Dear Friends in Christ,

At this time of the year, I find that my personal reading turns to poetry. Among my favorite poets is Mary Oliver. Here is an excerpt from one of her poems:

One day you finally knew what you had to do, and began though voices around you kept shouting their bad advice — though the whole house began to tremble and you felt the old tug at your ankles. "Mend my life!" each voice cried. But you didn't stop. You knew what you had to do, little by little, as you left their voices behind, the stars began to burn through sheets of douds, and there was a new voice which you slowly recognized as your own, that kept you company as you strode deeper and deeper into the world, determined to do the only thing you could do — determined to save the only life you could save.

Our conventional thinking says we are mad to embark on a journey such as the one to which the poet points. Such a journey relies on the reasonableness of faith.

Roger Housdon said: Faith is unreasonable because it rests on no tangible evidence. It is beyond even belief. The person of faith does not expect everything to turn out the way they want it to; they do not expect some higher power to pick them up when they fall. Their faith is beyond belief and beyond hope. It is faith that comes from gnosis – the knowing that has no need of information. The bottom line that Housdon is driving at is: no one else can ever walk your journey for you. You alone can respond to your call or not.

As we start another program year, I am inviting children, youth and adults to walk paths of faith through the programs that our terrific volunteers and staff have developed. I will be offering two new

courses for adults on Wednesday evenings from 7:00 to 8:30 p.m. The title of the fall course is: *What Was So Wrong That We Had to Reform the Church?* The text for this six week course will be Diarmaid MacCulloch's highly acclaimed book, *The Reformation*. The course outline is as follows:

Notes From Joy

As we anticipate the beginning of the fall season, I hope you all had a very satisfying summer. I was fortunate enough to go to some job-related workshops and clinics, and attend the American Guild of Organists Convention in Los Angeles. I feel recharged and ready to start a new year. I will share some of what I experienced in future articles. Today, however, I want to mention the immediate plans for the choir and handbell choir.

I want to express to the choir how much I have missed them over the summer. Our vacation time was needed by all, but I am eager to return to our regular rehearsals and Sunday morning services, not to mention the camaraderie and fellowship that we share. There may be some who are interested in the choir but have not signed up. Now is the perfect time to start a new ministry in your life. Rehearsals will be on Thursday evening from 7 to 9. The first rehearsal will be September 2nd. This will give us two weeks to prepare for our first Sunday to sing, which will be September 12. The choir will sing at the 9:00 service every week, and at both services on Communion Sundays and one or two other special Sundays. Very shortly, I will email this year's schedule to each choir member. So if you are interested in joining, make sure you get on the list, so that you will be included in all communications.

The first rehearsal for the handbell choir is planned for Tuesday, September 14. Rehearsal will run from 7 to 9 on Tuesday nights. Our first appearance is slated to be on Christmas Eve, but if I have an especially fast group of ringers (which I *know* I will) we may perform even sooner than that. Are you ready for an adventure? It's not too late to sign up!

Task Force on Church Finances

In May the Session and Board of Trustees appointed a special joint Task Force to review church finances. It was charged with looking at current and future financial needs of the church, developing financial policies and procedures as a guide to the many volunteers involved in raising, handling and spending money on behalf of the church, and leading efforts to manage financial operations efficiently. This task force is composed of three Session members and three members of the

Board of Trustees. They are: Pete Brown, Bob Kosobud, Mark Garrette from the Session and Kris Howard Jensen, Peter Martin and Linda Read from the Board of Trustees. Kris is chairing the Task Group.

The group has been working to obtain greater input in developing the budget for fiscal 2005, and on consolidating line items to make the budget easier for church members to understand and use. Financial Policies and Procedures have been developed to be presented to the Board of Trustees and Session for approval in August. Our part-time accountant, Patty Griffin, has spent much of her time and has been extremely helpful in supporting these efforts.

Trustees

Trustees Focus on Finances.

At its meeting on August 16, the Board of Trustees elected Linda Read as Treasurer to replace John Mann, who resigned effective in July. They also elected Denise Gans as Assistant Treasurer. Both of these Trustees are CPA's and bring great expertise to these positions. They bear major responsibility for monitoring expenditures and working with the part-time accountant, Patty Griffin, to handle banking and other financial activities in a businesslike way.

