A representative for the NADSO says that a Meter company of Chicago was producing and installed water meters—his company was established a year ago. The representative is beginning to have a business, as there is evidence of a large amount of water here, and in order to put out the National meter representative to ship them a meter company (five) on trial. The representative by them is called the Empirical Meter Company and is of the consulting district. The city of Woodstock, Illinois, has over 2,000 of these meters in use, and they are used extensively across the country as the representative

The five meters will be installed here on 90 days trial and if the service satisfactory service it is probable that the village will be ordered to pay for enough to supply the village will be given in the future. It is the present plan of the village to purchase the necessary number of meters and furnish them with charge to the consumer. The village is also planning to purchase a pump to be installed at the Farrington and one at the Bowman Dam and occupy a plant.

The matter was referred to the committee on drains and sewers with instructions to secure an estimate for filter bed and septic tank to be placed just outside the village in accordance with the recommendations of the committee.
