### Opportunities - ChristCare Ministry and Ron Miller Program

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**C**hristCare Small Group Ministry, Caring Hearts – Faithful Servants. Throughout the visioning process conducted by our church a couple of years ago, a common need was voiced by our members – a desire for small groups. Why small groups? Because they help provide a sense of community, help people connect at a deeper level, help individuals progress on their spiritual journeys, and help provide an avenue for individuals to use their God-given talents to serve others.

In response to that need, our congregation has launched an exciting new program called ChristCare Small Group Ministry. ChristCare is a structured program developed by the same organization that designed Stephen Ministry. While different in focus, it serves a distinct need. We believe that ChristCare will help us fulfill our vision for this Church.

1. ChristCare Groups will provide a sense of Christian community for people in and around our congregation.
2. ChristCare Groups will equip people to live their faith in daily life.
3. ChristCare Groups will lead individuals to discover their gifts and talents and will provide a place to begin developing and using those blessings in service to others.

**Dr. Ron Miller presents “When Religion Lies”,** a provocative summer lecture, on June 12, 2005, 10:30 a.m. – 1:00 p.m. in Fellowship Hall. Register by June 5 at the church office; the fee is \$10, (\$5 for students). A brown-bag lunch will be served. The Latin motto reminds us: *Corruptio optimi pessima*. The corruption of the best things is the worst kind of corruption. Nothing can corrupt like religion and our current age has seen it on several fronts. We will discuss the deceit in televangelism, the Catholic bureaucracy’s cover-up of child abuse, clergy ignoring their prophetic vocation for fear of losing their jobs, anti-Semitic themes in popular movies, the false sense of security offered by the religious right, etc. What are we to make of it all in a time of cultural tension and transition? How do we maintain our own faith?

Dear Friends in Christ,

Ministers used the word love when they can't find any other word to say. Krister Stendahl of Harvard Divinity School once said that a pastor should never use the word *love* in a sermon unless the text itself actually had the word in it, and then only sparingly. Love is too easy to misuse, misunderstand and mutilate because love has no exactness. How do you measure love? How can you quantify love? Is love the gasping exuberant attraction of the 14 year old *in love* for the

first time, the puppy love of spring's rising sap? Or is love best expressed by the elderly couple holding hands in the park, the seasoned veterans of 50 years of patient, steady, gentle and enduring care? Love, of course, is both, but they are not the same thing which is why love is so inexact and conveys such mixed messages.

What is love from a Christian perspective? Is it distinctive in any way? Christian love has as its model the love that St. Paul described in 1 Corinthians 13 in which human love is held as a prism through which the light of God shines. God's love is known in Greek as *agape*. We are called to love one another with *agape* love. Paul even tells us what that love is like in verses 4-13. God's love, and ours, is meant to be *neither jealous nor boastful, neither arrogant nor rude. It is not meant to insist on its own way. It is not irritable or resentful. It takes no pleasure in the wrong, but delights in the right. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, and endures all things. It never comes to an end.*

Loving is never easy. Love is difficult to do because it goes against the grain. We are, after all, selfish much of the time, jealous, full of ourselves, and insist on doing things our way. We are irritable and resentful, and if the truth be told we do take secret delight in the failures of those who do us wrong. Our love is conditional, and we are quick to withhold it when we feel betrayed. At worst, we are imperfect, fickle lovers.

Nevertheless, we are to be a conduit of God's love. As William Sloan Coffin, Jr. said, "Of God's love we can say two things: it is poured out universally for everyone from the Pope to the loneliest wino on the planet: and secondly, God's love doesn't seek value, it creates value. It is not because we have value that we are loved, but because we are loved that we have value." (Credo, Westminster John Knox Press, 2004, p. 4)

One of the hardest things in the world to love is someone who is unlovely. But that is what God has done, and does with us. Love is difficult but as Christians, we are called to do it. "Love one another as I have loved you." Jesus said. If we would get the hang of that, we would have mastered the hardest part of our life together.

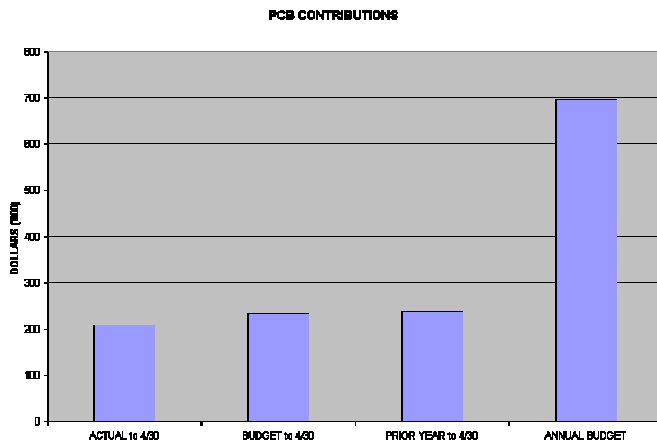
# Church Administration

Our Trustees and Session Committees are doing a great job in managing expenses to the budget that was set for the year, but our weekly collections are a bit behind.

