Dear Friends in Christ,

Worship planning at The Presbyterian Church of Barrington begins with certain underlying assumptions. First, worship is an act of praise and thanksgiving to God. Second, worship is by definition an activity of all God's people. The ministers, the director of music, organist, the choir, and worship leaders are enablers of that praise, rather than, performers of worship. Third, worship centers in God's Word. Fourth, worship is a shared responsibility. We do this primarily through our ministry team and the worship committee. Fifth, there is a pastoral aspect to worship planning. As we shape weekly services, our ministry team tries to use a mixture of new and familiar music, contemporary and traditional prayers, creed and responses so that our

people may feel a certain "comfort" level as they participate in our praise and thanksgiving to God.

During 2003, our Music Search committee, led by Anna Armstrong and Judy Carlson, kept these assumptions in mind as they looked for our new Director of Music. They learned from you that music is the second most important aspect of worship in the life of our family of faith. They also considered your hopes and concerns. One of those statements that stood out in their minds is: "Music is another way to pray. It is a way that provides joy in our hearts and to the Lord."

I am pleased to announce to the entire congregation that the Session, upon recommendation of the Music Search committee, agreed that Joy S. Hague will assume the role of Director of Music on January 1, 2004. Joy's qualifications for this role are: an undergraduate degree from Manhattan School of Music in Piano Performance and a graduate degree from Northwestern University in Organ and Church Music. In addition to her educational credentials, Joy brings over 20 years of experience as a director of music, organist, and pianist at a variety of churches.

The Session, the Staff and I are delighted to have Joy become a member of our ministry team. I would also like to take this time to thank J. David Štech for his dedicated service to our congregation as our Interim Director of Music. My hope and prayer is that we will continue to see and work with him on special musical occasions in the life of our family of faith.

When you see Charlie Andersen, Pam Anderson, Anna Armstrong, Judy Carlson, Jill Minner, and Linda Neton thank them for their dedicated service to our family of faith. I would like to take this opportunity to thank them personally for their long hours listening to our concerns and thinking through our congregation's future musical needs.

These goals will take time and perseverance, but I look forward to the challenge. However, no matter how much effort I expend, the results will most likely be more directly proportional to the assistance and participation I receive from you, the parishioners.

In our personal lives, we have frustrations, setbacks, and disappointments. Ultimately, in order to survive, we grieve our losses, overcome our disappointments, and move forward. The life of a church congregation follows much the same path. My passionate desire at this moment is that together we will embrace the sentiments of the Apostle Paul, expressed in these words, “. . . forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.” (Phillipians 3:13)

### Clerk’s Corner, George Landes, Jr.

As the year comes to a close, your Session has worked extremely hard to resolve many of the issues that faced us at the beginning of 2003. I believe we have made a great deal of progress on numerous fronts, with a lot of work left ahead of us. However, many of the changes that we had in 2003 will hold us in good stead in the years ahead. Having a new Director of Music/Organist will lend stability to our choir, while a revamped Christian Ed program has helped better prepare our youth for Confirmation.

One disappointment, however, has been the failure of our membership to financially support the church to the extent needed to provide the type of church experience that many of us have come to expect. Because we do not currently have the financial backing needed to meet the Session’s budget, your Session is forced to make some very difficult decisions regarding your church’s finances.

Because we are about \$50K short of our pledge goal, we will have to make some drastic cuts to get a balanced budget. How we accomplish this is still being discussed, but that type of gap is not something that we can “nickel and dime” our way through. Your Session is currently addressing this issue, and will share its proposal with you during the budget portion of the upcoming Congregational Meeting, so your attendance is very important.

I greatly thank all of you for your help and support this past year, and I am looking forward to another strong year of accomplishments in 2004.

## Stephen Ministry

### Entering the Comfort Zone



(This letter is printed with the permission of Stephen Ministries, St. Louis)

I had always been in control of my life. I did not, and still do not, like change. I have always been one who would “pick

myself up by the bootstraps” and find a solution to any problem. My husband Warren and I married in 1958. I was 18 and he was 21. We stayed married through thick and thin. My family was my comfort zone.

In July of 1997, Warren was diagnosed with cancer, and for the first time in my life I had no control of the situation. He passed away 21 months later. During these months, I read everything I could get my hands on about his cancer. I knew the prognosis was not good, but I kept thinking that my life would not change. Of course, it did.

