Dear Friends in Christ,

Civility is a value that the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. has tried to push against the grain of our cultural lives. Few values reside inherently in any organization, but civility is a value which is rooted in the church by Christ's call to his followers to extend hospitality to all. Since the church is a place where values are openly taught, we need to make certain that we demonstrate this value in our life together.

The church has always been a fractious and contentious culture; that is the price of all the freedoms we

venerate, the price of divided powers and maximum individual liberty. Nothing is ever quite settled. When ever Christians are at risk of standing still, of having the fine dust of urbanity settle on them, they are sure to produce some fresh challenge to the status quo, some complaint of ill treatment, some protest of rights unfulfilled – in short to make noise. The dog of representative democracy in the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. never stops barking, and while that may be annoying at times, it is probably healthy. Silence would mean the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. had lost its energy and gone to sleep.

Most of us know only a piece of life in the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. What we know is largely how it is represented in national publications. In those media, our differences have been depicted as having risen to a distressing pitch and that the oases of quiet, civil discourse are hard to find in our community of faith.

Civility seems to go against our grain, and yet we have been called and fashioned to be the perfect forum for conversation between people. And so, why do we hate quiet reasonable speech? Why don't we deliberately rehabilitate civil speech within the priesthood of all believers? We seem to think that for ministry to be vital, talk cannot be common or ordinary. We seem to believe that speech has to be jazzed up; it has to be noisy; it has to titillate our ears.

Recently, I read Shimon Peres' memoir in which he said, "Studying the Talmud taught me at a young age that nothing in the world is one-sided. If you see only one side of an issue ... you have not studied it properly." Civil discourse in our community of faith means a certain respect for different opinions, whether you share them or not, or at least being willing to listen to them. That may be nothing but basic politeness, but basic politeness lubricates the church and civilization.

As members of a Christian community of faith, we live interdependently listening for Christ's call to ministry. As we share this common ministry we cannot escape Christ's requirement for constant civil discourse among ourselves and with the rest of humanity. I believe we need to practice civil discourse in our community of faith because, after all, it springs from Christ's unconditional love and acceptance for all.

Notes from the May 19 meeting:

Finance: Expenses have been kept down, we are in the “black” now, but pledges are down \$12,000.

Trustees: A financial review of the church’s books was conducted and they were found to be in order.

Clerk: George Landes will be meeting with all of the Session Committees to insure that they are focused on their objectives and goals and that these dovetail with the Visioning process.

Congregational Life: Participation in the Barrington 4th of July parade was discussed.

The next Session meeting will be held on Tuesday, July 1 at 7:30 p.m. in Fellowship Hall. Note the change of day.

Congregational Meeting

A Special Congregational Meeting was held on June 1, 2003 at 10:10 a.m. to elect Laura Semmen as a Deacon, class of 2005.

Trustees

Notes from June 2 meeting.

Wedding Policy: A new fee amount for the organist for weddings and other minor modifications to the Wedding Policy manual were discussed. Changes will be presented at the next Session meeting for approval.



Communication Committee: There was a discussion on where in the budget can we find the amount required by the Communications committee to go forward with their plans to implement the Web site more fully. Several areas were identified and will be presented at the Session meeting for approval.

Joint Meeting, June 2

The Session met with the Board of Deacons and the Board of Trustees in a joint meeting, following guidelines in the Book of Order, on Monday night June 2nd. All members of the staff were invited to attend this joint meeting.

The meeting started with a Potluck dinner. Following fellowship and good food we participated in a team building exercise teaching us we all have individual talents and gifts given to us by God, but that we must use them together for the good of the family of faith. We moved into a discussion session of questions that were of concern to the boards and to the congregation. We closed our joint meeting with a Taize communion service in the Sanctuary.

Clerk's Corner

A Message from the Clerk of Session, George Landes, Jr.

One concern that I frequently hear from people is the lack of communication within our church. In an effort to better communicate between the Session and the Congregation, I felt that it would be a good idea to write a monthly column in the Carillon, which, for lack of a better name, I am calling the Clerk's Corner.



As some of you may know, we recently had a joint Session meeting in which the Deacons and Trustees attended. During that meeting we asked everyone to put a question into a hat that we would discuss. While we did not get a chance to answer all the questions, I thought a good place to start would be in addressing some of these questions, especially since I believe others probably have the same questions.

What is going on with the Visioning Process? Each committee has its own goals and objectives that it is working on, and most have incorporated some of the issues raised in the Visioning Process into their 2003 objectives. However, because of the amount of time and effort that unforeseen issues took up last year (and continue to take up), we have not progressed as far along as we would have liked. We believe, however, that the items raised in the Visioning Process remain viable issues that need to be addressed, and we continue to focus on them.

What is being done to improve communication within our church? Four things are being done to address this issue:

1. Having a joint meeting with the Deacons and Trustees was a start and The Book of Order requires us to do this annually.
2. It may make sense to have this joint meeting more often, and that is something we will discuss at an upcoming Session meeting.
3. Deacons and Trustees will be receiving minutes from Session meetings, starting with the May minutes. In that way these important groups will be more aware of the topics the Session discusses and decisions it reaches and will be better prepared to answer your questions.
4. Writing this type of column to the Carillon was also prompted by people raising the lack of communication issue within our church.

During the summer could we have one or two hymns per Sunday that are requests from the Congregants? AND Could we add a morning greeting between parishioners at the start of Sunday service? These questions are focused on our worship service, and need to be addressed to the appropriate committee for review and discussion, which, in this case, is the Worship Committee. The Worship Committee will then come to the Session with a recommendation and the Session will, in conjunction with the Worship Committee's recommendation, decide on a course of action.

