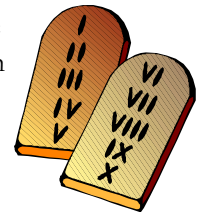

Dear Friends in Christ,

In October our Ministry team started our planning for Lent. As you know, Lent is less than 30 days away. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday with our Confirmation class leading worship and culminates in Holy Week. During this liturgical season, the church, in joy and sorrow proclaims, remembers and responds to the atoning death of Jesus Christ. As followers of Jesus

Christ, we are called to a period of self-examination. Our self-examination is a difficult spiritual task because self-examination supposes our living without prejudice and sin. Most of the time, we aren't even aware how deeply our prejudices and sins are within us. We think that we relate to people who are different from us, but in reality our spontaneous thoughts, words and actions with others reveal that our prejudices and sins are alive and well.

During Lent, Dan, Melissa, Joy and I invite you to join us in a period of self-examination. On Wednesdays, March 3rd, 10th, 17th and 31st, I will be teaching a class entitled, "Discovering the Gospel of Thomas" while Dan and Melissa will be investigating theological themes using films. On March 24th we will have Marthame and Elizabeth Sanders as our speakers. They will share thoughts about their work with Palestinians on the West Bank. Our time of study will begin with prayer services based on the Taizé style of worship. In Taizé prayer services, people sing together, using phrases that are short but full of meaning and that are tirelessly repeated. Between the times of singing, there are reflections of the evening readings, and times for silent reflection. Worship will begin 7:00 p.m. and classes will begin at 7:30 p.m. and end at 9:00 p.m.

Dan, Melissa, Joy and I will be asking you to claim God's love fully in an unconditional way as you live with others. We will be asking you to discover that in the great variety of humanity is an expression of the immense richness of God's heart. In these opportunities for self-examination, we hope that we will be freed from the prejudices and sins that we all possess so that we may reach out to people through acts of compassion and justice.

Join Dan, Melissa, Joy and I in this exciting time of self-examination. Learn about the Gnostic gospels. Share the dramatic expression of our faith in film. We look forward to seeing each of you at our Lenten programs as we journey toward Holy Week and Christ Jesus' victory over, prejudice, sin and death on Easter Day.

At the last meeting of the 2003 calendar year, the membership rolls were updated, several baptisms were approved and the housing allowances for the pastors were approved.

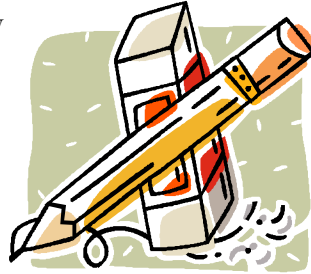

In response to budget constraints, the Session decided in December 2003 to eliminate the Business Manager position and outsource this work, effective at the end of January 2004. We thank Sandy Schild for her service to the congregation and wish her well in all future endeavors.

Trustees

Notes from December 8 meeting.

Financial Report: Receipts in comparison to budget were ahead of schedule; this is common for the month of December when members bring their pledges up to date or prepay them for tax purposes. Pledges received to date for financial year 2004 are not sufficient to meet projected expenses. A letter is being sent to church members asking them to make a pledge or, if they have already done so, to thoughtfully consider increasing it.

Building: A contract has been approved to purchase carpeting for the stairs up and down from the Narthex from Wholesale Carpet. It will be installed after the organ upgrade and repairs are completed. Necessary tuck-pointing and chimney repairs will be completed by the end of February. Paige distributed a list of building issues still needing to be addressed.

Grounds: Damgaard has completed trimming of all the trees.

Memorial Garden: The Memorial Garden donor plaque has been completed. Paige thanked Andy Harden for his leadership and effort in getting plantings completed this fall.

Donation: The Herbert Johnson family (Schaff Piano) has donated a cover and humidifier for the piano in the sanctuary, along with installation of the humidifier.

New Business: An aerial photographer has taken interesting shots of the church, which were circulated for trustees to see. By consensus the trustees agreed to spend \$175 to purchase one to hang in the church and also to scan and put on the church website.

Barrington Presbyterian Women have requested a cabinet within a closet for storing supplies. There is a continuing need at the church for more and better organized storage space. Funding will need to be found for improvements.

Betsy Davis and Brant Lieske volunteered to count the offering after church services in January.

Stephen Ministry

Christ Caring for People Through People

What is Stephen Ministry?

Stephen Ministry is Christian care-giving and support extended by trained lay members of the Presbyterian Church of Barrington to members and friends of our congregation. Stephen Ministry is a team ministry, lay persons working in conjunction with our pastors to offer care to those who are in need. Stephen Ministers have developed their gifts for listening and bringing Christ's healing love to those who are experiencing life's transitions.

Stephen Ministers are not professional psychologists, experts in church doctrine or social workers with extensive specialized training. Nor are they casual "drop in" visitors. Stephen Ministers are committed Christian caregivers dedicated to an ongoing, individual, in-depth caring relationship.

What kinds of needs do Stephen Ministers address?

- If you have experienced the loss of a loved one through death, divorce, or physical separation
- If you are expecting a child or have a new baby
- If you are ill or a caregiver yourself
- If you are unemployed, underemployed or preparing for retirement
- If you are lonely or depressed
- And many other of life's challenges

...you may find it helpful to share thoughts and feelings with a non-judgmental listener.

Isn't it up to the pastor to provide this type of care?

