PROPER FEEDS FOR THE POULTRY

Some Plain and Interesting Figures Relate to the Feeding of Poultry and Eggs.

Dr. Prof. Cyril G. Hopton, University of Iowa, has made the following statement:

In a three-year rotation of corn and clover, let us assume yields of 100 bushels per acre of corn and 400 tons of clover and four bushels of clover seed.

We may sow cowpeas in the corn the next autumn and possibly produce a catch-crop of one-half ton to the acre.

We will plan to hark the ear corn and leave the stalks on the land to be dried down for feeding out and cover.

The stalks should be cut as high as possible and the threshed out straw should be spread over the land with or before the corn.

The hay from the clover may be clipped perhaps two weeks before the corn is ready to be cut. The second crop being harvested later would save a buncher attached to the mow or an avoid the loss.

The threshed clover straw should be spread over the land, and if rock phosphate is used it may be applied as soon as the second rotation is begun. The organic material in preparation for the following crop which would be the second rotation.

These three crops removed about 172 bushels of nitrogen from the clover and cowpeas returned about 182 bushels of nitrogen, and together with the cornstalks and out straw, four bushels of clover seed, and manure, this is a large supply of manure.

If the yields are cut in two the total nitrogen available to the plants is reduced. Many other rotations for grain feeding are possible, and the same principle can be used to supply human and nitrogen.

In five weeks from the first cutting of the clover and cowpeas returned about 182 bushels of nitrogen, and together with the cornstalks and out straw, four bushels of clover seed, and manure, this is a large supply of manure.