The Trustees also reviewed and approved the newly developed Financial Policies and Procedures, which now go to the Session for final review and approval. Once approved, they will be provided to staff members and to the many volunteers who utilize budgeted funds in their work on behalf of the church. Any interested church member may request a copy.

The Trustees also spent quality time discussing the projected 2005 operating budget, as well as how to address still unmet needs for upkeep and major repairs to the church building. They are committed to both building a budget which supports the mission and vision of The Presbyterian Church of Barrington and to managing the finances in a cost-effective and efficient manner. All the Trustees are volunteering significant amounts of time to accomplish these goals as they consider how the church can address its major financial challenges.

Stewardship

A personal letter to the Congregation,

The theme of the upcoming Stewardship Campaign is about understanding what God and our church has done for each of us and what we need to do for Him. This year's Stewardship Committee has asked me and others to tell our personal stories with the hope that they may inspire each of you to look inward to understand how God and our church have impacted your lives and to question where your faith journeys and commitments need to go.

Like many of us, I began serving in a variety of capacities where my God-given talents could be most effective, and participating in fellowship and church management. In so doing, I felt closer to God, and began an on-again / off-again personal relationship with Christ. After about fifteen years into this yo-yo relationship, I realized that this relationship had not only reached a plateau, but wasn't even close to God's expectations for me. My satisfaction from service declined, and I was at a cross-roads.

In September of 2003, I decided to make a clear commitment to significantly expanding my understanding of and relationship with God by enrolling in the new Disciples program. At the beginning, as we began to read (eventually about 90% of) the Bible, I carefully took notes in bullet-point format, trying to learn as a student would. But about a third of the way into the program, I stopped looking at the trees and began looking at the forest. This started when I realized that many of the members of my Disciple class were acting in "unexpected (to me) ways".

First, they cared about me deeply and lovingly. This wasn't the kind of "how's your family or golf game" chit-chat. It was about me as a person and our growing understanding of and personal relationships with Christ. Second, they helped me talk openly about my faith and together, to start the process of understanding and accepting Christ's call for radical discipleship. They helped me abandon the sham and pretense in my life, and together we became vulnerable, trusting in and depending on God completely. Finally, they helped me understand that Christianity is only between each of us personally and God. This one-on-one relationship is all that counts for each of us. In the beginning I was shocked about how much meaningful daily prayer took place.

Once we understood why God prunes us all and levels the playing field so that none of us are better than others, we could then begin to understand the message that consistently flows through the Bible. God loves us all equally, and calls each of us to keep his law, worship together, act as leaders and role models to other Christians and non-Christians, and be stewards of our time, talent, and treasure. As we worked through the 36 weeks of Disciples, we began to fully comprehend the extreme demands that God places on us.

I now know that following Christ is 10 times harder than I thought, just a year ago. I now know that my new journey is just beginning, and feel a sense of anxiety that I while the journey never ends, I may not get as far along as He and I both expect. Had it not been for Disciples, I would have missed all of this, and never known it.

Our church has a wide range of ways to expand our spiritual journeys. I pray that each of you realizes this wealth of possibility. For some of you it may mean accepting God's call to action; for others, it may mean taking the next courageously on your own. But, as I learned in Disciples, you can't do it without God and the supporting help of other Christians.

I pray for each of you and the continued growth and impact of His church in Barrington Hills.

CROP Walk

The 22nd Annual Barrington Area Crop Walk, to be held on Sunday, October 17, 2004, begins and ends at Barrington Middle School Station Campus. Registration 12:30 p.m.; Step-off 1 p.m.

When you watch the news of people struck with disaster and wish you could help, CROP WALKers and their sponsors can feel the satisfaction of being there. They have helped. Last year we raised over \$55,000.

