residents. I will complete this calling sched—ule this month. I would have done so earlier if it had not been for the unusually damp and chilly winter which gave me lumbaggo, flu, laryngitis, and strep sore throat. Usually I get thro the winter without a cold. But luckily these attacks came in the middle of the week, and I have been able to preach every Sunday.

The World Service part of our budget I am afraid will not reach the goal of last year. The budget was made up and the financial campaign was a nearly over when I arrived. It did not seem advisiable to make a second campaign for World Service. But this coming year this important part of the work of the church should receive early and consecrated attention.

The Town Warming brought much stir and awakening to our community.

Our church and our men were active in bringing it to a successful schieve ment.

Our church has been busy in other ways: sending money to save the Italian Church, to help the Christian German refugees, to can pears for the orphanage, and to sew for Wesley Hospital.

I have spoken seen times outside of my parish, administerd the rite of baptism to seven persons, had several weddings and funerals.

In closing I wish to express my deep appreciation forthe loyal cooperation of the members of this Board and of the heads of our organizations without whose help the church could not have carried on as well as it has. The ushering this year, under Mr Harris has been the best for years I am told. Many men have participated with dignity and faithfulness.

The sancturary has been constantly beautifed with flowers.

A meeting was held with representatives of the Demand Organization concerning raising the money or part of it due on our church building. But it was felt the time was not ripe for that effort just now.

But there is \$500 on hand from the Women's treasury to liquidate some of these bonds. ANd there is enough money on hand also thy their labors to paint the outside of the church, which greatly needs it. I hope this may be done soon.
