

NAME WHITNEY JUDGE

Secures Nomination Without Opposition - Welch Defeats Patton - Good Vote Pulled.

Without opposition, Attorney Charles Whitney of Waukegan was elected judge of the circuit for the year ending March 31 by a vote of 100 to 0.

Mr. Whitney is nominated to succeed on the bench of the seventeenth circuit, the late Judge Robert W. Wright of Belvidere who died shortly after the first of the year.

In the Cuba precinct Mr. Whitney received 128 votes. In the Cuba township primary election held on the same day, John Holmes received 35 votes for highway commissioner and John Welch, 199.

RAILROADS WEIGHING MAIL

Work Commenced Last Tuesday Will Continue Three Months.

On last Tuesday railway mail clerks commenced weighing all mail carried and will continue to do so for a period of three months. From the weight of the mails during the three months the weight of the mails during the year will be computed, and thus the amount earned by the railroads for carrying the mails for the year will be known and weighed over in four years.

This task will require a great number for the next three months, and it is figured that it will require almost four extra men on the trains of this district of the North-western. The mail is weighed by spring scales, and extra men will be required to handle extra mail to do this work on the roads running out of Chicago, and extra men will be used on the different roads carrying mail throughout the United States.
