Hon. Ninian H. Welch, assistant U. S. Circuit court judge, who is to speak at the Salem church here on Decoration Day afternoon has for some time been one of the Chicago Daily News' leakers and is a faithful orator. He is a son of John T. Welch, who will be remembered by some of the early settlers here, having come from New York state in 1834 and settled near Antioch in Lake county. Mr. Welch is a Royal Arch Mason and was prominently mentioned as a candidate for congress in the sixth congressional district when Mr. Lorimer was elected United States senator.

The Memorial Day plans are for the procession, headed by General Thomas W. Sherman post number 275, G. A. R., to move on the public square at two o'clock, a. m. and march to Evergreen cemetery where decorations and suitable ceremonies will take place.

Freud Loonhard, 60 years old, dropped dead shortly after getting aboard the "Chicago" train in Cary on the Chicago & North-Western railroad Monday evening at 8:20 o'clock, while returning to his home in Cary.

Conductor Cannon was in charge of the train. It was first thought that the man had fainted and was a trainee on the railroad and his mind was found. The remains were removed upon arrival of the train here to W. M. Hlocks, undertaker.

After the hearing of evidence the jury rendered the following verdict: "That the deceased came to his death by natural causes, all of which seemed to originate in disease of the heart."

Loonhard was born in Baden, Germany, sixty years ago and came to this country when a young man. He had been employed as a scales repairman and lived at 3141 Hudson street, Chicago. He recently had purchased a new car for \$1,000 from the purchase of a car from the Chicago & North-Western in Cuba township of Albert Allen and had sold it to the same party for \$1,000. He had been making some improvements on this property and had been in Chicago for some time. He is the owner of considerable real estate in Chicago. He was a member of the First Baptist church of Chicago in good standing. He was 147 Kilgus of Friday.

Loonhard's widow is survived by two sons, Edward C. and Fred J. Loonhard, and two daughters Mrs. O. H. Hertz and Mrs. J. Kern all of whom reside in Chicago. The two sons were here Tuesday and took charge of the removal of the body to Chicago where the funeral was held.