Care-giving is certainly a part of every pastor's job. Pastors are also to "equip the saints," the members of a faith community, for ministry. The early church chose deacons to care for the needs of the people. Stephen was one of the first of these lay caring ministers (Acts 6:1-6). When lay persons care for one another, the amount of care given can be greatly multiplied.

Is what I tell a Stephen Minister kept in confidence?

Yes. Everything discussed with your Stephen Minister is kept in strictest confidence. There may be times when your Stephen Minister will ask your permission to consult with a pastor or a Stephen Leader in order to provide the most effective care possible.

After their training, do Stephen Ministers normally work on their own?

All commissioned Stephen Ministers meet in small groups twice a month for purposes of ongoing evaluation, supervision, and continuing education. Quality care requires supervision which provides support for the caregivers and insures continuity and accountability. The utmost confidentiality is maintained.

I'm afraid I would be too embarrassed to talk about my concerns. How can a Stephen Minister help me?

Your Stephen Minister has been trained to listen to you without judgment, to love and accept you just as you are. Many Stephen Ministers have experienced similar life transitions. Through their unconditional acceptance, you will probably become more comfortable in sharing.

Can I still talk with a pastor?

Yes. Our pastors will continue to care about you and keep you in their prayers. By assigning a Stephen Minister to be with you, they want to be sure that you receive ongoing care. Always feel free to contact a pastor.

Will the Stephen Minister "preach" to me?

No. Your Stephen Minister's job is to be present with you, to listen to you, to help you express and understand your feelings, to help you work things through on your own. The Stephen Minister is the care-giver, not the cure-giver.

How are Stephen Ministers assigned?

If you agree to meet with a Stephen Minister, you will be paired with an individual of the same gender. This person may have particular insight into your circumstance and is committed to a caring relationship with you.

If my Stephen Minister is not “right” for me, can I change?

Yes. We hope that you will give the relationship time to develop before you reach that decision. Your relationship is not a social one, but one of skilled care-giving.

Will a Stephen Minister help with cleaning, baby-sitting and other chores?

The Stephen Minister may be able to help you find persons or organizations to be of help with these needs.

How long does a care-giving relationship last?

Stephen Ministry will be available to you as long as needed and appropriate.

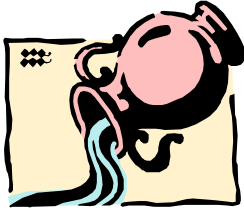

Parish Life

Notes from Joy -- Singing Our Song



Each week, 40+ million people in the United States attend church. Most churches involve music within their worship services, some more extensively than others. Through it, the congregation participates actively in the praise portions of the service. It is a vehicle in which to express thoughts and emotions, affirm faith, and pray. It brings joy, comfort and hope. It is a teaching tool to tell more of the gospel story. Through music, we connect with people of today and of ages past to sing the song of the people of God.

The song of the people of God is the worship, praise and adoration that we have been commanded, indeed created, to give to the God of the universe. Whenever God gives a mandate, he makes possible its fulfillment. At creation, He endowed mankind with the amazing gift of music to help us give him our highest and most enthusiastic praise. How like a loving God to provide such an enjoyable manner in which to honor and fulfill his command.

Now that you have read this, I am sure you are eagerly asking, "How can I use this wonderful gift to join my praise with that of the rest of God's people?" Well, I just happen to have a ton of answers to that question, but right now, I will give only two. The most obvious, of course, is to join lustily in the singing of the congregation at each service. Indeed, as part of the congregation, you have a responsibility to do that. This is not difficult or unpleasant, because the congregation at PCB sings quite well.

My second answer is an invitation to join those who actively lead the congregation in their singing. Yes! I know that there are various levels of talent in our midst. Many have a secret desire to be more active in the singing of the song. The choir offers a satisfying way to participate in the music of the church without having to worry about being on display or having the skills of a consummate professional. Church choirs fulfill important functions in churches fortunate enough to have them. They aid in setting the atmosphere for worship, lead the congregation in the singing of hymns and responses, support the spoken word with anthems which reinforce the point of the worship, and contribute social aspects of fellowship, comfort and companionship. Choirs have far more value than merely serving as instruments of entertainment. They contribute heartily to the spiritual health of the entire church, and must therefore strive to give the highest service.

If you are looking for an opportunity to increase your involvement in a satisfying endeavor, why don't you consider singing in the choir? I know that it is often difficult to join an already established organization. Furthermore, in this congregation a large number of people frequently travel. So, I am going to sweeten this invitation with a further proposal: if there are 10 or more prospective choristers who are intimidated by a lack of skills, or who cannot attend choir rehearsal because it is on Thursday evening, I am willing to add a rehearsal on Tuesday evening. This rehearsal would be a little slower paced and offer those who are new to choral singing a chance to learn how to function in a choir. It would also give other choir members a chance to make up missed rehearsal time.

Hospital Care

You have probably signed privacy policy notices at the doctor's office, the drug store, and perhaps the hospital. All of these privacy forms are the result of HIPAA, the federal Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act. This act has required medical facilities to take stricter measures to protect patients' privacy.

The changes in privacy policy have affected your pastors' ability to find out when church members are in the hospital. When we call the hospital, we are not always able to find out if a certain person is a patient. Hospitals cannot notify the church of a person's hospitalization unless the patient record specifically asks the hospital staff to do. Even when that request is made, hospitals do not always get those calls made. So YOU need to let the church know if you or a family member is in the hospital, or if a hospital procedure is planned. Unless you provide us with this knowledge, the pastors and deacons cannot offer the ministries of the church. So please give the church a call!
