HARRY K. THAW'S MOTHER ON THE WITNESS STAND.

HER ORDEAL VERY BRIEF

Delmas Checks Testimony About Heredity—Jerome is Most Considerate, Then Threatens Commission in Lunacy.

New York—Another dramatic chapter was added to the history of the trial of Harry K. Thaw for the murder of Stanford White Wednesday when the mother of the defendant took the witness stand to contribute to the evidence as to whether she might have contributed to the death danger which menaces him.

Mrs. Thaw's stay before the jury was brief. When Mr. Delmas had definitely limited her examination to the change she had noted in her son's condition following his return from Paris in 1903, after Evelyn Nesbit had told him her life story, and when District Attorney Jerome had with great consideration, conducted a short and ineffectual cross-examination, the mother-son witness was dismissed. She was loath to leave the witness chair.

"There is the question of heredity," she protested, when both Mr. Delmas and Mr. Jerome told her she might sit down.

"I have asked you, madam, all that is considered necessary," said Thaw's attorney, with the utmost deference.

Mrs. Thaw half rose as if she was about to sit down again when the leading counsel for the defense offered her his hand to assist her from the stand.

Twice during her recital of the events which had caused her to fear that all was not right with her son, Mrs. Thaw broke down and was unable to proceed.

"I told me a wicked man—probably the wickedest man in all New York—had ruined his life."

It was not until some time after he had offered this explanation of the change in him that she learned the story of the young woman who was to become her daughter-in-law.

While the elder Mrs. Thaw was on the stand the district attorney engaged in a wordy war with Mr. Delmas, during which she was made public for the first time the threat of a lunacy commission.

At the end of Mrs. Thaw's examination court adjourned over until Friday.

TRAIN HURLED INTO DITCH.

Another Wreck on the Pennsylvania—Nine Persons Injured.

Warren, Pa.—Train No. 33 on the western New York and Pennsylvania division of the Pennsylvania railroad was wrecked Wednesday night between Irvineton and this place. The train plunged over a 25-foot embankment and nine persons were injured, none fatally.

When you were at our place in July I promised to tell you what my wheat north quarter made per acre. You will remember it was all sown to wheat. Well, I finished threshing yesterday and received from it an average of bushels per acre—totaling 414 pounds per staked bushel. The wheat is the best sample I have ever raised—so uniform and even in size. You may know it was a good sample when I tell you that I have already sold 2,000 bushels of it for seed to my neighbors. This year has been my best effort in farming during my life. My wheat totaled 9,520 bushels and my oats nearly 5,000.

If you remember I pointed out to you a half section lying just west of our house and joining my upper quarter on the south, which I said I should have in order to make one of the best farms in western Canada. I am very glad to be able to tell you that I now own that half section. My ambition now is to be able to market 50,000 bushels of the best wheat. If some of those good, honest Hoosiers could have been with me during the last two weeks and could have seen the golden grain rushing down the spout into my wagon and then on to the bins, I should be in great piles in my granaries, I feel sure they would have been forced to acknowledge there is no better farming country in the world than this. I may just do as well as any farmer farming with eight head of horses and one hired man except during harvest and threshing. This year I proved to my neighbor that the Hoosiers, when once "waxed" with our grain equal to the best Minnesota farmers. His best yield was 42 1/2 bushels per acre, so you see "old Indiana" is holding the ribbon this year.
