CONVENIENT BRODER HOUSE

A small convenient broder house used by the Maine experiment station is here shown. It is for sale by the owner and may be moved easily.

Two 12 foot by 12 foot by 4 by inch timber serve as runners. The ends of the timber are notched in mortise and tenon joints. The floor is placed on the outside to facilitate moving. The house is 12 feet long, some of them are six feet and others seven feet wide; seven feet to the better width. They are set five feet in front and four feet high at the back. The front is 2 feet 6 inch high; the floor is double-boarded and the building is finished and covered with a good quality of heavy roofing paper. Paper is preferred to shingles for outside covering. This kind of covering for the walls is not so heavy to be injured in moving as shingles. A door two feet wide in the center of the front is placed in the middle. It is hinged at the top, on each side. Two broders are placed in each of these houses and 50 to 60 chickens are put with each broder. On low partition separates the flocks while they are young, but later it can be made higher. The houses are large enough so that a person can go in and out of the work conveniently, and each one accommodate 100 chicks up to the cockle are large enough to be removed.

Recking Poultry at Home.
The New Hatched Poultry Experiment station recently conducted some feed trials with chicks with phosphate. Fifty of the chicks were divided into five lots and fed 25 days. On soaked shellied corn there was a gain of 82 1/2 pounds, at a cost of 7 1/2 cents per pound; on shellied corn, a gain of 141 pounds, at a cost of 7 1/2 cents per pound; on cracked corn and middlings and skim milk a gain of 129 pounds, at a cost of 8 1/2 cents per pound; on shellied corn, corn middlings and molasses a gain of 19 1/2 pounds, at a cost of 8 1/2 cents per pound.

The Wealthy Farmer.

By the last census the farmers had invested in agriculture in United States \$100,000,000,000, which last year produced \$1,000,000,000. HIGH PRICES ARE GENERAL

Statistics Show Them to Be Universal
The World Over—Fully to Blame the Tariff.

Most prices have advanced in all the principal producing and consuming sections of the world, according to compilations just made by the bureau of statistics of the department of commerce. The statistics show that the bureau has compiled countries, commodities and labels. The principal steel-exporting countries of the world are the United States, Germany, Austria, New Zealand, Argentina, Canada and Great Britain, and the chief import-exporting countries are the United States, Germany, Austria, New Zealand, Argentina, Canada and Great Britain. In a large degree, the other European countries show higher prices than those of the United States, and all of the meat-importing countries show higher prices in their import figures and in the current market quotations.

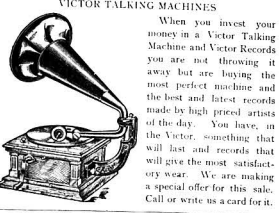