After Warren’s death, I got through the funeral, the tons of paperwork and medical bills, and all the things that needed to be done. I cleaned out his closets, put the things I wanted to keep in a chest. I was so busy with all of this-and then, all of a sudden, it was done, and I did not have anything to do. It was just me and my life without Warren. The house was empty, and I was lonely and angry.

My dear friend Nancy had called several times to invite me to church with her, and I had turned her down each time. One Sunday, I finally accepted her invitation. As I entered the church, I knew that I was out of my comfort zone. I have always believed in God, but I tended to put him on a bookshelf so he would be there if I ever needed him. Well, now I needed him. I came to this church every Sunday for a long time, but church couldn’t get death and dying out of my head.

Nancy knew I was a mess. She even had to speak for me several times because I could not control my emotions. One day she asked me if I had thought of asking for a Stephen Minister. I did not know what a Stephen Minister was, but I listened as she explained that a Stephen Minister was a person who had been

trained to be a Christian listener and caregiver. This was definitely out of my comfort zone! I had always been the one who listened to my family and friends when they had a problem or just needed to talk.

I finally agreed and soon I found myself sitting at my Stephen Minister’s dining room table crying and pouring out my feelings. I shared feelings and emotions with her that I could not share with my boys for fear of hurting them more than they had already been hurt. I had already been told that anything I shared with her would be in total confidence and that felt good to me. I met with her many times over the next year, and now I know that God spoke to me through her.

I had always heard that when a door shuts, God opens a window. For me, many windows have been opened since I first met my Stephen Minister. I “got my act together” and realized that it was OK for me to cry and get mad. Over the months, as I talked to my Stephen Minister, I realized that I was listening to myself for the first time. I soon entered a comfort zone-that of being able to share without fear of betrayal and gossip. I thank God for Stephen Ministry and for her.

Later, I was recruited to go through Stephen Ministry training and I accepted. I am now a Stephen Minister and it feels good. The things I learned in the training have made me a better person. I know myself better than ever and I know the value of confidence and loyalty. I have applied my training to my family life. I now can better communicate with my family and friends and I now know, in no uncertain terms, that God has entered into my life. He did it His way-though Stephen Ministry-and He didn’t even mind being on the bookshelf for so long.

I am so proud of myself right now! I am living proof that what we call “life-changing situations” really can change your life-with the help of a Stephen Minister.

### Deacon's Corner

I am Margarete Rice and I have just completed my first year as your Deacon.



I was born and raised in Waterloo, Iowa, and was very involved in the First Presbyterian Church there. Both my grandfather and my father were Deacons and then Elders in the church, and were also physicians in general practice. On Sundays after church, I would go with Father on his rounds at the hospitals, after which he would make house calls. He would usually call on his elderly patients out in the country, who had a difficult time getting to the office. I knew at an early age that he treated the patient as a "whole"... not just physically but also emotionally and spiritually. I saw how a friendly visit and affirmation from Father was often all the patient needed. It was a lesson I held in my heart.

I received my degree in fine arts from the University of Iowa where I was a studio major and a potter. For the next four years, I worked for the city of Cedar Rapids as Director of the Art Center, before Hal and I married and moved to Michigan. There I had a studio and continued potting until Hal took a job with Quaker Oats and we made Barrington our home. We raised our daughter, Kathryn, and our son, Blaine, here, and Hal

and I ran his business here. We took "early" retirement in 1997 so we could travel and visit family and friends in the U.S. and Germany. We were extremely fortunate to be able to enjoy those trips in the three years before Hal died in the spring of 2000.

At that point I had to decide what I wanted to do with the rest of my life. I still enjoy traveling and visiting friends and family, especially my three grandsons in North Carolina. I love the peace and solitude of lazy summer days at our cabin in Michigan. And I once again am a potter. I share a studio in E. Dundee with a fellow artist, and teach pottery at St. Charles East High School as visiting artist.

