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Dr. Clark Barshinger will present a special series on healthy relationships entitled "Ingredients of a Healthy Relationship". Beginning on February 13 and continuing on the 2nd Sunday of each month (except Mothers' Day) through May 15 (4 classes) from 4:30 p.m. – 7:00 p.m.,



Dr. Barshinger will lead a scientific and scriptural analysis of relationships. The cost of the seminar will be \$50 per person for the whole series and will include a light supper, dessert and coffee.

Many years ago, at Grace Presbyterian Church in Jenkintown, the Director of Christian Education worked hard to see that children in grades 1 through 3 learned the Ten Commandments. Perhaps, we need to listen to the direct and simple words of our children as we set our feet on the many paths that we will face in the New Year.

Consider This...

Why Don't We Ask for Help?

While our Stephen Ministers have been keeping busy over the last 2+ years providing care for our congregation, we do know that we still have people in our midst who are coping alone. Most people are much more open to giving care than to receiving it. Why? For several reasons. We often feel that others' problems are more "important" or that we should be helping those with "bigger" problems rather than dwelling on our own. When a person is giving care, he or she seems in a position of strength and stability. When a person is receiving care, he or she often feels weak, insecure, and vulnerable. These are uncomfortable feelings that most people try to avoid. Society teaches us that to ask for help is to admit weakness, and to show weakness is to admit inferiority. Whether it is because of guilt, shame, inadequacy, or fear of rejection, many of us would much prefer to suffer alone than ask for help.

And Why Should We Ask for Help?

There are countless people today who, though they really could benefit from a Christian friend who would listen and care for them, instead tough it out on their own. They remain the strong silent type, or wear a smile across a face that is holding back a flood of tears.

But God did not create us to be independent! We were created to be interdependent. God's Word is clear on this all the way back to Genesis: "It is not good for the man to be alone. I will make a helper suitable for him" (Genesis 2:18). The New Testament underscores this theme with more than 50 verses that contain the words "one another." These verses include admonitions such as "love one another," "encourage one another," "build up one another," and "pray for one another." What these verses don't say is that we are only to love, encourage, build up and pray for other people. The "one another" wording gives them a reciprocal meaning. It tells us that we are also to allow other people to love, encourage, build up and pray for us!



How Do I Find Help?

Suffering alone is not God's intent for us. Asking for help is not a sign of weakness. It is an acceptance of God's healing love which comforts and strengthens us. If you find yourself now or in the future facing difficulties in life, don't succumb to society's norm of remaining "strong" and coping alone. Take the courageous step of seeking help. Open your heart to receiving God's love and grace through a caring and non-judgmental Stephen Minister. 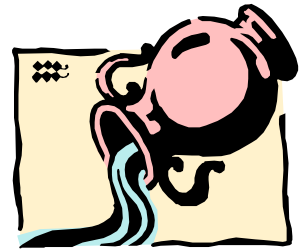

Being a mom can be exhausting. It was the original meaning of 24/7. I am a chauffeur, chef, personal shopper, referee, manager, counselor, maid, laundress, dog keeper, school and music teacher. Despite the hours and countless, thankless, tedious tasks, I feel fortunate to be able to stay at home and take care of my kids. Both of my parents pursued professional careers and had various hobbies and interests that often left me, an only child, feeling as if my happiness was a low priority for them. Christian Education

DISCIPLE

Our Tuesday and Sunday afternoon DISCIPLE classes are making great progress and at the time of this reading, we will have completed our study of the Prophets. All of the participants would tell you that they have been challenged, surprised, and transformed by their study. They agreed to share some thoughts about their DISCIPLE experience and what they have learned:

"I have learned more than I ever expected."

"God is faithful to His covenant with us and deals with our sin by "limiting" himself through allowing us choices. What He wants from us is to do the same for others as He does for us - through godly, obedient service and leadership."

"For over forty years I have heard (and sometimes taught) familiar Bible stories. Through the Disciples study, I am learning to view these Old Testament heroes as people. It is clear to me from ancient days to the present, the most important thing is the personal relationship each of us has with God."

"Our Disciple class has not only helped me learn the context of the Bible verses that are read in church, but I have developed a wonderful feeling of fellowship and friendship with my other Disciple classmates."

"Abraham the father of Christianity, Judaism, and the Muslims lived 2000 years before Christ and here we are living 2000 years after Christ. In our humanness the issues, complexities, and sins seem to remain the same, but because of God's unconditional love, forgiveness, and the ten commandments there is hope!"

"I have been fascinated to learn the Old Testament worship practices and rituals. The relationship OT people had with God is strikingly less intimate than our relationship with the God we know through Jesus Christ. The comparison serves as a worthwhile reminder of the awe and mystery of our Heavenly Father."

"The highlight of my Sundays has always been coming to church, with concerts, visiting with friends, and other entertainments scheduled for later in the day. Sunday afternoons are now consistently dedicated to

God's word as well. The peace of this consistency and the consistency of scheduling time to read God's Word daily is creating in me a new understanding of my relationship to God as well as a new understanding of Sunday."

"Disciple class has prompted me to search within myself and look more closely at my own motives and faith."

"I thought that I understood the Bible, but I have learned how much that I did not previously understand. We have only been in the course for eight weeks, but the depth of insight gained thus far has exceeded my expectations for the entire course."

"God does not hide; we hide from God. When God draws near, we see more of ourselves."

"If you have not read the Bible, join us. If you want to move from a simple understanding to a more in-depth understanding, join us and attempt with us to receive the Lord's message. This class is worth the effort."

For children: ***Bunny, My Honey***, by Anita Jeram.

One sunny day, while Bunny is playing with his friends, Little Duckling and Miss Mouse, he runs just a little too far. Suddenly, Bunny Honey is lost. The more he looks for his mommy and his friends, the more lost he becomes. What is Bunny Honey to do? Our author and illustrator of this preschool story, creates a story with a satisfying conclusion. It offers comfort and reassurance to all little "Honeys" everywhere.

For Youth: ***The Gospel According to Harry Potter***, by Connie Neal

Connie Neal embarks on an exploration into J.K. Rowlings created world of mystery. She presents a rebuttal for those that are seeking something sinister in this children's classic. With an arsenal of more than fifty "Potteran" themes, these books need not be rejected as a threat to the Christian faith. Critics hail this book as a much-needed stroke of interpretive genius on the intersection of religion and popular culture. A must-read for everyone intrigued by the Harry Potter phenomenon.

For Adults: ***Whose Land? Whose Promise?, What Christians are not being told about Israel and the Palestinians***, By Gary M. Burge.

Professor Burge answers tough questions of someone struggling with the realities of Israel today and the discipline of a New Testament academic committed to responding in the light of Scripture.

How do I embrace my commitment to Judaism when I sense....there is a profound injustice afoot in Israel?

How do I celebrate the birth of Israel when I also mourn the suffering of Arab Christians?

An excellent introduction to the factors that have wounded and weakened both Israelis and Palestinians.

Donations: If you have any items you would like to donate to us, please put a post-it on it, and write "Donation". Place in the return bin and take a "tax receipt" card for your records.

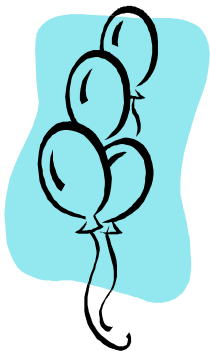
