Three young men from Zambia, Martin, Paul and Joseph, are coming to The Presbyterian Church of Barrington to sing and to share their love for God with you. On Sunday, October 9 at the 9:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. services they will worship and praise God with our congregation. At 3:00 p.m., they will present a special concert in the Sanctuary to take you on a voyage of discovery of the rich African Gospel Acappella sounds. Preceding the 3 p.m. concert, please join us for a pot-luck style luncheon in Fellowship Hall. (See page 11 for details.)

The mission of The Voices Acappella is to help spread the gospel of Jesus, to create awareness of the problem of AIDS in Zambia, and to raise funds to support their ministry.

In Zambia, 19.9% of all adults are infected with AIDS. Zambia has approximately 650,000 orphans in a total population estimated at 8.9 million. One Zambian in every 14 is an AIDS orphan under the age of 15. HIV/AIDS is leaving a generation of orphans. The Voices Acappella ministry encourages and empowers the communities in Zambia to look after orphans in their midst.

The Voices Acappella ministry is committed to assist the orphaned children in Zambia and around the world, to meet their needs regardless of personal background, religion or health status, and to ensure that a high standard of care and a positive and life-changing environment are made available to orphans..

The Voices Acappella ministry needs funding for the core program, to register the orphans, and for the many subsidiary programs which address the needs of the orphans. The ministry encourages the development of self sufficiency among orphans by active participation in community projects The Voices Acappella invites those interested in this exciting opportunity to share in this vision in a practical way in order to make a difference in the lives of these children and in the world. Dear Friends in Christ,

This Fall, there are some opportunities for you to learn and grow in your faith.

In September, Becky Bosarge and I started two new Disciple Bible Study classes. The goal of these intensive Bible study classes is to help our members incorporate the Bible's message about God in their daily living as disciples of Jesus Christ. If you can't take one of these 34 week classes, I encourage you to read Robert MacAfee Brown's The Bible Speaks to You. Brown's book is still among the best on how to navigate through the Bible. One of his main points is

that there is a difference between religious questions and scientific questions. On page 61 of The Bible Speaks to You, Robert MacAfee Brown, preacher and theologian, offers these four statements to prove his point:

1. Two plus two equals four.
2. I love you.
3. Babe Ruth hit 619 home runs in his major league career
4. I love you, too.

When I first read Brown's statements many years ago in Newark, Ohio, I knew that Brown had a problem. I knew that Babe Ruth really hit 714 home runs in his major league career. What are the lessons to be learned from Brown's four statements? **First, never trust a preacher or a theologian with numbers! Second, there are statements that are truer and more important for the meaning of life than all the factual data we have amassed across the centuries of human intellectual and physical effort.** Statements one and three are different from statements two and four. One and three are factual. Look them up! Statements two and four cannot be proved in the same way.

Beginning October 5th and running through November 16th, I will be offering a new class on the discipline and practice of prayer. This course will offer you a wide variety of opportunities to develop your spiritual life. Various methods of prayer and praying will be discussed and practiced. You will be encouraged to continue or develop your prayer life using Francis of Assisi, Ignatius of Loyola, Julian of Norwich, Teresa of Avila, Dorothy Day and Lynn C. Bauman. Prayer catapults us onto a relationship with God. Of course, God uses this avenue of communication to transform our lives. The closer we come to the heartbeat of God the more we see our need and the more we learn to bear God's "beams of love." Hence, real prayer teaches us to listen to God. I hope you will take this opportunity to join me and others on these seven Wednesday nights. Soren Kierkegaard once made this observation: "A man prayed, and at first he thought that prayer was talking. But he became more and more quiet until in the end he realized that prayer is listening." I hope that I'll see you on Wednesdays in this new adventure of faith.

Stephen Ministry

What Stephen Ministry Has Done For Me, Bud Kilham



My wife, Sally, and I have been Stephen Ministers for over three years now, having been trainees in our church's first class in the spring of 2002. While some of you may say, wow, what a long time, believe me the time has passed quickly and has been one of the most important roads on my journey of faith.

