Dear Friends in Christ,

David Myers is a psychology professor at Hope College in Michigan. He was asked a question directed to scientists as well as people of faith. The question is this: What do you believe is true even though you cannot prove it? Myers answered this way: "As a Christian monotheist, I start with two unproven axioms:

- 1. There is a God.
- 2. It's not me (and it's also not you).

"Together, these axioms imply my surest conviction: that some of my beliefs (and yours) contain error. We are, from dust to dust, finite and fallible. We have dignity but not deity. And that is why I further believe that we should:

- a. Hold all our unproven beliefs with a certain tentativeness (except this one!);
- b. Assess others' ideas with open minded skepticism; and
- c. Freely pursue truth aided by observation and experiment.

"This mix of faith-based humility and skepticism helped fuel the beginnings of modern science, and it has informed my own research and science writing. The whole truth cannot be found merely by searching our own minds, for there is not enough there. So we also put our ideas to the test. If they survive, so much the better for them; if not, so much the worse."

Scott Peck often spoke of the two things he couldn't prove but knew were true. They are these:

- 1. "The only way to stop is to stop;" and
- 2. "Love makes the world go round."

And what do you believe that you can't prove?

### What Are We Learning In DISCIPLE?

Did you ever wonder about some of the people in the Bible? Abraham, an example of great faith, also had moments of insecurity and passed his wife off as his sister to smooth the way with foreign kings. Sarah, worried that she would never have a child, took matters into her own hands and gave her slave to her husband so that Hagar would bear a child for her. Jacob, (sometimes referred to in DISCIPLE as "Grabby") connived and manipulated his way through life. Aren't they supposed to be examples for us of perfect faith? In Disciple 2, we learned that actually the truth is just the opposite. God's choice of those who carry the covenant is not because of human merit but because of grace. God is not bound by human cultural practices or our idea of who is "deserving." God's choice of the weak, allows us to see God's strength and to see that it is God who can guarantee their future. So, how do we read these stories? We read them not as a recounting of a glorious past, but as confessions of sin. We read them and recognize ourselves in them. We too, are capable of allowing fear to lead us to try and assure our own future apart from God. We too, are chosen and invited by God through his grace – not our own merit.
