MEET DEATH BY TRAIN

Two Citizens of this Village Killed by C. & N. W. Railroad Train Twenty-four Hours After

THIRD HAS NARROW ESCAPE AT PALATINE

O. E. Maynard Run Down at Palatine Saturday Evening and Almost Same Time Next Night Matthew G. Coleman Killed Presumably by Same Train

Chicago & Northwestern train brought untimely and bloody death the past week to two local men, who were killed within twenty-four hours of the fatal accidents at Palatine and at this village.

Pioneer Rescued Killed. The first victim was O. E. Maynard, the accident occurred Saturday night at about ten o'clock it is thought. Mr. Maynard had been in Palatine and the seat of his live was about 9:30, as far as he was concerned he had been recovered later in the night lying across the south-bound train which was passing the yard by the brakeman of a freight train which was about to crash and he was not to be seen. His arm was broken, his chest crushed and he was about the face. The appearance of the body, when it was examined by railroad physician Schilling, was such that death was caused by the train striking him.