We (mainly Sally) had been interested in the Stephen Ministry program for several years before it was offered by our church. Upon being approached to be a Stephen Minister candidate, I must admit I was full of doubts. I'm not a Bible scholar (still am not), have difficulty praying aloud and with others, consider my faith a personal and private matter, etc. etc. Despite these "qualifications", Sally and I were accepted for training which consisted of 50 hours of classes together with about 100 hours of homework—book reading, case studies, role playing, etc. Then we were commissioned, I feeling totally inadequate, though the training was strictly top-notch.

I was then matched up with a care receiver. While not known for being timid, I was very anxious about my first visit. I revisited the material regarding first visits, prayed and proceeded. And God took over. It was awesome! Stephen Ministers adhere to a principle that we are the care givers and God is the cure giver. Over the past three years I have seen that rule applied time after time. I sometimes sit in stunned silence (an unusual situation for me) as I see God's love at work with my care receiver. Words are inadequate to describe how my faith has grown from my Stephen Ministry experience. A big void is left in my week if extenuating circumstances cause a cancellation of my one hour weekly visit with my care receiver.

As our congregation looks to train another class of Stephen Ministers beginning in November, I hope others will join us in this journey. It is difficult for you to comprehend the blessings awaiting you. And for members of our church who are mourning, grieving or experiencing other life challenges, prayerfully consider how God working through a Stephen Minister may help you.

We are so happy to share the names of the five participants in the November 2005 Stephen Ministry training class. We welcome Paul Carlberg, Marla Florio, Iris King, Jack Raaths and Laura Semmen.

ChristCare Small Group Ministry

Caring Hearts-Faithful Servants



Training has begun! The first class to train ChristCare Group Leaders began last month and is well underway. The goal of the training is straightforward: to develop effective leaders of transformational small groups. The approach to this training, however, is unique. The class itself is conducted as a small group using the structure of a ChristCare group. In contrast to most ChristCare groups which are open and of variable length, the training group is closed with a clearly defined end date. Training is very experiential – the class participants learn what it's like to be a ChristCare group leader by trying out the activities that group leaders do. Most of the class sessions involve learning by doing: discussions, role plays, and sharing related personal experiences through L.I.F.E. – Learn It From Experience – exercises. As the training sessions progress, class participants will assume the various roles of a group leader while planning and leading activities. The training covers a wide variety of subjects in 16 sessions running from mid-September through the first week in December. A sampling of the subjects covered include: building community, caring in and through ChristCare groups, listening skills, prayer and worship, and using the Bible as an equipping tool.

Each of the class participants has made a significant commitment to the success of this ministry. Each has agreed to spend 2 ½ hours every Tuesday evening between September and the first week of December in training. Additionally, they have agreed to spend 6 hours on each of two Saturdays for a total of 40 hours. Over and above class time, each participant prepares pre-class reading and assignments and devotes time to focused bible study. We are blessed to have a dedicated core of very promising group leaders!

Towards the end of training and the start of the New Year, we will be recruiting members of the congregation to join one of the small groups that will be led by the graduates of this first class. Do you hear God's call to grow spiritually, to deepen your commitment, to develop and use personal gifts and skills, and to reach out in service to others? A ChristCare small group may be what you're looking for.

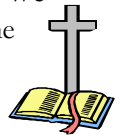
Becoming a Church Member

Honeybees: Families can sell honey, beeswax, and pollen. Bees can double the production of fruit and vegetable gardens through pollination.

Church World Service (CWS)

C.W.S. has been most helpful in the recovery efforts from Hurricane Katrina. As of September 12th, they have contributed over \$300,000 in donated material assistance to shelters. That is, over 18,000 blankets, over 14,000 health kits, over 1000 school kits and 500 heart to heart kids kits. They have distributed 20 interchurch medical assistance boxes to the area. Each of these boxes is equipped to meet the medical emergency needs of 20,000 people for 3 months. Of course, they will be assisting with the relocation of families throughout the US.

CWS is elsewhere in the US and world. They keep a watchful eye on other hurricanes. They are helping with the hunger and privation in the Sudan and Niger.

Though Church World Service has made requests to meet the immediate emergency needs as they occur,

their prime fundraising effort is during the CROP Walk, which happens yearly.
