VILLAGE BOARD MEETS

Trustees Pass Ordinance Providing for Extension of Appleton Street.

The village board met in regular session Monday evening with all members present. The previous provision made by the trustees in their report for the month of May was read and approved. The following bills were allowed and ordered paid: Edward Peters, marshal, \$45.00; Fred Jahnke, night watchman, 40.00; North Shore Electric Co., streets, lights, water, 10.00; North Shore Electric Co., pumping water, 35.00; Hartman, printing and publishing, 25.00; F. John Daniels, Fred Bensel, as marshal, and Dr. Schlesinger as health officer was confirmed. Edward Peters and F. L. Waterman were approved.

Mr. Stevens, representing the North Shore Electric company, asked permission to connect with the telephone company in the telephone station.

The matter was referred to the committee on Fire and Water.

The following improvement was reported in favor of the extension of Appleton street to connect with Wall street and recommended the passage of an ordinance. The ordinance was passed and appears in another column of this paper.

Mr. Stevens, representing the telephone company, asked permission to employ a surveyor to make a survey of West Main street to establish the sidewalk.
