"FLY TIME" AMONG THE COWS

Some individuals! Animals seem to suffer more than others—various remedies suggested.

(By WALTER B. LEVETZ)

Mid-June is "fly time" in the dairyman's calendar. The black fallings in the milk seen during the month are the result of the rise in temperature of the milk when the flies are on the milk. The failure to provide a abundance of shade and water for the cows seems a trifling contribution to the lowering milk temperature. The flies are most numerous about cattle as are known by the common name of the stable fly and the horn fly.

The stable fly resembles the house fly in color, but is larger and differs in having the mouth parts fitted for piercing the skin and sucking the blood. The stable fly are usually laid in horse manure, the female laying from 100 to 200 eggs at a time. The young fly is a new pest and was first noticed in this country about 1910. The horn fly was the cause of considerable trouble among the cattle and, the author, who has been a cattleman all his life, which he sometimes competes in cattle shows, has never seen a stable fly on a cow.

The horn fly is a small, gray fly, very much like the house fly, but is larger, being about one-half as long, with a broad, flat, triangular head, an inch in length. They have the strange habit of settling in groups on the back, neck, and head, which they sometimes completely cover, a habit which gives them the name of "horn flies." They congregate on the cattle to cattle. They have the same taste for the recta of the tail and other parts of the body where they are not expected. Application of sulphur powder in decoction of the lime has also been suggested. One of the following regulations: Turn to fifteen per cent kerosene oil, or with small mixture of carbolic acid. Concentrate all two parts and pour into ear part.

FEED SALT TO LIVESTOCK

Receipts shown in the illustration is designed for the Etherine in Flies or Cattle.

The salt receptacle shown in the illustration is designed for the use of the farmer who has a few acres to the stock for obtaining the required amount of salt and at the same time to keep the salt dry. The cement and prevents waste. The receptacle is protected by a hood which is supported by four legs. The hood is held up and lifted upward when the salt is withdrawn from the receptacle.

Salt-Feeding Receptacle. Openings made, the hood drops down and the salt is easily removed. The opening is always left to expose the salt and attract the stock.

Handling Cows in Summer.

It is often easier to keep a cow in the cold weather than in the winter than it is in the summer. The reason is that it is then roughly protect the stock from the sun that makes them go dry in the sun.



SAVES MANY VALUABLE COWS

Harmon Arrangement Will Prove of Greatest Aid to Animals During Calving Time.

Many valuable cows have been lost by the winter or calving time because of the fact that the calving time is not known. This may be kept on for 24 hours after calving, after which time there should be a break in the milk. The tail should be extra wide and so arranged that a clean, sanitary cloth may be applied to the tail. This is a dangerous subject very often, when laying down in the stall before calving.
