

TO HAVE BETTER LIGHT

Village Council Takes Action Which Will Result in Better Lighting of Streets.

The members of the village council met in session at the village hall last Monday evening, for the purpose of considering the street lighting problem, all being present with the exception of Trustee Gray.

After much discussion, with the understanding to keep the present system in order, it has been found necessary by the company to reconstruct the line.