Of that, almost \$14,000 was given to six local food agencies: Northern Illinois Food Bank, CWU Barrington Food Pantry, Wauconda-Island Lake Food Pantry, Barrington Meals With Wheels, PIN project of the Barrington Ministerial Association and FISH Food Pantry-Carpentersville. Church World Service CROP has been there in your name and with your monies during times of disaster in the U.S. and around the world. Church World Service is providing immediate assistance in Sudan to save the lives of hundreds of thousands of people who are without food or clean water who have been uprooted by mass militia violence and ethnic cleansing. In addition, in ongoing support, CWS has been helping families rebuild their homes in war-torn Bosnia. CROP also works quietly helping people help themselves to eliminate hunger through education and improved skills in food production. So, how can you help?

- 1. Pick up an envelop, in Fellowship Hall on Sunday morning, get sponsors and walk either the 10 kilometers or the Golden Mile.
- 2. Sponsor a Walker. There are pledge sheets in the Information Area.
- 3. Make chili to serve ten people or two dozen cupcakes for after WALK feasting and fellowship. Sign up in Fellowship Hall.

Deacon's Corner

From Lukass Franklin

One of the many things that we do as Deacons for our

church family is pray. The type of prayer that I would like to focus on is intercession: prayer to God in behalf of another. We pray intercessional prayers at our Deacon's meetings as a



group and individually for everyone we know of to be in the hospital, in ill health, grieving and others for whom prayers have been specifically requested. As we do our other duties that bring us into contact with all of you, we keep our eyes and ears open for additional people that need our prayers and add those people to our prayer lists. Our pastors are another big source of prayer requests for the Deacons.

I would like to share with you some instances in my life that caused me to request prayers for my loved ones and the wonderful results of those prayers. Within the past 3 years both my wife and my mother ended up in the hospital very close to death. In both cases I spent some very frustrating time in the hospital with them, realizing that there was nothing I could do to directly help them get better yet being way too impatient to simply sit around and wait for the medical professionals to do their thing. I also quickly realized that while I could pray for them myself, the magnitude of the

situations required more prayer power than I could muster on my own.

So on the second day that my wife Mari was in the hospital suffering from congestive heart failure, instead of sitting at her side fuming at the slowness of the medical staff, I went to work and started sending out email prayer requests to all of my relatives, co-workers, and friends. After I ran out of email addresses, I started calling people asking them to pray for Mari. By the next day I started to get a lot of responses from people indicating that they were praying and spreading the word further. I started to feel the power of hundreds of people praying for Mari and it made me feel incredibly calm. I was then able to visit Mari in the hospital knowing that I had launched a tidal wave of God's healing spirit to help her recover and was able to wait somewhat more patiently for God's will to be done. I went through a similar process with my mother. In both cases everyone's prayers were answered and I still enjoy the company of my wife and my mother.

I urge all of you to partake in the power of prayer whenever you face any sort of crisis in your life. Please feel free to approach any Deacon, Elder, Stephen Minister, or Pastor in the church at any time to request a prayer either for yourself or for someone important to you who needs help. We will spread the word and through our combined prayers channel more of God's healing spirit to those in need.

Nominating Committee

Nominating and Leadership Development Committee Seeks Potential Officers

The congregation's Nominating and Leadership Development Committee invites your input as they search for people to be nominated to serve as church officers for the class of 2007. The officers will be elected in November 2004 to take office in January 2005. These are three-year terms with officers serving until December 2007. The Nominating Committee will review all suggestions as they select nominees to be presented to the congregation for election in November. You must submit your recommendation to Elder Tom Hilgendorf no later than September 12, 2004.

The following officers are being sought to serve for a three-year term:

- 7 Elder Nominees: Elders serve on the Session, which is the governing board of the congregation. The Session has oversight of all church programs, budgeting, and use of the church building. Elders chair the church committees. Elders are ordained to this office.
- 6 Deacon Nominees: The Board of Deacons, working under the direction of the Session carries out ministries of pastoral care and hospitality. Deacons are ordained to this office.
- 4 Trustee Nominees: The Board of Trustees, under the direction of the Session, oversees the maintenance of the church buildings and property. Trustees manage the church finances. Trustees are installed to this office.

In addition to these officer positions, the Nominating Committee will nominate **Five Members-at-Large from the congregation** to serve a one year term on the Nominating Committee from January 2005 through December 2005.