Several factors, including the timing of Holy Week over Spring Break, and the many members who are away during the winter months, may have impacted this shortfall in revenues.

- 👤 Community Education

### Deacon's Corner, Bette Bilton

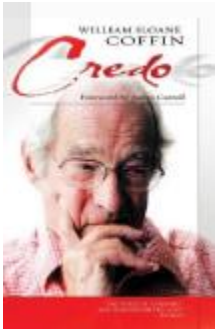
As I embark upon my new responsibilities as Deacon I would like to extend my warmest greetings to the Barrington Presbyterian Church congregation.

The book Credo questions religious action on issues of charity, justice, and morality. How should people of faith allow their relationship to God to interface with politics, with environment issues, or with the question of nuclear disarmament or should personal religious belief lie apart from such matters?

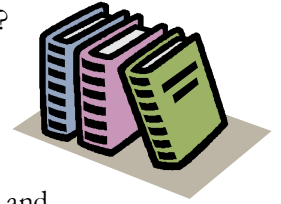
The author of Credo, William Sloane Coffin, has served as chaplain at Yale University, was the inspiration for the religious character Sloan in the “Doonesbury” comic strip, and served as senior minister of Riverside Church in Manhattan. Coffin has recently appeared on NOW with Bill Moyers who described him as “the voice of a prophet and wisdom for the ages.”

Credo is filled with quotables. For example: “Clearly the trick to life is to die young as late as possible”, “Love measures our stature: the more we love, the bigger we are. There is no smaller package in all the world that of a man all wrapped up in himself.”

### Youth Mission Team 2005

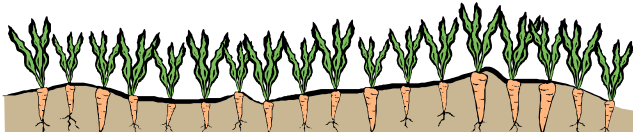

### Plant A Row Share Your Harvest



In 1995, an idea was launched that has grown tremendously. Help feed the hungry by sharing our excess harvest. The concept is amazingly simple.

Most gardens produce more than can be used. Commit to offering fresh fruit and/or vegetables to the local food pantry. Groups such as Scouts, church groups, families, etc. can contribute. It's a nice vehicle to get together in the summer.

Plant an extra portion of whatever you were already planning to put in your garden – thus the term “Plant a Row”. It doesn't take many extra plants to provide enough to contribute. If you don't have room for vegetables, herbs can be planted in smaller spaces and are a welcome addition to a needy family's table. If you don't have garden space of your own, there are communal spaces available.

Bring firm, clean produce to church on Sunday – we'll set up some specific dates. After Coffee Hour it will be collected and taken to a food pantry the following day.

It doesn't take a lot to make a real contribution.

### Offering of Letters- June 5th Make Hunger History in the United States

*"I remind you to rekindle the gift of God that is within you...for God did not give us a spirit of timidity but a spirit of power and love..." -II Timothy 1:6-7*

People who don't know where their next meal will come from are considered at risk of hunger, or food insecure. Take Patricia for instance. She's a 51 year old, single woman whose rent is \$700/month. Her salary is \$200/week. [\$100 for food and all other expenses!] Because her annual income is above the poverty line, she doesn't qualify for food stamps.

In 2003, national organizations working to end hunger in the United States joined together. From this meeting, they created a Blueprint to End Hunger. It is a strategy to cut food insecurity in half by 2010 and to end hunger in the United States by 2015.

This year's Offering of Letters is intended to call on Congress, our Senators and the President to recommit to cutting U.S. food insecurity in half by 2010 and commit to ending hunger by 2015. The legislation will also strengthen grassroots anti-hunger groups across the nation. It will also ensure that research will be able to show us how to best improve our national programs to effectively serve people in need. This has to be group effort. Churches, charities, businesses, state and local governments all have a role to play in ending hunger. But churches and charities can't do it all. Our government will need to do its part as well.

Please take 5 minutes of your time to write a letter to your Representative. A sample letter is enclosed. Members of Congress (Representatives) are only interested in hearing from voting constituents of their districts. If you live in a different district than those listed, you can find out which district you are in by looking at your Voter's Registration Card.
