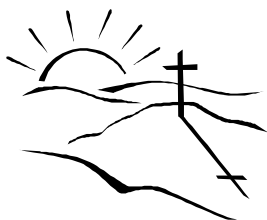
Palm Sunday, on April 4, is the start of the Holiest week in the Christian tradition. With the procession of palms, we celebrate Christ's arrival in Jerusalem and anticipate the events of the coming week which lead to Christ's death and culminate in his Easter resurrection. Worship services will be at 9:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m.



The White Breakfast, to be held on Wednesday, April 7, will start with meditation at 9:30 a.m. in the Sanctuary. A service of music played by Joy Hague, verses for reflection, communion and a homily by Dr. Baxter will reflect the theme "The Cup of Salvation". Brunch will be served in Fellowship Hall after the service.

Our Maundy Thursday Last Supper service will begin at 7:00 p.m. on April 8. Children who have completed instruction in understanding communion, under the guidance of Ms. Melissa Armstrong-Hansche, will participate in Communion for the first time..

On Good Friday, April 9, at 7:00 p.m., the solemn observance, known as Tenebrae, will be held. This ancient service is used to impress upon the minds and hearts of believers the consequences of humankind's sin and the greatness of the Savior's sacrifice on Calvary.



Easter Sunday, April 11, is the celebration of the Risen Christ. A sunrise service will be held at 7:00 a.m. in Fellowship Hall. Breakfast will be served at 8:00 a.m. in Fellowship Hall. Celebration services will be held at 9:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m., with coffee times after each service.

Dear Friends in Christ,

By the time you receive the Carillon, Holy Week will be upon us. I can hardly believe Lent went by so quickly. Holy Week begins with our Master's triumphal entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday and concludes on Easter Day with our Master's resurrection from the grave which signals his victory over sin and death. In the course of this week, we will be celebrating Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. On Wednesday, the BPW will be hosting the White Breakfast. On Maundy Thursday, Mr. Spike will be preaching and we celebrate the Sacrament of Holy Communion. On Good Friday, Joy Hague and the Adult Choir will be leading our traditional *Tenebrae* service.

Tenebrae was the term was used to describe the matins and lauds prayed during the last three days of Holy Week. *Tenebrae* was celebrated on the Wednesday evening before Maundy Thursday to encourage the participation of the people in the morning and evening worship services of the Paschal Festival.

In this service of prayer, there were no hymns, no invitatory, no introductory responsive readings, and the *Gloria Patri*, normally sung at the end of each psalm, was suppressed. In the Roman Cathedral of Offices, matins consisted of nine psalms and nine readings. Lauds consisted of five psalms and five readings. Thus, the Office of *Tenebrae* consisted of a prolonged meditation on the events of salvation running from the Last Supper to the entombment. During this service of prayer, fourteen candles, made of a dark-colored wax, were extinguished one by one after each psalm until one only remained. When the *strepitus*, a signal for departure, was sounded, a hidden fifteenth candle, symbolizing the anticipated resurrection of Christ, was brought out of hiding to provide light so that the congregation was able to leave the sanctuary in silence.

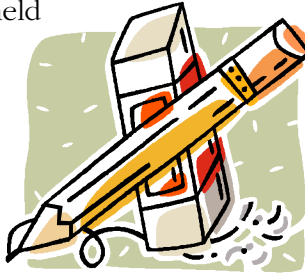

about people tripping, as well as extending the life of the beautiful carpet in the Sanctuary. Concerns about the instability of some pews in the Sanctuary are being investigated and corrective action will be taken.

The recent electrical “brown-out” caused a burnout of the battery which supports the computer server in the office. This has been replaced with an upgraded battery so there will be no recurrence of this problem. Also, the Trustees plan to install a dedicated electrical line for the computer network. We are very appreciative of the professional expertise of Steve Unangst, who not only has overseen the modernization of our computer system, software programs and website in recent months, but he made a personal contribution of his time and talent during January in recognition of our tight budget. This was valued at \$2,300. Thanks, Steve!

At the March meeting the Trustees also authorized the installation of windows in the classroom doors on the lower floor. This will ensure that activity in these rooms can always be observed from the hallways, and responds to requests from parents and teachers and to the recommendation of our insurance firm.

Trustees

Financial Report: Expenses are significantly over budget in February, but this is due to the annual payment of \$18,000 to the Presbytery. The Trustees still expect to operate with a balanced budget

Building: Thanks to generous support from the members, the Board of Trustees is continuing planned repairs and upgrades to the church building. Necessary tuck-pointing and repairs to the chimney and gutters have been completed, which has corrected structural and water leakage problems. New carpeting has been installed on the stairs up and down from the Narthex and repairs have been made to the carpeting in the Sanctuary. This has addressed safety concerns

Grounds: For the first time in many years, the Board of Trustees sent out requests for competitive proposals for the annual landscape maintenance at the church. Five proposals were solicited and two were received. These are under consideration. The requests for proposals reflect the newly established policy of the Trustees to seek comparative bids or prices on all major contracts and purchases.

