### A BILL

For an Act to amend Section 2 of "An Act to create the Illinois Emergency Relief Commission, to define its powers and duties, and to make an appropriation therefor," approved February 6, 1932, as amended.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:*

SECTION 1. Section 2 of "An Act to create the Illinois Emergency Relief Commission, to define its powers and duties, and to make an appropriation therefor," approved February 6, 1932, as amended, is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the commission until July 1, 1936, to provide relief to residents of the State of Illinois, who, by reason of unemployment or otherwise, are destitute and in necessitous circumstances. Such relief shall be provided by distributing funds or supplies and by any other means



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10 provisions of this Act, the commission may make use of and co-operate with  
11 counties, townships, and any other municipal corporations charged by law  
12 with the duty of poor relief and with other local relief agencies.

13       *Of the moneys paid into the Emergency Relief Fund after July 1, 1936, a*  
14 *sufficient amount shall be reserved by the Auditor of Public Accounts for the*  
15 *payment of any obligations incurred by the commission prior to said date, and*  
16 *for the payment of all expenses necessarily incurred thereafter in the admin-*  
17 *istration of this Act. The balance shall be allocated and pro-rated among*  
18 *the several counties of this State for the relief of necessitous persons thereof*  
19 *to the extent that State funds are available and can be used for that purpose*  
20 *and shall be appropriated from said fund to the Auditor of Public Accounts*  
21 *solely for such purpose. The county board of each county or a duly appointed*  
22 *committee thereof or any other county agency designated by the county board*  
23 *shall, prior to the first day of July, 1936, and the first day of each month*  
24 *thereafter, submit to the commission an itemized statement showing the relief*  
25 *necessary to be furnished to persons in the particular county for the ensuing*  
26 *month and the amounts raised by all taxation by local units therein. The commis-*  
27 *sion, until March 1, 1937, shall determine and certify to the Auditor of Public*  
28 *Accounts the amounts to be allocated to the several counties monthly which*  
29 *amounts shall be in the ratio of the relief needs of each county and shall be*  
30 *paid to the county treasurers of the several counties and shall be used ex-*  
31 *clusively for the furnishing of assistance to persons in destitute and necessi-*  
32 *tous circumstances but no moneys shall be allocated or paid to any county in*  
33 *excess of the needs of destitute and needy persons in such county. In case the*  
34 *Commission has reason to believe that the requisition by any county or coun-*  
35 *ties for relief needs is excessive or beyond its or their needs, then it has the*  
36 *power to require said county or counties to appear before it and substantiate its*  
36½ *requisition to the satisfaction of the Commission.*

37       *The commission, with the consent of the Governor, may be the agent of*  
38 *the State for the receipt and disbursement of any Federal funds of commodi-*  
39 *ties for relief purposes where no other agency has been designated for such*  
40 *purpose, and upon consent of the Governor may cooperate with the Federal*



41 government in such Federal projects as are intended for the purpose of lessen-  
42 ing the relief burden in this State.

43 If, after June 30, 1936, the duty of providing relief and support in any  
44 county under the provisions of "An Act to revise the law in relation to  
45 paupers," approved March 23, 1874, as amended, is upon some governmental  
46 unit other than the county, then such money allocated to the county and paid  
47 over to the county treasurer shall be allocated among such other governmen-  
48 tal units by the county board or a duly appointed committee thereof in the  
49 ratio of the relief needs of each such unit and shall be paid over to the re-  
50 spective treasurers of the several units and used exclusively for the assistance  
51 of persons in destitute and necessitous circumstances, but no money shall be  
52 allocated or paid to any such unit in excess of the needs of the destitute and  
53 needy persons therein.

54 The county boards shall, before the 15th day of August, 1936, and before the  
55 15th day of every calendar month thereafter, submit full, itemized reports of  
56 all receipts and expenditures of relief moneys furnished by the State or Fed-  
57 eral Government, in the county during the prior calendar month, to the Auditor  
58 of Public Accounts, and the Emergency Relief Commission. The books and  
59 records dealing with such relief, of said county boards and other governmental  
60 units therein ministering relief in said counties, may be audited by the Auditor  
60½ of Public Accounts, at such times as he deems necessary.

61 Any person who shall misappropriate, misuse or unlawfully withhold any  
62 of the funds allocated by the State to the county for relief purposes shall be  
63 guilty of a felony, and shall, upon conviction thereof, be imprisoned in the  
64 penitentiary for not less than one year nor more than five years.

65 The records, books, statements and accounts of the commission shall be  
66 available for use by the counties or other governmental units administering re-  
67 lief and support in the counties under the provisions of "An Act to revise the  
68 law in relation to paupers," approved March 23, 1874, as amended.

69 All office equipment and supplies of the commission, and being the prop-  
70 erty of the State and in the possession of said commission, not necessary to the  
71 functions of the commission shall, as soon as may be practicable after June



72 30, 1936, be turned over by said commission to the county boards, county com-  
73 missions or bureaus of public welfare of the respective counties, or to any or  
74 all of them, in the ratio of their needs therefor. In the event provision is sub-  
75 sequently made for the administration of relief and support by other govern-  
76 mental units, such office supplies and equipment shall be distributed by the re-  
77 spective county boards among the governing bodies of such units in their coun-  
78 ties in the ratio of their needs therefor. All property so transferred shall be  
79 devoted exclusively to the administration of relief. All property not so trans-  
80 ferred by the commission and all property so transferred to the county agen-  
81 cies or other governmental units which is not necessary for the administration  
82 of relief shall be turned over to the Secretary of State to be made available for  
83 use by any State Department, commission, bureau or other State agency having  
84 need and making request therefor.

Sec. 3. Whereas, the functions of the Illinois Emergency Relief Commis-  
2 sion with respect to the direct administration of local relief, terminate on May  
3 1, 1936; and whereas, the local governmental units are not ready and able to  
4 assume these functions in the short time allowed before May 1, 1936; and  
5 whereas, in order that hardship may not result to thousands of persons in desti-  
6 tute and necessitous circumstances because of a failure in the relief administra-  
7 tive machinery, it is necessary to continue the local relief functions of the Illi-  
8 nois Emergency Relief Commission until July 1, 1936; therefore an emergency  
9 exists and this Act shall take effect upon its passage.
