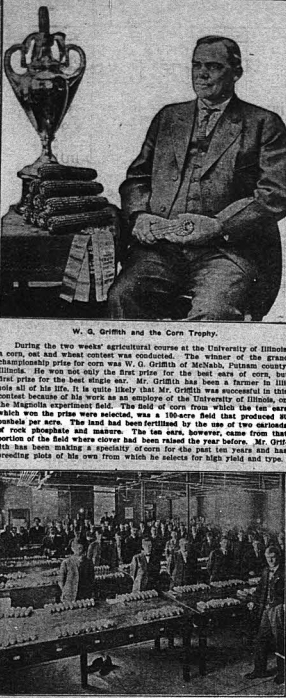

PROPER CARE OF SHIRTWAIST

Attention to Details While Garment is Being Trained is of First Importance.

From the whitehead, backhead and any other stiff starched collar or band, first on the right side and then on the wrong side.

Lay the shirtwaist on the ironing board. The neckband directly in front of the collar and parallel with the front edge of the collar.

When the backhead and cuffs are finished, lay the wrist on the board with the neck at the left hand, and from the fronts then the back.

After ironing one side, look over the other side, being sure that the collar is flat and the sleeves are straight.

With a small iron smooth out the collar, first with a stiff brush, then with the iron. It is better to iron the collar with the iron held at an angle.

When the collar is finished, iron the sleeves. Lay the sleeve on the board with the cuff at the left hand, and the seam at the right.

When the sleeves are finished, iron the cuffs. Lay the cuff on the board with the seam at the left hand, and the button at the right.

When the cuffs are finished, iron the collar again. Lay the collar on the board with the seam at the left hand, and the button at the right.

When the collar is finished, iron the cuffs again. Lay the cuff on the board with the seam at the left hand, and the button at the right.

CARE OF HOME TREASURES

Methods of Cleaning That Will Aid in Their Preservation.

To clean old paper, experts usually find it best to dip the plates and cards in the water which has been used for the cleaning of the paper.

The water should be almost hot, but not boiling. The paper should be washed with a hard brush and plenty of water.

When the paper is washed, it should be laid flat on a clean surface and allowed to dry naturally.

When the paper is dry, it should be stored in a cool, dry place, away from light and moisture.

When the paper is stored, it should be kept in airtight containers to prevent damage from insects and mold.

When the paper is used, it should be handled with clean hands to avoid contamination.

When the paper is disposed of, it should be done so in a way that does not pollute the environment.