Memorial Garden: Phase Two of the Memorial Garden, the planting of perennial flowers, will be completed this spring. The Boy Scouts, as part of an Eagle Scout project, will provide the volunteer labor.

A New Stephen Ministry Training Class to Begin in September

“I Can’t Be a Stephen Minister!”

Maybe you haven’t said this aloud in a crowd, but for one reason or another you have talked yourself out of becoming a Stephen Minister. Anytime some new challenge shows up, the “I can’t” phrase is bound to be nearby.

You may have heard about Stephen Ministry, realized that you do have the gifts, the commitment, and the desire necessary to be a Stephen Minister, and you even may have felt God’s tap on your shoulder. However, you still aren’t sure.

What are some reasons you’ve given yourself for not becoming a Stephen Minister? Perhaps the following:

“I am not as qualified as those other Stephen Ministers. I can’t even quote scripture.” A Stephen Minister is a caring person who is willing to learn, grow, and serve. He or she must be willing to keep and maintain confidentiality, and to commit to training, ministry, and supervision. If you fit the qualifications, your Stephen Leaders will equip you with the rest of what you need.

“I don’t know what to say or do in a ministry situation.” Stephen Ministry training is thorough and practical. It includes listening skills, assertiveness, confidentiality, dealing with feelings, maintaining boundaries, and how to care for people during life’s different crises. Stephen Leaders prepare you for success.

“I have problems in my own life. How can I help others?” Some problems are so big that you need to address your own needs and wait until later to be a Stephen Minister. After you have worked through your problems, however, your experience of finding God’s help and care in your struggles is some of the best preparation you’ll ever receive for caring for others during tough times. Stephen Ministers aren’t problem *solvers*; they are problem *bearers*. A Stephen Minister’s job is to walk beside another person as that person works through his or her struggles. The Stephen Minister brings stability, prayer, and Christ’s love to the care receiver’s situation.

“I don’t have enough time to be a Stephen Minister.” So true for so many. Time is so precious that it only makes sense to use it on activities that make a real difference – in other’s lives as well as our own.

We are told in 1Peter4:10, Each one should use whatever gift he or she has received to serve others, faithfully administering God’s grace in its various forms. If Stephen Ministry is a good fit for your gifts, you should consider joining class of Stephen Ministers that will begin training in September. Application packages are available right now at church near the Care Notes outside the Parlor. You will find the application envelopes in the Lucite stand. Applications are due back in the church office by Sunday, April 18th.

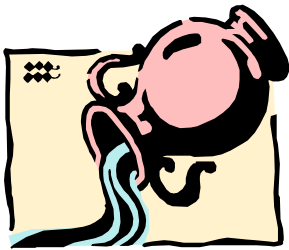

For those who have completed the entry-level course, we will offer an advanced course from the 2nd generation series of DISCIPLE Study. This new course looks at the way each Gospel writer presents events and teachings and the picture of Jesus that emerges. Lessons 1 –22 concentrate on the Synoptic Gospels with some related passages in John. Lessons 23 –30 concentrate on the Gospel of John with supporting passages from both the Old and New Testaments.

Notes from Joy Let's Ring Our Song!



One goal I mentioned when I became the Director of Music here at PCB was that of re-establishing a handbell choir. Due to the generosity of Mari and Lukass Franklin, Gus

Leep, the Deacon Board, and the Choir, that goal will soon be a reality. Even as I write this article, we have in our possession a spanking brand-new, three-octave set of Schulmerich handbells.

The bells are being purchased in the memory of Bernice Leep, a long-term, faithful and dearly beloved member of the choir who passed away in December of 2003, and will be named "Bernice's Bells" in her honor. The plan is to officially begin the new choir in September, at the start of the new church year. There is no age limit; spots are open to younger and older ringers alike.

It is exciting to join a long tradition of bell ringing which some historians believe began over 5,000 years ago in China. Through the ages, bell ringers have been found in various societies and religions, many of them non Christian, and they tolled their bells for a myriad of reasons. Most of us have probably experienced handbells as a part of church services. The specific tradition of bellringing which is most familiar to us is traceable to the early Christian Church, and more particularly to the Churches in England from the 16th Century to the present.

In my vision for music at PCB, this is the start of a musical organization which will give parishioners an additional opportunity to become pleasantly and more fully involved in the activities of the church. It is my dream to gradually add octaves to the foundational three until we have a full choir of seven octaves.

Although bells are often seen as an added entertainment to the church service, ultimately, the purpose of the Church is to introduce people to Christ, and the members of the Church must be provided with as many ways as possible to do this. Every activity has the potential for helping someone to see and hear a part of the Christian