Also at the top of my list was to become more involved in my church. When I was asked to be a Deacon last year, I was given a fairly simple job description: Pastoral care, which includes greeting, hospitality, visiting the homebound and a rosebud for new babies. As I look back over my first year, I can see how much more is involved in this service ministry. We are not only greeters, but also help as communion servers, ushers, and liturgists. We do visit the homebound, but we also take flowers, deliver Food Served with Love, and now take extended communion to those who desire it. We also work with and support the Stephen Ministry program, welcome visitors, and send cards to seniors and others in the congregation in times of illness, joy or sorrow. Since we recently divided the church into four parishes, it will be easier for us to know and become more aware of the needs of the members of our church family. It reminds me of the lesson on Christian care giving and thoughtfulness I learned while sharing those Sunday afternoons with my father, driving through the Iowa countryside as he made his calls.

It has been a wonderful year for me, to get to know and work together with the dedicated and caring group that is our Board of Deacons. I look forward to the next two years.

### Focus On Christian Education

#### Workshop Rotation

9:20a.m.—10:20a.m., Gr. 1-4

This model of church school, which originated here, has spread throughout the nation, across denominations and is making its way overseas. This is a multiple-intelligence approach to Sunday School. The children focus for several weeks on a single Bible story. There are a number of lab-style workshops – computer, film, drama, art, etc.- and students rotate each week from workshop to workshop. Weekly parent handouts help you understand what is taught and provide questions and activities to complete at home to reinforce your child's spiritual growth.

As a teacher you learn one lesson plan of the dynamic PowerXpress curriculum and teach within your interest/strength. Teacher training occurs several weeks before your assigned rotation. Contact **Pam Anderson** to sign up to teach in one of our eight workshop mediums.

The children will begin the hour by attending church and exiting after the Moment With The Children. They will gather in Fellowship Hall where the story and theme will be taught and then will be dismissed to their scheduled workshop downstairs. These workshops are located in the wing of the church at the bottom of the Narthex stairway. ## Mission Trip 2004: Washington The Campbell Farm



The Work Project committee and the VBS committee, comprised of youth participating in this year's mission trip along with an adult advisor, will begin narrowing down our work project

activities this month. They will be able to assist in the choices from the list below provided to us by the Campbell Farm.

### WORK SITES

The Campbell Farm is always looking for new projects and work sites for mission groups to serve, but we have six main areas where groups serve during the summer. We rotate teams each day at these sites.

**1.HOUSING PROJECTS-** In partnership with Volunteer Chore Services, a non-profit associated with Catholic Family & Child Service, we work on homes of the low-income elderly and disabled. Most of the time groups do yard work, painting, wheelchair ramps and minor repairs. There are many great needs on the Yakama Reservation for roofing, plumbing, construction and other repairs, but because of lack of funds and skills we often are not able to meet these needs. So if your group is does have people qualified in these areas and are able to raise funds to help with the costs then we can match your group with appropriate projects.

**2.WAPATO PARKS AND RECREATION-** 90% of the children who attend Wapato's Recreation Program are Hispanic and Native American. Hundreds of children go to the park each day, and any extra love and attention given to the children is greatly needed and appreciated. Be expected to give lots of piggy back rides! Groups are welcome to organize their own games with the children and craft projects. (Groups that come during the school year are encouraged to help tutor children after school at the Community Center.)

**3.UNION GOSPEL MISSION (Yakima)-** The UGM has a wonderful program that shelters homeless families and individuals. They also provide meals and clothing to anyone in need. Our volunteers help in whatever area that is requested of them from sorting food to washing windows. Groups are welcome to join them for afternoon worship. (The Union Gospel Mission also has a Children's Program that sometimes we are able to assist with during the school year and summer.)

### 4.NORTHWEST HARVEST FOOD BANK

(Yakima)- Provides donations of food to several food pantries throughout the area. Volunteers are needed to help sort the food donations and prepare food orders. (Only on Wednesdays- not all groups will be able to serve there.)

**5.FARM WORK-** Since TCF is a working farm and we depend upon volunteers to be able to maintain our facilities, animals and crops, we request that all groups spend at least one day on the farm (in addition to morning chores). Work may consist of weeding, cleaning stalls, building something in our Appropriate Technology Garden, planting/harvesting foods, etc.

**6.VACATION BIBLE SCHOOLS:** Depending upon the desires and skills of the groups and requests of the local churches we help arrange VBS's in the area. Last year we did one at a local Hispanic Pentecostal Church, two at the local Presbyterian Churches, one at a Native American Housing Project with the local Native American Youth Group, and one in the Park. Let us know if you are interested in leading one of these or in assisting a church.
