The committee of churches has found a plot of land on which the combined efforts of the churches in Barrington can build a house. The

Barrington affiliate of Habitat For Humanity has acquired the lot at 168 Skyline Drive, Carpentersville.



According to our member representative, Rich Barbour, the project is slated to begin sometime in late Spring, 2005, as soon as all of the permits are secured. Upon receipt of the permits, the schedules for work will be set. The Mission Committee will then be posting these schedules on our bulletin board outside of Fellowship Hall. We will also post them in future issues of the Carillon.

Volunteers work with future homeowners, under professional supervision, to build or renovate houses, which are then sold to partner families at no profit, with no interest charged on the mortgage. Families in need of decent shelter apply to local Habitat affiliates. The affiliate's family selection committee chooses homeowners based on their level of need, their willingness to become partners in the program and their ability to repay the no-interest loan. Homeowners invest 300 - 500 hours of their own labor -- sweat equity -- into building their Habitat house and the houses of others.

Volunteers are an essential ingredient in building a Habitat house, so, get your tools in shape, yourselves in a "building" frame of mind, and stay tuned. Participation in a Habitat project can be fun for the family, great for group activity, and a most personally rewarding experience. You don't have to be a professional builder to help with the project. There are many jobs which a "non-pro" can do. We look forward to seeing many of our fellow Presbyterians "on the job!"

Dear Friends in Christ,

Many years ago, a member of my congregations met cellist, Yo-Yo Ma. He told me that Yo-Yo Ma is as delightful a human being as he is a master of the cello. As Ma spoke with my friend, he learned that although the artist is often recognized when he travels, that is not always the case. Once when traveling by plane, Ma had his cello on the seat next to him. The man across the aisle asked him, "Do you play professionally? Have I ever seen you? What is your name?" He responded, "Yes, I do. I am Yo-Yo Ma. The traveler responded, "That's no possible. I know who Yo-Yo Ma is and she is a woman." Ma took out his driver's license to prove his identity. Even then, the man still seemed not to believe him.

During Eastertide, we learn about the parade of people who claimed to know Jesus so well, but often, even when they walked and talked with the Master after the resurrection, they did not recognize him. Over-familiarity with Jesus is also a problem today. Many people of faith seem perfectly willing to tell us exactly what Jesus would do in every circumstance and in exact detail.

Not long ago, I was preparing for a Disciple Bible Study class. I learned that we don't know very much about Jesus and the customs of his time. Geza Vermes, an expert on Jewish origins, talks about what life was like when Jesus lived on earth. Speaking about marriage, I learned monogamy was not a rule imposed by the Bible. Jewish men could have several wives. By Jesus' day that practice had become rare and only the very rich could afford it. An engagement was as binding as marriage. Divorce was frowned upon but being a bad cook was grounds for divorce.

What is my point? Often as we go about living out our faith in the world, we are busy making Jesus and his culture into what we want them to be. When faced with the real Master, like disciples of the past, we too don't recognize him. Let's give Jesus and Yo-Yo Ma a fighting chance. Let's listen to who they are and what they have to say before re-fashioning them to our own liking.

It is a pleasure to announce that I am ready to expand the teaching studio that I have maintained since my employment at PCB. Now that I have settled into my full-time duties and responsibilities as Director of Music, I see that with careful time management, I have room to add thirteen hours of teaching to my weekly working schedule. Teaching piano has always been an important and very enjoyable part of my professional career, and as I spend many hours at the church, the possibility of teaching organ is also open.

Learning to play these instruments well is an invaluable asset in many ways. To have a well-rounded education requires one to also acquire skills in the arts in addition to the basics of reading, writing, and arithmetic. The discipline required to learn an instrument goes a long way toward teaching life skills and aiding one's understanding of how to achieve success. And the feeling of accomplishment and confidence that accompanies a successful recital performance cannot be duplicated, not to mention that being able to perform and create music is often just plain fun!

Many hours of research have documented the connection between learning good musical skills and enhancing achievement in school. For example, the M.I.N.D. Institute, based in Irvine, CA, continually does extensive research in learning how music, particularly piano, enhances a child's abilities to understand math concepts by developing their "spatial temporal reasoning" abilities. Their research is fascinating and underscores the importance of music's influence in the educational process. Check it out for yourself at www.mindinstitute.net.

Lessons are arranged on a quarterly basis. Each quarter provides 10 lessons, for a total of forty lessons for the year. This is the standard number of lessons for music studios. The lessons must take place at the church, as I am not available to visit homes. If you, or someone you know, are interested in taking advantage of this



We will end the program with a brief service to install the 2005-2006 BPW officers.





DISCIPLE QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Over the last two years, many of you have expressed concerns and questions about DISCIPLE. You are drawn to participate, but wonder about the time and commitment. Those of us who have participated in DISCIPLE have had those same questions and we have some ideas that might be food for thought. The following are paraphrases of questions you have asked and statements DISCIPLE students have made.

You have asked about completing all the reading...

A DISCIPLE participant might say, "I was worried about that, too, but I found a system that works for me. I read while waiting in the car to pick up my kids, or during my lunch hour, or I listen to the Bible on CD while I commute back and forth from work. Everyone in my class seems to have a different method but we all feel that even though it was a little difficult at first, it became easier and easier – now it is part of my routine."

You have wondered if you could possibly manage a program like DISCIPLE and at the same time manage the busy schedules of young kids, family time, school commitments...

DISCIPLE participants say, "I wish that I had done something like this when my kids were younger. I could have answered their questions with more confidence and as they grew older, we could have had more meaningful conversations about faith."

You have wondered how to fit DISCIPLE in when you are already very busy with ministries at the church...

DISCIPLE participants say, "DISCIPLE has given me such a foundation for ministry. I know the Biblical foundation for what I do and I hear the call to discipleship so much more clearly. I also find that I am more careful about where I am being called to put my energies and talents so that I have the time to participate in ministry without sacrificing time to enjoy my relationship with God, friends, and family."

You have wondered if you could learn all that you need to learn by attending worship...

DISCIPLE participants say, "Worship is so much more meaningful to me now! I understand the significance of worship, I appreciate the meaning behind the different parts of worship, and I know the context of the Scripture readings. I feel like I am more of a participant in worship."

If you can invest the 34 weeks to read, study, and listen to the whole Bible, you will reap the rewards – spiritual growth, a closer relationship to God and others, and a clearer focus in your life as a disciple.


For those members and families who did not have their picture taken, you can purchase copies at the church's cost of \$10 per directory in the church office.


Graduate Recognition

THE LLAMA PROJECT

7th/8th grade Mission for Heifer Project International



7th and 8th graders are busy working on llamas on Wednesday nights. At this writing, we have created the llamas, completed the papier-mache, and we are now putting on the primer. Creative ideas for the individual llamas are really flowing – Elvis Llama, Tap-Dancing Llama, or how about Como Se Llama Llama, or the 80's Hair Band Llama.

Why are we making llamas? As you may have read in a previous Carillon, we are making llamas in order to buy llamas for Heifer Project International. People who live in the high plains of Bolivia, Ecuador, and Peru greatly appreciate the gift of a llama. They use the fleece of the llamas to make warm clothing or to sell. Llamas carry goods to market across rugged slopes at high altitudes. Their padded feet don't damage the fragile terrain and their selective grazing doesn't destroy the sparse vegetation.

Our llamas will begin their trek upstairs to fellowship hall sometime in May. At that time, you will learn how you can support this 7th/8th grade mission project by purchasing one of these "Llovely Llamas" for your very own!