In an upcoming issue, I will share with you some statistics regarding worship attendance, pledge receipts, new members vs member losses, and attendance figures. I hope this column helps further your understanding as to how our church works, as well as to give you more information regarding the myriad issues facing your Session, Deacons, Trustees, and the numerous subcommittees, all striving to further our Lord's work.

Nominating Committee Seeks a Few Good People

The Nominating committee is looking for quite a few good people to serve as Officers of the church and as members of the Nominating Committee. The officers will be elected in October, 2003 to take office in January, 2004 for three-year terms ending December 31, 2006. The Nominating Committee will be elected in October, 2003 and will serve for one calendar year, January through December, 2004.

7 Elder Nominees: Elders serve on the Session, which is the governing board of the congregation. The Session has oversight of all church programs, budgeting, and use of the church building. Elders chair the church committees. Elders are ordained to this office.

6 Deacon Nominees: The Board of Deacons, working under the direction of the Session carries out ministries of pastoral care and hospitality. Deacons are ordained to this office.

4 Trustee Nominees: The Board of Trustees, under the direction of the Session, oversees the maintenance of the church buildings and property. Trustees manage the church finances. Trustees are installed to this office.

5 Nominating Committee Members-at-Large from the congregation to serve a one year term. The Nominating committee meets annually to consider new officers. They also provide initial training for new incoming officers each November. The Nominating Committee also maintains the security and data integrity for the Skills Database in the church computer.

You may submit your own name for consideration or suggest someone else. . Please keep the following guidelines in mind as you suggest potential nominees. Each nominee must: Be regular in Worship attendance, Faithfully pledge to the annual operating budget, Be able to make sound decisions for the welfare of the entire congregation, Be the only person in his/her family presently serving as a church officer.




Deacons

Deacon's Corner

My name is Lukass Franklin and I became a Deacon in April of this year. As the rambunctious oldest child of a Lutheran pastor, I had many opportunities to accompany my father on his pastoral rounds visiting shut-ins, hospitalized members, and disaster victims. My mother would frequently send me with my father in order to get me out of the house. What I now realize, having performed my own deacon visits with my children, is that most of the people in need of pastoral care really enjoy being visited by small children.

I can vividly remember in 1972 as a 7-year old boy joining my father and my 2 younger sisters on a trip to the Susquehanna valley in the aftermath of Hurricane Agnes. This hurricane still ranks as the most devastating storm to ever hit the US, even though it was technically one of the weakest hurricanes to ever hit US soil. During the slow drive from our hilltop home through the many downed trees and power lines to the river valley, we witnessed the awesome destructive power wielded by 7.5 million gallons per second of raging flood water. One of the church members of our church in tiny Kratzerville, Pennsylvania lived on a small island in the middle of the Susquehanna River. In the peak of the flood that followed the hurricane, water swept over the island, picked up the entire 2-story house, and tumbled it 6 miles downstream. Luckily, no one was in the house during the flood, but the church member was devastated by the complete loss of her home and possessions. Even through her grief and suffering, she managed to smile for us kids and I think our visit made a positive impact on how she felt. Another family that we met along the way was cleaning flood-driven mud and debris that reached into the attic of their 3-story home several miles from the river bank. They too enjoyed the brief respite from their labors that our arrival provided.

I hope to be able to continue this tradition in my visits to our church members by bringing along my daughters whenever possible and bringing some brighter moments into the lives of those we visit.

Food Served With Love and Shepherd Ministry are two services I have coordinated as a second and third year Deacon. These ministries have helped me develop my skills in care giving,

supporting and encouraging members of the congregation.

Food Served With Love is offered to members of our congregation who have had a baby, an illness, a death or just have a special need. The partnership between BPW and the Deacons provides a casserole, dessert and bread to each family or person. The ministers and congregation help make us aware of the need for this service.

The Shepherd Ministry is another partnership between Membership and Outreach and the Deacon Liaison. It provides fellowship, care-giving and mentoring to prospective and new members in order to help them become responsible, dedicated church members. It is my responsibility to assign and guide the Shepherds. Each new member, family, or prospective member is assigned a Shepherd who will encourage that person or family to attend church activities of interest. The Shepherd can introduce them to others in the church who might help them to pursue their interests.

It has been very rewarding being of service to the homebound and those with special needs and concerns through Food Served With Love. I've enjoyed working with the Shepherds and helping them get their new/prospective member(s) integrated into our church family.

When you accept the responsibility of being a Deacon you commit to a ministry of Service. Over the 2 1/2 years I have experienced many Services along with my fellow Deacons. Food Served With Love and Shepherding are just two of my most recent ministries that illustrate what being a deacon means to me----- caregiver, supporter encourager and mentor to our Church Family.

Memorial Garden Update

The Memorial Garden is in the final stages of phase I. Klaus-Schmechtig has removed and replaced trees and planting material that did not survive the first winter. Additional engraved bricks have been installed in the pathway. The two arbors are on order and should be installed by mid July. The benches have been oiled by Mark and Cathy Layne and we thank them for using their time and talents.

The Memorial Garden Donor plaque has been ordered and will be installed in the front hallway next to the large donor plaque already there. A plaque to honor those interred in the Garden will be set in a boulder along the rambling cross pathway. The plaque will hold a quote from Giuseppe Verdi's Requiem, supplied to the committee by Vern Soukup. "Eternal rest grant to them, O Lord, And let Perpetual Light shine upon them."

Phase II consists of installing any additional engraved bricks; moving several of the benches to the upper tier of the garden; adding additional plant material and hopefully a tree or two. A brochure about the garden and a final Interment agreement document are already in the works. Continued maintenance of the garden will be handled by Damgaard, our lawn service provider.

Dedication memorial bricks may still be purchased. Order forms are available in the church office.

Donations of any size are still welcome as they help to fund the perpetual care of the garden.

Summer Service Opportunities
