OVER 100 CHRISTIANS SLAIN

BEDOUIN MARRAGE TURKISH
GARRISON IN EGYPT

Attack Made in Revenge for
 Execution of a Chief—Three-
 men Hole Fatally.

Damatpasha.—More than 100
 Christian inhabitants of the town of
 Kerk, in the Turkish vilayet of Syria,
 together with the Turkish garrison at
 that place, were massacred by Bedouin
 marauders in the Turkish garrison
 of one of their chiefs, according to a
 dispatch from Jerusalem, Friday.

The Bedouin marauders, led by
 the late, in the vicinity of which
 there has been a great deal of trouble
 between the tribesmen and the
 government, were reported to have
 killed and captured 200 of the
 Christians, and to have taken away
 a half.

Kerk, formerly the capital of
 Moab, has a population of 5000. Of
 these, 1000 are Christians. The town
 is in the last on the road from Damas-
 cus to the Mediterranean coast. It
 stands on the mountains of
 Moab and may be seen from Jeru-
 salem, 20 miles.

There are no American mis-
 sionaries in the vicinity of Kerk,
 this being that of the British Church
 Missionary Society, which has a station
 in the East. This is a branch of the organization
 of its staff, and is composed of
 one missionary, his wife and one
 native assistant.

Recent atrocities and massacres
 have occurred within the past year,
 the most serious of which was in
 April, 1919, when 2000 Christians
 were killed and 2000 were burned
 and hundreds of persons murdered.
 The Turkish garrison at Kerk
 was reported to have been killed
 and captured by the Bedouin marauders.

JURY MENLO MOORE
