Happenings in the Surrounding Country Which Will Be of Interest to Our Many Readers.

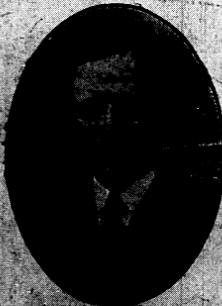
Vice President Fairbanks is scheduled to speak at Harvard tomorrow evening.
