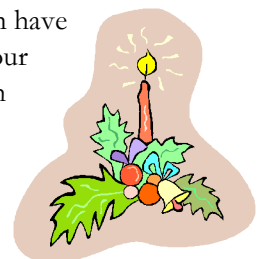

12. Judge your success by what you had to give up in order to get it.

Stephen Ministry

What is Stephen Ministry All About? by Kevin Wilson, Stephen Minister

In our busy world today, it sometimes seems as though we don't have time for one more thing.

I have found Stephen Ministry to be not just another time commitment, but an exciting challenge for the heart and spirit and a wonderful walk of faith. I had been involved with various boards for a number of years, but always felt I could do more. Then I began the 50 hours of Stephen Minister training. We met each week for two and a half hours and continually pushed our spiritual envelopes.

Each training session was filled with helpful information about care giving. With the help of our Stephen Leaders, we all felt supported, loved, and educated. By the end of our training I felt more at ease and much more confident in my abilities as a Stephen Minister. I learned a lot about what it takes to care for and support someone and to share my faith on a weekly basis.

After our commissioning, I was immediately assigned a care receiver. As a spiritual caregiver, I used my training to prepare for whatever lay ahead. At first it was difficult, but through daily prayer and twice-a-month peer group supervision, I made progress. I was amazed to see God at work in and through us. God is the one who brings hope, love, and forgiveness to hurting people.

The four points of the Caregiver's Compass illustrate what Stephen Ministers are all about. We have **COMPASSION** for the care receivers' spiritual, emotional, or physical issues. We are **FULL OF FAITH** because we rely on God—not our own actions—to bring hope and healing to our care receivers. We become **SKILLED** through our initial

training and twice-monthly supervision and continuing education. Care receivers depend on our **TRUSTWORTHINESS**—confidentiality is a cornerstone of Stephen Ministry. At the center of the compass and at the center of our ministry is our Lord and Savior **JESUS CHRIST**, who heals through us and fills us with faith, love, and forgiveness.

A Stephen Minister meets with a care receiver once a week for around an hour. That one hour of care giving is certainly important to the Stephen Minister. But to the person receiving care, that one hour means more than we will ever know.

Growing in faith and love for God by caring for someone who is hurting has been the most meaningful experience of my life. I am no longer afraid to share my faith. I have grown in my ability to pray. Serving Christ as a Stephen Minister is one of my greatest treasures.

As our congregation looks to train another class of Stephen Ministers, I hope others of you are ready to join us in this wonderful journey. Please consider becoming a Stephen Minister. God will bless you and others through you in ways you never dreamed possible!

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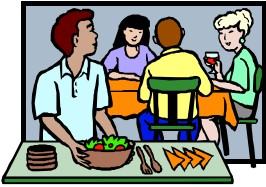

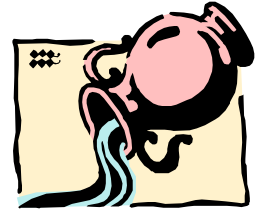

Grandma died 4 years ago this month. She was the only grandparent I had. When she died it was a sad time for our family. Grandma had been a widow at forty and raised three kids by herself. She was the glue that kept everyone together. She kept us fed, happy and healthy in so many ways.



Grandma didn't go to church very often. She never learned to drive, and it was hard for her to walk towards the end of her life. She would sit in her condominium and read her bible. I guess when you are 95 it becomes a top priority to know what is coming next. She told me several times that she was ready whenever God called her.

I remember my astonishment at how peaceful she would seem when she would talk about God or dying. It almost seemed as if she was talking of a friend in a distant land that she wanted to visit. Grandma had thought about her life and come to terms with it. Her life hadn't been perfect, but she was glad that she had been here.

I learned many things from my grandma. One of the things that I hope that I can achieve is to make peace with myself and God the way she did. It took 95 years of life to give her such profound peace. I hope that I am smart enough to make it to the same distant land that she spoke so fondly of.

Sunday Morning Adult Education, 10:15 a.m. In The Parlor 2nd and 3rd Sundays

November 13, “Longing for Cognitive Reminders: Exploring Christian Symbolism”, presented by Dr. David Stark. Dr. Stark is presently the Director of Adm. & Interpretive Media, Dept. of Education at the Art Institute of Chicago. He coordinates design, writing and technical teams for the website at the Art Institute. He is also on the faculty at Columbia College of Chicago. He received his M.A. and Ph.D. in Art History from Ohio State University

November 20, “Longing to Hear God’s Presence: Exploring Sacred Music”, presented by Mr. Bruce Tammen. Mr. Tammen is the founding conductor of the Chicago Chorale, a Chicago area choir specializing in sacred music. CROP Walk

Thanks to all who continue to support the efforts of Church World Service through contributions to the CROP Walk. Though there have been many natural disasters this past year, Church World Service has been able to help. What a blessing that there are groups who are so capable of meeting the needs of those effected by these problems. They are knowledgeable about how to be most effective when there are needs. They know how to support people of many different cultures and religions.

Church World Service

So much suffering - in so many places.

The people of Southern Asia have survived an earthquake. Now they need food, water, shelter, medical care. The loss of life and overwhelming devastation is difficult to comprehend. Millions are now homeless. Because CWS has been in Pakistan for over 25 years, they were one of the first relief agencies to offer assistance with shelter kits and family food packages to Murree, north of Islamabad by October 10th. They assisted 15,00 families with food and non-food items. They provided medical assistance to 100,000 in two medical centers. There are three teams who are assessing the longer-term CWS response in both Pakistan as well as Afghanistan.

Hurricane Katrina and Rita: The pastors and faith community have drawn together and are working together to address the needs of families who have been affected by the disaster. CWS has provided \$1.4 million in material assistance for people affected by these hurricanes. They have provided blankets, "Gift of the Heart Health", "School" and "Kids" kits. In addition, Emergency Clean-up Buckets, medical supplies and other support has been given as needed. More is still needed.

Long-term Tsunami Recovery: CWS expects to be helping into 2006 people with assistance for livelihood assistance. They are providing materials and equipment for farmers. For animal husbandry, they are providing livestock and vaccination supplies. They are providing other income-generating equipment like sewing machines and fishing boats. In addition, they will meet emergency needs to those most vulnerable. For the children, there is psychosocial care. However, they will also provide clean water, appropriate sanitation facilities and help in rebuilding homes.

Emergencies in Central America: On October 7th, Hurricane Stan came through and may have killed 3,000 people particularly in Guatemala, El Salvador and Southern Mexico. Bridges were destroyed as well as communication systems. Unfortunately, El Salvador is also facing the after-effects of a volcanic eruption on October 1st as well. Finally, the people of Nicaragua are experiencing a food shortage due to a plague of rats and worms that have eaten the crops. We must pray for our brothers and sisters in the world. If you did it to the least of your brothers, you did it to me.

17th Annual Nueva Esperanza Golf Outing

This year's Golf Invitational at Chalet Hills was a success on all fronts. The weather was beautiful, the fellowship was outstanding and the golf was excellent. After golf we were joined by the Nueva students and had an opportunity to learn more about their lives and how they are doing at St. Gregory's. It is a very impressive group of boys and girls.

The winning team, by virtue of an overabundance of mulligans, was Denny McGurer, Jack Raaths, Gerry and Nancy Nadig. Rich Barbour won "closest to the pin" and Nancy Nadig won "longest drive", outdistancing all the men!

Thanks to the golfers and all of those generous folks who could not play that Monday but still contributed, we netted over \$22,000 for the Nueva Scholarship Fund. As generous as the giving was, our annual cost for these students to go to St. Greg's is about \$45,000.
